THE YELLOW FEVER SCOURGE.

Terrible Ravages of the Pestilence.

NAVILVILLE, 9.—Among the refugees

from the south, only four are

so far sick with fever, two of

which are yellow fever; the

others are not decided. The

two supposed cases have been

removed to the infirmary, two

miles from the city.

The State Treasurer, Marsh I.

Folke, with advice of Gov. Porter,

has determined to issue provisions

to the extent of \$500 per week to

the fever victims at Memphis.

Chicago, 9.—Five members of Thos.

Porter's family, four miles above

this city, on the Mississippi River,

are down with the fever. Physic-

ians are doing all they can to

save the cases as to the nature

of the fever. None reported in this

city.

Cincinnati, 9.—The statement

received from the city last week

by a special correspondent, an-

nouncing on the authority of Dr.

Phyphian, of Newport Ark., that

there were 30 or 40 cases of malarial

fever in Newport, and that it was

a mild type of yellow fever, that phy-

sicians state as unqualifiedly false,

that nothing like yellow fever ex-

ists in Newport, and that there is

no such statement. Neither did

he have any conversation with any

persons, that could be so con-

strary.

Memphis, 9.—The day of the mor-

tality report is the last of last week

since the fever appeared, the un-

derstanding reporting 13 internets,

of which 12 were colored people.

Forty-five new cases were reported

by the resident physicians. Fred

Cole, an active member of the

Howard dispensary, died last even-

ing. His wife and child are sick

with fever. The Howards have

established under the direction of

Dr. Lewis Byron, of Houston, Tex.,

a hospital for the care of phy-

sicians and nurses, many of whom

are falling.

Physicians of the Howard corpor-

ation report for the last 24

hours. They state that the situation

of the city is still frightful. They

find more sick than they can attend

to. In the 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th

wards, the colored people, a great

portion of the city, there is not a
