HOT TIMES FOR RUSSIAN POLICE.

Fearing Down of Motor of the Thomas Flyer. Buffalo, N. Y., March 4.—One of the most interesting events that has taken place in automobile dreles here in some time was the tearing down of the motor of the Thomas Flyer which, during Janu-ary, broke all non-stop motor records and then made an overland trip from New York to Chicago, arriving at the lat-ter clip in time for the automobile show at the Coliseum. Prior to that ume the motor had run continuously for 21 days. 5 hours and 29 minutes or over 50 hours, breaking the previous world's record by over 30 hours, and afterward establish-ing, in the cross-country run, a record for reliability that stands alone. In addition to the officials of then E. R. Thomas Motor company, a number of members of the Automobile club of Buf-falo who were interested in seeing the condition of the motor were present. This was the first opportunity there had been for looking the engine over since it was in the Colliseum at Chicago dur-ing the show there, and at its conclusion was shipped to Buffalo where. The compression was first tested and found to be an average of 56 poinds for the four cylinders, the normal com-pression of a Flyer motor being between to and 79 pounds. many well-known people in St. Peters-burg. Amongst these papers were the details of a plot to put bombs in the houses of men and women known to sympathize with the old regime. The police had long suspected the existence of such a plot, as terror has reached a pitch hitherto unknown in Peters-burg. The man, who had refused to give 16,000 roubles for "the cause," was blown into pieces by means of an in-fernal machine, which some unknown person had vlaced in his study and

Things have got to such a state that the "Union of the Russian People" has published a circular in which they warn the revolutionaries that, for every member of their organ-ization who is assassinated, three lead-ers of the terrorists shall die. The dis-coveries in the workmens' flat in the Ochta have led to so many arrest that, though 800 political suspects were re-leased at the Russian New Year, the prisons in the city are overcrowded and the governors at their wits' end to find room for those who pour in night and day. It is worth notleing that most of these prisoners—both men and women—are about 18 and very few of them more than 24 years of age.



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
