One of the principal reasons why pneumatic tires on the wheels of cycle and other vehicles gradually become exhausted even when unpunctured is that the compressed air within slowly escapes through the rubber, and this process is hastened by the oxidation of the rubber, which causes it to crack As at least a partial remedy for this it has been proposed to inflate tires no with ordinary air, but with nitrogen in inert gas which does not affect the rubber.
