CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Merchants Petition for Lighter License Fees—Wedding Permits. Special Correspondence. Logan, Cache Co., April 5.—The Logan city council met in regular session last night and transacted the following business:

A petition signed by a large number of the merchants was read. The petition requests the council to revise the license ordinance and reduce the license chargeable to merchants doing business in the city. The claim is set forth that the merchants are already heavily taxed and the present license charge is too high for the benefits received.

A petition to extend the water mains from the canyon road on Fourth East street was read and referred to the committee on streets.

A petition from Emil Anderson and others asking for the grading of Second East street between Seventh and Ninth North was read and referred to the city marshal reported 27 arrests during the last three months, the majority of which were for drunkenness and fighting.

The report of the city justice showed that 21 persons had been taken before him for various offenses during the last three months, 19 of whom were convicted. \$108.59 had been collected in fines.

IONA, IDAHO.

SITUATION EXAGGERATED.

Only Five Cases of Smallpox—Town Quarantined, Guarded and Fenced In.

Special Correspondence. Iona, Bingham Co., Ida., March 27.—On the 24th inst. Dr. T. C. Wilson, the assistant quarantine physician for Bingham Co., placed the school district here under quarantine for smallpox. Closing the schools and ordering all public gatherings discontinued. There are five cases in a mild form confined to four families. Some very sensational and alarming reports have been published in the local papers, in particular the "Past," a daily published at Idaho Falls, seem fit to misrepresent the conditions putting the number as high as one hundred, and worse or would be afflicted in a few days.

The citizens here are very indignant over the manner in which the situation has been reported and the high handed way in which a not unusual condition has been handled. Mounted guards are stationed at all the roadways leading from the place, and in addition barb wire fences have been stretched across the roads. Every precaution in wisdom that would tend to prevent the spread of the disease, the citizens offered to adopt and carry into effect. However, it would seem that there are those whose zealous and lofty desire to preserve the health of their fellow men is of such gross nature, and their aim and ideals so lofty, that the patient plodders in this vale are filled with awe and wonderment at the unusual regard in which they are held by their fellow citizens.

Winter still carries, mostly in the shape of mud, with occasional squalls. Preparations will be made that farming operations will begin in earnest the first part of April.

RAYMOND, CANADA.

PRODIGIOUS DEVELOPMENT

Of Alberta's Coming Town—No Race Sulfide—Forestry Planting.

Special Correspondence. Raymond, Alberta, Canada, March 29.—The people here are preparing for the spring work, that of getting in thousands of acres into grain and beet besides a large number of forest and tree trees. Last season the government was very liberal and gave the farmers in the neighborhood of 10,000 forest trees, which thrived nicely, over 90 per cent being in good condition when the winter set in. The farmers expect to receive this spring 10,000 forest trees and they will be planted by the citizens around their homes and in some cases upon their farms. During the past season, however, not fine residences, a beautiful skate tinning office and a large bank building have been erected. Through the kindness of Mr. John A. Silver and others the tabernacle will be renovated, repaired and painted, which will be very pleasing to all concerned.

A fine Sabbath school, consisting of over 60 students and a corps of 12 officers and teachers all interested in their work, is the pride of the town. The ward has eight missionaries in the field and eight more preparing to leave in a short time. The district school is supplied with eight teachers who care for over 500

students in seven rooms, so the race out side question is not troubling Raymond at present.

Coal mines are located about eight miles from the town, and the miners are kept busy turning coal for the public. The mill and elevator has been kept very busy during the last season, having received over 20,000 bushels of wheat and is shipping a carload of flour each day while running.

The first railroad built through the village some six years ago was only a narrow gauge, but of late the standard gauge has been inaugurated. The people soon expect electric lights to make their homes pleasant.

A board of trade is organized here with a membership of 31. It gave a grand banquet a few nights ago, the first of its kind in the city.

A great many of Raymond's citizens are making a pilgrimage to the April conference held in Salt Lake City. Utah railroad rates having been secured for that purpose.

On March 19, 1906, Melissa Ann Weeks departed this life after a severe illness. She was born at Harris Grove, Ill., March 15, 1831, and entered to Utah with her parents in 1852, settling at Cedar Fort, Cedar valley, Utah, her father becoming the first settler in the village. In the early days of that place she had two brothers killed by the Indians, while they were procuring a load of wood from the grove a short distance from their home, while in Cedar Fort Sister Weeks presided over the Young Ladies Mutual Improvement association for some years. She was also a very faithful Sabbath school teacher, and later became a member to the president of the Relief society, and was beloved by all who knew her. In 1882 she left her old home and came to Canada settling in Raymond making her home with Mrs. J. A. Rodback, her sister, with whom she spent her last days. Her funeral services were held at the residence of Jas. Rodback, Patriarch James Kirham of Raymond, Bishop's Counselor El Bennett of Magrath, being the speakers.

STOCKBROWERS ASSOCIATION.

Thirty-Third Annual Convention Elects Old Officers. Special Correspondence. Cheyenne, Wyo., April 4.—The Wyoming Stockbrowers' association, the oldest organization of its kind in the state, held its thirty-third annual convention here, President of the association, Vice President Alex. Bowie, Treasurer J. D. Frehorn and Secretary Alice Smith were re-elected. The association now numbers 425 members. The expenses of the association for the past year amounted to \$17,425.25, there being 14 men employed during the year at the market centers, in addition to the regular officers. The association collected from the sale of estrays \$124,091.45, of which \$122,720.21 was disbursed among members.
