BISHOP SPALDING LECTURES.

Takes as His Theme "The Program of Enlightened Individualism."

Bishop Spalding lectured to a large au dience in St. Paul's church last evening, on "The Program of Enlightened Jadividualism." He said in part:

"Without the generosity and the sub-

"Without the generosity and the sub-stantial charity of our great philanthro-plats there would be more serious suf-fering than there is now. And with all the charity of the day there is not enough. We have found that there are four mil-lions of paupers in the United States to-day as a result of the present system of distributing the world's wealth, yet were it not for the charity which keeps these paupers there would be dead men in the helds and country lanes today. "Yet with all our charity these remedles are only upon the surface. They are merely a covering up of the sore places. And before we command the liberality which gives today, let us see for a mo-ment the effect. There can be no deny-ing that it has the effect of pauperiz-ing the poor. The man who has never begged, it is said, thinks seriously as to whether he will die or beg for the first time. But once having begged, he has no such feelings. I do not know whether tonight I am speaking to a man or wo-man who in this time of need has been forced to accept alms, but if I am. I would give one word & warning: Beware of the danger of joining that great class of mendicants who have lost the shame of begging through having accepted char-ity.
