

MUSIC AND MUSICIANS

THE echoes of Sousa's delightful concerts are still ringing in the ears of his admirers, and we shall all hope that his welcome here and elsewhere in the west may have proved sufficiently substantial to justify an early repetition of his visit.

While in California, Sousa's band broke the record at Los Angeles where it gave 12 concerts and harvested \$17,500; but, too soon of this was "dropped" at the University of California, where the band played in the Greek theater. This was the only time it had played in the open air, and it was the only time that it rained while the band was in the state. It did "rain pitchforks," scattering the audience before the concert began, wetting all the music, and creating havoc generally.

Playing this transcontinental trip,

Mr. Sousa and two daughters, Misses Pauline and Helen, accompany Mr. Sousa. They are giving a lot of American and international experiences, as for instance, retiring at midnight, and rising at 5:30 a.m. to catch the trains.

Miss Pauline is a graduate of Vassar College, and her brother Arthur is a graduate of Princeton.

Robert Clarke, Sousa's solo cornetist, has elliptical mouthpieces which so vary saves the expenditure of much time and effort. He is playing a small model cornet than when he had consequential time to not longer though it still sounds delightfully. Mr. Clarke reached "P" in the second ledger line after the staff in his solos Tuesday, and he proposes to reach the second "C" above before coming this way again.

Tom Sharpen, formerly E flat clarinet player in Sousa's band, is now bugler of the Twenty-third New York Infantry, in which position he has made a considerable reputation. Abe and Ed Levy, Salt Lake boys, formerly valued members of the clarinet section, and who played in the band of the Salt Lake City under Sousa were with him in the second ledger line, and he proposes to reach the second "C" above before coming this way again.

The lines of the Levy boys have fallen in pleasant places. Arthur, previously Sousa's solo trombonist, is in a Salt Lake boy's band, and marched with the band.

The instrumentation of the Sousa band is as follows: Three flutes, eight B flat clarinets, four second B flat clarinets, two third B flat clarinets, one alto and one bass clarinet, four saxophones, two oboes, two bassoons, three bassoons, two trumpets, four French horns, three slide trombones, two tubas, two tubas, tympani, drums and traps, one harp. One of the bassoon players was sick while the band was here, but the other man excused his end of the section in very good fashion.
