THE COUNTY COURT.

Yesterday afternoon's Scrap, Left Once  
Drew the Morning's Session.

Subsequent to the close of the News report of the proceedings at the county court yesterday the following matter came up:

The compensation of the assessor and collector for collecting and assessing the special school taxes of \$12,000 fixed at \$330, to be divided equally.

The county attorney reported on the bond of Prof. L. Kent, road supervisor, that it should be approved by the probate judge.

In regard to McDowell & Lytle's communication, submitted at the last meeting, the attorney reported that the court was not compelled to respect the motion. Referred to the joint city and county building committee.

The clerk was instructed to communicate with the authorities of Union Tabernacle, and to inform them that she was their ward instead of belonging to Salt Lake county.

POLITICS.—The county would, I think, indicate its favor of holding the fair, but think the stock show should be out this time. Make it an agricultural and industrial show of a very high standard. I think it would be a mistake not to hold a fair in 1863.

Mr. McCormick: I suppose it would indicate the favor of holding if the Territorial fair is not held as usual, and think, perhaps, it would be better to continue the "show" for appearance sake than to other, although possibly a loss may be sustained.

George A. Lowe: I think it would be advisable to have a Territorial fair this year.

Hort Sherman: I am certainly in favor of a fair in 1863. The same question came up in Iowa (my old home) and the unanimous sentiment was to go ahead notwithstanding the World's Fair. If fairs can do it surely we can.

George T. Odell: Unfavorable.

J. A. B. Bishop: Yes, by all means, and it has been known soon that the fair is to be given.

Geo. M. Cannon: Hardly think it wise to hold fair but think it better to center our efforts on a creditable exhibit at the World's Fair.

C. E. Allen: Yes.

A. H. Cannon: I think a territorial fair should be held this year by all means. It seems to me a discontinuation of such a fair would be a serious injury to the following year's exhibit.

A. H. Snow: Taking all things into consideration I say—no fair till '64.

James Sharp: In view of the efforts of Utah to make a good showing at the World's Fair at Chicago, it appears to me it would be an "odd" year for a local fair.

C. C. Abbott: I am of the opinion that the territorial fair is in every way beneficial to the general interest of our Territory. It brings the different localities in a better knowledge of the resources of each, and works to promote the common good.

O. H. Hardy: I see no reason why we should not hold our annual fair. It brings the people of our Territory before the public and does a great deal of good. The Chicago Exposition should cut no figure in the matter.

Geo. A. Snow: I am not in favor of holding the territorial fair this year for various reasons, the most important of which is that the money raised is taken in the World's Columbian Exposition, coupled with a general depression in finances, and I do not think the fair would be sufficiently well patronized to make it profitable. At least, don't let us give up our annual fair to the coming year.

C. H. Savage: There are circumstances which make me think it would be a good move to abandon our fair for this year—principally depression of trade, World's Fair at Chicago, and the want of interest of the public, who will have their attention there. I, however, will have an exhibit, and will not make out at our annual fair if one is held, on that account.

J. M. Hibberts: Should have fair this year more than any other. We are likely to have many visitors during the month of June, and the fair will be a good attraction.

L. S. Hinckley: I am of the opinion that in view of the efforts being made to represent Utah at Chicago, it would be unwise to try to make a creditable fair here this season.

Elias A. Smith: I think it would be unwise to endeavor to hold a territorial fair this year, as there are existing circumstances to make the World's Fair a success, and are called upon for all they can possibly give to help it.

S. A. Kenner: In the absence of Mr. Cannon, who is indisposed and has been for several days, I will undertake to answer the question. The members of the paper (Deseret News) have ever entertained other than friendly feelings for the fair and its management, and if we were here would undoubtedly do it every effort to prevent its being held. The Chicago Exposition might militate somewhat against success, but as a general proposition the trade exposition should not be neglected.

W. W. Browning: My opinion is a fair should be held. The prosperity of our territory demands a territorial, stock raising, county and mining fair. Animal fair is the best means of improvement in agriculture and stock by bringing the very best varieties together for inspection.

L. A. Benton: I think it is advisable to hold the fair, for the majority of the people in this Territory will not attend the Columbian Exposition, and they certainly should be allowed an exhibition of this kind if our finances will permit.

FROM OUTSIDE SOCIETY.

of the twenty-three words of which

the state is composed, two are Ogden City, and fifteen smaller, namely: Huntsville, Parowan, North Ogden, Pleasant, Pine, Plain City, Wilcox, West Weber, Kamasville, Hooper, Riverdale and Union comprising together one of the most beautiful sections of the Rocky Mountains, and the farthest town is within a distance of ten miles from Ogden. The three remaining towns—Huntsville, Enoch and Liherville, are situated in Ogden valley, making it the most populous and most extensive town in the west. This road leads through one of the most romantic and picturesque canyons in the West, a distance from Ogden to Huntsville, the largest settlement in Ogden valley, is thirteen miles.

The boundaries of the Weber State of which we are enclosing with those of Washington, which is the second most populous and wealthy counties in Utah. Nearly everything produced on the farms, ranches, and in orchard finds a ready market at Ogden, which is a great manufacturing and wholesale and progressive business town in this section of country looks upon as the "great" "but" around which everything else in the Territory (Salt Lake City not excepted) "revolves." It has a population of 10,000 and sure enough everything in Ogden partakes of a cosmopolitan air. It possesses nearly everything in the shape of natural advantages and modern improvements that the capital of Utah can boast of, and is rapidly increasing in the vicinity. Its scientific railway system, its waterworks, its magnificent business buildings. Its well stocked stores, fine residences, extensive parks, are enough to make the Ogden valley a great place to live in.

Finally, Ogden is also the greatest railway center in Utah, as it is behind Salt Lake City in its journalistic enterprises.

The Standard (Republican) and the Post (Conservative Democratic) both daily papers are published in Ogden.

It is the only newspaper in Weber County.

It is now subdivided between the two great national parties, the Liberal party, ruled out of existence, which undoubtedly will be the case another campaign will bring in the fall of 1863.
