Progress of the work in Scandinavia.

COPENHAGEN, June 25, 1879.

Editors Deseret News:

In company with Brother P. D. S. Lund, of Sanpete Co., I arrived in this city on the morning of the 11th inst., after a pleasant and agreeable journey of just 21 days from Salt Lake City, and received a cordial welcome by President Flygare and the brethren at this office. With the exception of a short visit to the little island of Moen I have, since my arrival, been employed at this office assisting in the business pertaining to the immigration which we have just got off our hands. A company consisting of 393 souls, besides 12 returning Elders, left this port the day before yesterday bound for Utah; in England they will join the immigrating Saints from the British mission and sail from Liverpool on the 28th inst. President Flygare went with the company to Liverpool. I have for the time being been appointed to take charge of the Copenhagen Branch; it has about 400 members, being the largest branch in the mission. We have a hall here where meetings are held three times a week, and these are generally well attended by both Saints and strangers. Bro. C. C. Asmussen, of Salt Lake City, who arrived here about two weeks before me, has been appointed to preside over the Copenhagen conference.

The Scandinavian mission is altogether in a healthy and prosperous condition; considerable new ground has been broken, and especially in the Swedish conferences many have been added to the Church in such places where the Gospel never before has made any headway. Our statistical report just published, shows 408 souls baptized during the last six months, and during the past 12 months over 1,000 have been received into the Church by baptism in these lands. The total number of members in the whole mission was, previous to the immigration, about 5,300 souls. The financial affairs of the mission are also conducted in a most economical manner, which is nothing but proper, when the destitute circumstances of the Saints in these countries are considered. A great deal has been done by the Saints at home towards immigrating their poor brethren and sisters; in this respect the list for Gothenborg Conference shows that the great majority of the immigrating Saints from there have been assisted by their friends at home. Among men of means who have acted very liberally this year towards helping the poor Saints away, deserve to be mentioned Bro. H. P. Hansen, of Bornholm, and Bro. Thomas Sorensen, from Aarhus. The former assisted no less than 25 individuals to emigrate with the last company; the latter probably still more.

I feel thankful to my Heavenly Father for the privilege I again have to lift up my voice to the inhabitants of this country, bearing testimony to the truth of this work and telling them of the great things which the Lord has done and is willing to do for this generation, and although I left a dear little family and a comfortable home in the Valley, I do not feel that my lot is a hard one, or that it would have been better for me to have remained there. My desires are to do the will of God and to work diligently for the promotion of his cause upon the earth, and whether at home or abroad I shall try always to be on hand to do any labor for this purpose which the Lord and his servants may require of my hands, even to the best of my ability. My heart beats warm for the welfare of Zion and I expect to live and see it redeemed, and to behold the kingdom of our God fully established upon the earth. I am happy to say also that there seems to be a goodly number yet in these lands who are willing to listen to the word of truth, and we expect many of them in a near future, to embrace the fulness of the gospel. While some of the immigrants stayed in the city a few days previous to their departure we held a large meeting at the Socialists' Hall, the place where they had put up, on which occasion a powerful testimony was borne to a great number of strangers present, with apparently the desired effect.

FORT LIMBI, July 17th, 1879.

Near the Limbi Hotel, some portions of the wall built by the Saints yet stands, and the running stream meanders in the ditches dug by our brethren. Mine host, Mr. Nelson, raises excellent crops on the land once occupied by the Saints.

The old mill site and some of the timbers are to be seen laying round. The blacksmith's shop and forge are intact. At the graveyard of the slain by the remorseless Indians, a person vouchsafed the information that the name of this place was the name of an old man who had lived there. I corrected him, and acquainted him with the circumstance of the "Mormons" coming and their exodus, and cited the book from which the name was derived.

I have cast about some for opportunity to preach, but I find Sunday in all places where a congregation could be had, is the day of traffic, trade, cards and horse racing; alas for the eager youth, the infatuation of sin gives the pill, sweet, perhaps, in the mouth, but oh, the ultimate nauses! He is a daring one who looks the picture over of to-day and the morrow.

While I write a large band of Indians are passing decked in feathers, paints and brooches, to pay their respect to the agent for this reservation. I am told he is laying in a large quantity of flour for his 98 lodges under his care. I shall make this my head centre.
