

at Geddes this afternoon. Eight men entered the furnace to construct a lining, when the old lining fell upon them, killing all instantly. One hundred tons of brick and mortar fell upon them. The victims were married and had families. The names of the men killed are Joseph Dawson, foreman, John Fogarty, Michael Carroll, Anthony Layden, Frank Hefty, John Wardell, David Reagan and John Barty.

Wheeling, 23.—A horrible accident occurred near Webster, Taylor County, this morning. A farmer named Wm. Casson was driving a mowing machine, holding in his arms a child three years old. The horses became frightened and threw the boy from the father's arms in front of the cutter bar. The father jumped to save the child, and fell. The machine ran over both. The boy was cut to death and the father horribly mangled and fatally injured. The machine was broken to pieces; one horse was killed. It is feared that the young wife of the farmer will die from the sudden shock.

Dennison, Texas, 23.—Last night a man got aboard a freight on the Missouri Pacific near Red River. Upon his fare being demanded he drew his shooter, killed a brakeman and shot a second man named Grumble just under the heart. The latter fell from the train and was again shot at twice by the murderer, who then ran into the brush.

The brakeman leaves a wife and ten children. His body was found horribly mangled by the cars, and with bullets in his brain.

CHICAGO, 25.—Upon application of the City Health Commissioner, the City Council has authorized the expenditure of \$10,000 additional to the regular appropriation for the use of the Health Department, and the Commissioner states that the amount will be increased as necessity demands. The Commissioner has engaged a large extra force of teams and men to rid the city of all garbage and refuse with a view to improving the sanitary condition and to guard against the introduction of Zymotic diseases.

Richard Connor, the private watchman who shot and fatally wounded Myer Franks, 13 years old, last evening, gave as an excuse that the boy was in too close proximity to railroad car containing watermelons. The watchman is under arrest.

All the wires of the Western Union Co., on the Wisconsin and Milwaukee divisions of the Chicago and North Western road were cut at 11.45 last night at points about six miles distant from the city. The breaks were discovered and wires were working all right again this morning.

Richmond, Va., 25.—Night before last a boat containing eight men and two young girls, all colored, that were crossing James River at Oaremont to attend a prayer meeting at Sandy Point, upset and eight of the party were drowned.

Milwaukee, 25.—A capsized vessel was seen by Capt. Smallman from the City of Milwaukee, on his trip to Grand Haven. It turned out to be the scow Seabird of Chicago. Her crew of six men, captain, mate, steward and three sailors were drowned.

A Rosebud Agency, Dakota, special says: The annual Sun Dance of the Sioux Indians occurred yesterday afternoon at the camp near that agency about one thousand savages being present from all parts of the reservation, and a number of white visitors. Fifteen warriors entered for the dance, having fasted four days before entering upon it. The bodies of all were frightfully lacerated according to the usages of the tribe in testing the game qualities of the participants. It is probable that this is the last time the Sun Dance will be permitted, as a strong effort will be made to have the government interdict the barbarous practice.

LEXINGTON, Ky., 25.—A re-union of John Morgan's Confederate command is now in progress here. Several hundred members of that notable force are now in camp on a part of the estate of Henry Clay, in tents furnished by the war department. Jefferson Davis was invited, but sent a letter saying that ill health prevented him from attempting the fatigue of so long a journey and the excitement of so joyous an occasion. He continued, the name of your association is eloquently commemorative of the daring deeds performed, and of dire suffering borne and barbarous indignities inflicted on men who had braved the struggle in an unequal combat to vindicate the rights their fathers left them. The

daughter of John Morgan is among the guests. Addresses were made yesterday by Frank Walters, Genl. Preston, Genl. Dake, Ex-Gov. McCreary, Genl. John D. Williams and others. At night the Rev. W.H. Jones, of Richmond, Va., gave a lecture on the boys in gray. The reunion continues to-day.

PHILADELPHIA, 25.—A special meeting of the Maritime Exchange, to consider the interruption to business by the telegraph strike, has been called for Friday next.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., 25.—A desperate prize fight for \$500 was fought near Nianticatte, last evening. The principals were Paddy O'Brien, a saloon keeper, and Mike Brizee. The men fought according to rules of the Marquis of Queensbury. Eleven rounds were fought when a crowd of women broke into the ring and brandishing knives and pistols put a stop to the fight.

