New York's Bank of Tragedies to Reopen



After being in the hands of receivers for nearly five months, the Knickerbocker Trust company will reopen its doors on March 26. Supreme Court Justice Clark at St. George, S. I., on March 7, approved the proposition for resumption evolved by the Parsons-Satterlee committee and endorsed by Bank Supt. Williams.

The total deposits at the Knickerbocker Trust company as reported to the court are \$16,370,820. Depositors of all but \$3,000,000 of this amount have signified their consent in writing to the plan for rehabilitation. There is on hand \$15,665,016 with which to do business.

The closing of this famous banking institution was followed by no less than five tragedies, its president, Charles T. Barney, and four depositors having committed suicide after its suspension was announced.
