## THE BREAKERS BEHIND.

Central of the Currency Crisis was the guest of the bankers of Chicago at a banquet prepared in his honor last evening. At the proper stage of the proceedings he made a speech on the financial situation, in the course of which he complimented his adherents and their allies on the financial standing which they had maintained during the storm whose stress is now lifted upon us again. The speaker claimed that in every hand was the evidence of an improved condition; the paralysis which caused so suddenly upon the people having yielded somewhat when President Cleveland convened the present extra session of Congress; and the advance since the action of the House on the purchasing clause of the Sherman law had been marvelous. The controller could see but a clear sky with pleasant sailing ahead of us.

Such views from men in positions where the financial pulse of the nation can be felt and understood every day are extremely encouraging. But as they descended upon an optimistic tone of mind by any means, he all around us, and from quarters where the pressure was most severe came reports of revival and strengthening of the industrial system. Times that have been idle for months are starting up again, men who have been unemployed or working only a part of the time are busily engaged once more. Money is quite accessible, and there seems to be a real breaking up of the tightening situation. That it comes gradually, even cautiously, can but mean that it comes with the intention of restraining, if it were a hap-hazard, hasty and tumultuous change from one condition to another there would be nothing to be relied upon, in fact the safer plan is to trust that kind of thing as merely a transient effort. It is when the great body of the nation shows signs of recovery from its lethargy and moves as it is now moving that we may hope that it is going to stand erect and become active as is its normal condition.

## ASKING FOR CITIZENSHIP.

In July last David A. Sanders of Plymouth, Fox River county, through his attorney in this city, made application to President Cleveland for amnesty, the applicant having been a violator of the Hammons-Tucker law. The petition was endorsed by Governor West, Judge James, U. S. Attorney Judson, and some other prominent officials, all of whom testified to the apparent fact that the applicant was a proper subject for the exercise of such clemency as was prayed for, but it seems from the telegraphic reports that President Cleveland is in some doubt as to his power to pardon under the circumstances and has referred the matter to Attorney General Otis to examine and report upon.

A little less than ten months ago a general amnesty proclamation was issued by President Harrison, removing the disabilities of offenders in the class to which Mr. Sanders belongs. Mr. H. established a limitation as to time and was made applicable only to those who had not violated the law since the 1st of November, 1889. This applicant's case fell two days outside of this limit and thusly the defense technically would be deprived of a legal pretense to be of practically no avail application. There was, however, one small defense to be made up to the terms of the amnesty law, although the few days mentioned had not intervened between him and eligibility and was patiently for his time to come. This policy we are advised, is being followed before, as well as after, the proclamation.

The application for pardon was not made by reason of being denied, or under any law of Congress, but had reference particularly to the President's power under the Constitution and was so stated in the petition. The court referred to it in paragraph one of section 11, article 11, reading "the [President] shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeach-

ment." Nothing would seem to be fairer, and why is it that the President does not see his way clear to forgive this man? We can determine. It may be that he holds that he can not fairly where there has been obstruction, but while there may be some authority for this, there are ample precedents the other way. Civilian Harrison's proclamation itself, for instance, satisfies the soul. Christianity demands agency and the master demands agency and will be satisfied right when it is done of all the sufficient care to wait for the attorney general's action. The case is a somewhat peculiar one viewed altogether and its settlement will of itself form a precedent.
