

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—Last night the very beautiful comedy of "An Unequal Match" was presented at the Theatre. This is one of the best pieces ever placed upon the boards here. It is a keen satire upon the follies and deceptions of a fashionable life, and most forcibly indicates the lesson that however high the meteoric gliding of the votaries of fashion may be, they prove an unequal match for the possessor of sterling worth, though uneducated and simple.

The playing of Miss Lockhart was excellent. In the first act, when her artist husband deceives her and offers her his hand in marriage her acting was charmingly natural. In the second act, when her father, the uneducated blacksmith, makes his appearance among her fashionable friends, acting as lost sight of, it was real life itself. Her excellent performance last night, furnished additional proof that she is an artist of great ability.

Of her support, on this occasion candor and truth forbid that we should speak in very high terms; the prompter's duties were far too enormous to admit of it. Mr. Hardie Harty Arceville played in a careful and creditable manner; though a few defects in pronunciation, through inattention or carelessness, detracted somewhat from the merits of his performance. Mr. John G. Graham, as Doctor Botcheby played with his usual success. Mr. Hyde as the superstitious baronet presented the best old man he has yet attempted. Mr. Thorne as the village blacksmith played well. Mrs. M. G. Clawson as Lacey Hebblethwaite, gave a correct definition of the uncultivated country lass; and, in the latter part of the piece, when prosperity has dawned upon her, she exhibited the vulgarity and pride that usually attend "upper tandom servant gait."

To-night "The Unequal Match" will be repeated, and will be followed by the farce of "A Handsome Husband."

CO-OPERATION IN THE 20TH WARD.—Active and decisive steps are being taken by the members of this enterprising ward to establish a branch co-operative retail store. An organization has been effected for this purpose. Bishop John Sharp has been appointed President, W. C. Dunbar Vice-President. The following gentlemen have been appointed as a board of directors: H. W. Nesbitt, W. J. Allen, Geo. K. Hume, R. H. Schettler and C. S. Sams. With George Reynolds as Secretary and Treasurer.

The shares of this institution have been placed at a very low figure, \$5 each. This is to allow even the poorest member of the ward to become shareholders, and have an interest in the concern. Each person can hold but one share, but every member of a family can hold a share. This entirely excludes the principle of monopoly. About two hundred shares have already been taken out. In order to encourage shareholders to patronize the store a small discount will be allowed them on purchases at the end of every quarter.

PUBLIC DOCUMENTS.—We are under obligations to Hon. W. H. Hooper, Delegate to Congress from Utah Territory, for public documents of interest and other favors.

ODEN.—A correspondent writing from that city on the 8th inst., states that times are lively there owing to the advent of the "iron horse" but that good order prevails, which is evidenced by the absence of police forces. "The hotels and boarding houses are crowded to excess. Many business men are there from various quarters in search of a place on which to locate and commence business operations."

WHITE PINE.—There is a continual living stream moving onwards to White Pine judging from the large number of pedestrians, horsemen, people with wagons and various kinds of vehicles which pass through Austin bound in that direction. So says the *Reece River Revue*.

THE BALTIMORE GAZETTE ON ASHLEY'S BILL.

The following, in relation to Ashley's scheme to dismember Utah, is taken from the Washington correspondence of a late number of the *Baltimore Gazette*:

"Of all the ambitious plotters in the Fortieth Congress, there is not one more reckless than the Hon. James S. Ashley, of Ohio. He it was who aspired to be the 'great impeacher,' and to sustain his charges he never hesitated to consort with criminals. His present role is a very different one, but when understood, it will exhibit the same low, political cunning which has ever characterized his career as a member of Congress. His constituency have branded him at home and he is already looking abroad for new scenes and new interests. Towards the rapidly growing Territories he stretches his gaze westward and is in imagination already United States Senator from the State of Montana."

Mr. Ashley's bill, which is now being urged upon the attention of Congress, completely wipes out Dakota Territory, dividing it between Montana, Minnesota and Nebraska. It also dismembers Utah, taking 25,000 of her 73,000 square miles, with some 15,000 population, and transferring it to Nevada, with its already large territory of 108,000 square miles, the State of Nevada being overwhelmed with debt, and her gold bearing 12 percent bonds selling at 80, thus taxing Utah to pay for the reckless corruption and extravagance of the State of Nevada. This bill also gives about 25,000 square miles of Utah to Wyoming, with about 20,000 population, thus transferring a large body of the citizens of Utah to Territory as yet without a government. A large slice of Utah through which the Pacific Railroad runs is to be assigned to Montana, leaving Utah but 25,000 square miles, a further division of which is to be made at the next session of Congress.

Such is the manner in which Mr. Ashley proposes to suppress Dakota and dismember Utah, and the secret of which is he expects to be appointed by the new Administration Governor of Montana, when there will be no one to dispute his right to "share in all the town sites." The whole programme is already arranged by which he is to become a millionaire and a United States Senator, and while this may serve to intoxicate Mr. Ashley, and induce him to attempt this Congressional outrage upon Utah, it cannot be possible that our National Legislature will countenance such a shuffling and dealing of those embryo States in the far West, as may happen to suit the whims or gratify the political cravings of even the Hon. James M. Ashley."
