····· BUSINESS NOTES.

The local stock markets have been rather quiet during the past week, the main inquiries having been confined to Church bonds, Z. C. M. L. Consolidated Wagon, and Amalgamated common. The latter is in demand at \$52,50. In view of the fact that the preferred stands at \$98.00, most people take this as indicating that dividend returns on the common are not among the improbabilities. The officials of the company in Ogden, however, state that no dividend program, aside from the disbursements on the preferred, has been settled on, and that the payment of a dividend on common is altogether an indefinite matter. Utah Sugar stands strong at \$17.25,

with apparently no sellers, Broker Cut-ler's circular states that the company will produce over 20.000,000 pounds of sugar this year and that the beets being worked from the Bear River valley show a higher percentage of sugar than those raised in either Utah or Salt Lake counties. Last year the city consumed 12,000,000,000 gallons. The city pays \$35 for each hydrant and 5 cents per pupil in the public schools. Water for city buildings, street sprinkling Water for the and flushing the sewers is furnished free. The dam and reservoir were completed the present year at a cost of \$1,000,000. Colorado Springs, with 32,000 people,

has a water system of mountain lakes and reservoirs of a capacity of 1.000.-000.000 gallons. Their system has cost the city about \$2,500.000, and the bonded debt for the system is \$1,250,000. Their consumption per capita is about 300 gallons per day, and the rate for a five-roomed house is \$15 per year. Denver is just double this amount. and Salt Lake pays half the amount. In addition to the present plant, they are ontemplating bringing water from an other stream on the other side of the mountain through which they will tun-nel at a large cost, as they have done in connecting their other system.

IRRIGATING PROJECTS. Promising Canal and Reservoir Pro-

positions - Crop Shortage. Elder Silas S. Smith Jr., of Manassa. Conejos Co., Col., called on the "News" and reports the colonists in Colorado as in a fairly prosperous condition, considering the drouth, which reduced the crops down about one half. Steps are being taken, however, to secure reser-voir sites in the mountains west of the colonies, that when secured will fur-nish ample water to irrigate all the col-

The proposition will involve an outlay of nearly a quar-ter of a million dollars, involving a tax of about \$5 for each acre benefited by water it will furnish.
