AGAINST BULLION BECK. Bureks-Hill Mining Company Gets Judg ment for Trespass. Charles S. Varian, as referee, in the case tried before him recently of the Eureka Hill vs. Builion Beck & Cham-pion Mining company, has rendered judgment in favor of the plaintiff. The defendant was accused of trespassing in Eureka-Hill territory and extract-ing ore thereform. The plaintiff is awarded tripple damages in the sum of \$51,642. The amount is about \$5,000 less than the judgment rendered by Referee Parley L. Williams in a former hearing of the case. The actual damages affixed by Judge Varian was \$16,872, or the equivalent of 148 tons of ore of the value of \$114 to the ton.

Thirty Claims Added to Company's Bingham Territory.

The Silver Shield, after a long period f instability and uncertainty, has at

one bound taken its place among the Bingham properties of the first rank, says the Bulletin of Bingham. This has been accomplished by the purchase of 30 claims, adjacent to its property, com-prising about 380 acres, and stretching for more than a will acress and stretching prising about 389 acres, and stretching for more than a mile across one of the best mineralized sections of the district. The claims purchased include the O'Herliey and Turngren group of 15 claims, including the Therary, Irlah American, San Francisco, Turngren and other well known claims, the Jap group of 11 claims, the St. James group of of 11 claims, the St. James group of three claims and a one-third interest in the Unlimited, adjoining the Shield on the southeast. The O'Reilly group was bounded to Frank Benedict by the owner, bonded to Frank Benedict by the owner, Mrs. E. O'Rielley, and transferred by Mr. Benedict to the Shield. The Jap group was owned by W. A. Clark, the St. James by Messrs, Druchl and Fran-ken, and the one-third interest in the Unlimited was acquired from Barney Quinn, Gus Holmes owning the other two-thirds.

All of these properties are taken un-der an option running for one year and while the exact consideration is not given out, it is known that the options in the aggregate call for the payment of nearly \$100,000. There is a good showing of mineral in all of the prop-erties, while in the Shield itself a large body of fine silver-lead ore has been opened up. The acquisition of the ad-joining ground gives the Shield the con-tinuation of this ore body, while other vents that have been opened in the new territory promise rich development.
