ASPIRANTS FOR POLITICAL HONOR

Camps of Both Big Parties Full of Good Official Timber.

SUDDEN DEATH ON THE RAIL.

Albert L. Howe Knocked from D. & R. G. Train at Provo Bridge—Other Junction City News Notes.

Ogden, Sept. 19.—The past week has been one that has been filled with many preliminary skirmishes and fence repairing among the political aspirants of Weber county. Now that the Republican state convention is over and the Democratic state convention will be held next Tuesday, the candidates for county offices on both tickets have been unusually busy preparing for the big days.

The Republicans claim that they will elect their ticket this year by a larger majority than ever, while the Democrats say that this is going to be a Democratic year and are accordingly lining up their forces for a hard fought contest.

A great deal of interest centers in the Democratic judicial convention which will be held in this city on September 30. When the party nominates its ticket the other party wonders who their opponents are going to name. This is the condition that centers here now. The Republicans have named their judicial ticket and are waiting for the Democrats to name theirs. For judge of the Second judicial district the name of Judge Henry H. Rolapp has been mentioned frequently as is also that of C. C. Richards and Valentine Olsen. For district attorney Joseph Cheez and William D. Johnson are being groomed for the office by their friends.

For the county conventions both parties have found in their ranks much valuable timber. For offices on both tickets men thoroughly qualified have been mentioned and whom will make splendid races in a good clean campaign.

Rio Grande Western brakeman residing in Ogden, met with a tragic death yesterday afternoon at about 4 o'clock, by being knocked on the head at the Provo river bridge and falling from the train to the water about 20 feet below. The unfortunate man was riding on the rear platform of the train in the capacity of a flagman and when the bridge he leaned out from the platform to see if the brakes were sticking. It was while in this position that he was struck on the head by the bridge. As soon as possible the train was brought to a stop and the body crew with some difficulty got the body of the man out of the water and placed it upon a stretcher and brought it to this city, and it was taken to the Richey undertaking parlors to be prepared for burial.

Howe was a resident of Ogden for the past 18 years. For 15 years he had been in the employ of the Southern Pacific, having left that road about two months ago to accept a position with the Rio Grande. He was about 41 years of age and leaves a wife and four children. His home was 619 Maryland avenue. For the past 10 years the deceased was secretary of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and was a member of the local lodge of Elks.

A brother of the deceased at Ocean Park, Cal., has been notified and will reach Ogden tomorrow. The funeral will be held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Presbyterian church. Rev. J. J. E. Carter officiating and under the auspices of the B. R. T. and the Elks.

This is the first shipment of fruit that has ever been made from Clearfield, which is a new town not more than two years old and is one of the coming fruit districts of the state.

SUGAR CAMPAIGN BEGINS.

Lehi Factory and Sub-Stations Start Record Run.

Lehi, Utah Co., Sept. 19.—This morning the sugar factory here started its beet campaign. Harvesting of beets commenced Monday last in the main district, and a large number of farmers are now busy hauling beets to the factories. The beets are coming in in good shape and are of excellent quality, and it is expected a record run will be made. At least 125,000 tons of beets will be harvested this season for this factory, which will mean that \$800,000 or more will be distributed to the 2,000 beet raisers of Salt Lake, Utah, Wasatch, Sanpete and Sevier counties, and also a very large amount will be distributed here and at the cutting stations and for supplies. This year there is plenty of good labor to be had, nearly all of last year's employees taking their same positions, and over 100 men were turned

ed away when the men were placed last Tuesday. The weather is ideal for harvesting beets and a large part of the crop will be harvested the next forty days.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES.

The Democrats will hold their primary Saturday evening when they will appoint 17 delegates to the county convention at Provo, Sept. 30, five delegates to the judicial convention at Provo, Sept. 21, and five delegates to the stake convention at Logan. It will also nominate local officers.

On the Republican side friends are working for Harley Austin and J. H. Gardner for representatives to the legislature from this county and Karp Hopkins as county superintendent of schools and William Asher as county treasurer.

There is every probability that Ira D. Wines and associates who have an option on the Saratoga Springs resort will buy same and greatly improve it. Mr. Wines was in Salt Lake the other day and was negotiating with the railroad people to build a spur from their main track here to the springs. There is no doubt these springs will be the banner pleasure resort of Utah county in the next few years, if not of the state, as it only needs plenty of capital to make this an ideal resort.

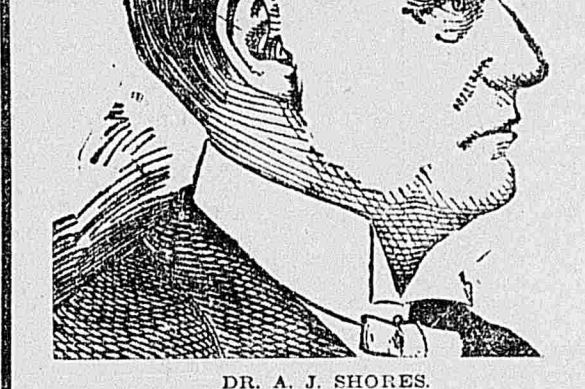

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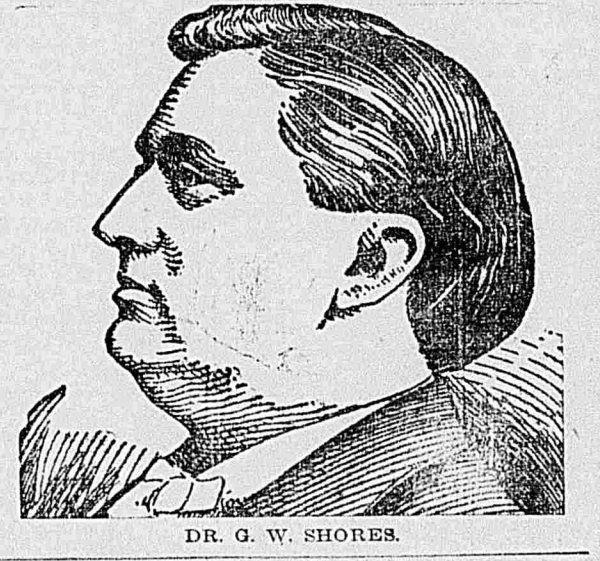