BALTIMORE, 25.—It is said here on the best authority that the American Rapid and striking telegraphers have agreed upon a compromise and that the men have been ordered to work to-morrow.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 23.—Thomas R. Berke, English ecclesiastic, is dead.

A serious outbreak of cholera is expected at Bombay.

Advices from Egypt state that in addition to the outbreak of cholera at the town of Fareskow, eight miles southwest of Damietta, leprosy has appeared there and is spreading rapidly. There are neither doctors nor medicines at Fareskow.

Returns of mortality from cholera in Egypt differ widely. A dispatch to Reuters' company state that the number of deaths at Cairo and suburbs in twenty-four hours ending at 8 this morning was 427; Ghizeh, 63; Chibin, 150. The English government will dispatch twenty doctors who are experts in cholera to Egypt to-morrow.

Dublin, 23.—Cardinal McCabe, receiving the clergy on Sunday, condemned the false teachers who asserted that the Pope in issuing his late circular was exceeding his legitimate sphere of authority, or had been influenced by secular motives. Those disobeying the circular, he said, incurred the guilt of heresy.

London, 24.—One death from cholera among the British troops in Egypt.

Commodore Leitch, of the Cunard fleet, is dead. He was fifty years in the company's service. He died on board his ship in the Mediterranean.

During the 24 hours ending at 8 this morning there were 463 deaths from cholera at Cairo, 23 at Zifti, 16 at Tantah, 9 at Shirbin, 13 at Mansourah, 117 at Chibin, 43 at Mehallet, 95 at Ghizeh; and 7 at Chobar.

The London Standard says the opposition in the Commons will endeavor to obtain the time of the House Monday and Tuesday of next week for the discussion of a motion which will probably declare that no arrangement for making a new Suez Canal which recognizes the monopoly of De Lesseps will be satisfactory.

The reported victory of Cetewayo is confirmed. He, however, is not wounded, and made his escape from the enemy. An immense number of his men were killed.

In the Commons this afternoon Gladstone replying to a question by Chaplain, said the Government has no intention to legislate further in regard to the importation of cattle, unless the laws now existing are found to be inadequate.

Sir Stafford Northcote gave notice that he would move shortly an address to the Queen, praying that in negotiations relative to the Suez canal she will decline to recognize any claim of the Suez Canal Company to such monopoly as would exclude other undertakings designed for the proposed opening of a way between the Mediterranean and the Red Sea.

The Queen has gone to Osborne. The Swedish monitor Thorndon has foundered near Narokoping; crew saved. The Thorndon was of about 1,500 tons burden.

The American Rifle team was entertained at luncheon to-day by the Lord Mayor at the Mansion House. Paris, 24.—Trans-Atlantic steamships have obtained a contract to carry the mails between Havre and New York. They receive a subsidy from the government of 548,000 francs.

A banquet was given at the Bolivian Consulate to-night in honor of the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Simon Bolivar. Among

the guests were M. Waldeck, Russian minister of the interior, M. Cochery, minister of posts and telegraphs, and M. De Lesseps. All of the States of the American Continent were represented. M. Henry Martin, French historian and senator, proposed a toast to "The prosperity of the two Americas."

Berlin, July 24.—The police seized the books of the Hirsch Drucker Trading Association. The affair has caused a sensation.

LONDON, 25.—It is reported that quarantine has been enforced against vessels arriving from all parts afflicted with cholera.

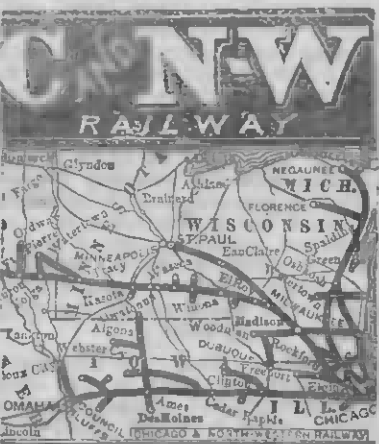
