Mr. Grover presented a report from the committee on municipal corporations and towns on the petition of the City Council of Payson City, enclosing a bill containing the prayers of the petition. Read and bill tabled to be further dealt with.

On motion, the rules were suspended and C. F. No. 41, amending the charter of Payson City was read the first, second and third times, and passed.

C. F. No. 10, a bill to amend section 1, chapter 13 of the laws of 1882, was taken up on its third reading, amended and passed.

Council adjourned to 2 p. m. to-morrow.

Wednesday, Feb. 27, 1884.

Council met at 2 p. m., President Cluff in the chair.

Minutes of previous session were read, amended and approved.

The Chief Clerk read a communication from the House, enclosing H. R. No. 26, for the concurrence of the Council, and also H. F. Nos. 55, 4, 53, and C. F. Nos. 17 and 23 for their action thereon.

The resolution of the House, H. R. No. 26, Council concurring, authorizing the Auditor of Public Accounts to procure the necessary cancelling stamps to cancel the stubs of Auditors warrants after such warrants have been examined and compared with the redeemed warrants by authorized persons, was read and referred to committee on ways and means for amendment.

Mr. Hammond brought up a report from the committee on education in reference to the petition of B. A. M. Froiseth, asking for an appropriation of \$1,200 for publishing a new map of Utah Territory. The committee recommended that the petition be not granted. Received and suggestion adopted.

Wednesday, 2 p. m.

Mr. F. S. Richards presented a report from the committee on private corporations, enclosing a substitute for C. F. No. 3, relating to corporations for the purpose of raising and dealing in live stock. Received and bill tabled to come up in order.

Mr. Hammond submitted a report from the committee on private corporations on the petition of Joseph A. West, and enclosing H. F. No. 50 with amendments referring to petition. The rules having been suspended, and the bill, H. F. No. 50, providing for the purchase of 200 copies of a new and revised map of Utah Territory, was read three times and passed.

Mr. Grover brought up the report from the committee on ways and means on H. R. No. 26, amended. The amendments were adopted and the resolution concurred in.

Mr. Woolley introduced C. F. No. 43, a bill amending section 370 of the compiled laws of Utah, which was read the first and second times by title and the rules having been suspended, passed.

Mr. Hammond submitted C. F. No. 44, amending an act incorporating Logan City. Read the first time and referred to the committee on municipal corporations and towns.

Mr. Hammond also presented C. F. No. 45, amending section 213 of the compiled laws of Utah. Passed to its second reading and referred to the committee on judiciary.

The rules having been suspended, the amendments of the House to C. F. No. 23, authorizing county courts to grant licenses, were concurred in. The House amendments to C. F. No. 17, to extend the powers of incorporated cities, were also concurred in.

H. F. No. 55, a bill amending an act incorporating the City of Ephraim, in Sanpete County, was read the first time by title.

H. F. No. 4, authorizing limited partnerships, was read the first time by title and referred to the committee on judiciary.

H. F. No. 53, to amend the charter of Spanish Fork City, was read the first and second times by title and referred to municipal corporations and towns.

The Chief Clerk read a communication from the House referring to H. F. No. 50, signifying non-concurrence in Council amendments. The Council declined to recede and asked for the appointment of a joint committee of conference.

C. F. No. 43, a bill in relation to corporations for the purpose of raising and dealing in live stock, a substitute bill, was read the first time, and the rules having been suspended, was read the second and third times by title and passed.

C. F. No. 14, referring to chattel mortgages, the special order of the day, was taken up on its third reading.

Mr. Woolley moved to amend by introducing a substitute bill, and further that both bills, pending action, be referred to committee on judiciary.

The chief clerk read a communication from the House enclosing C. F. No. 39, amending sections 2,326 and 2,336, chapter 2, title 22 of the Compiled Laws. Amended. On motion the amendments were concurred in.

H. F. No. 38, amending an act incorporating Provo City, was read by title and passed.

C. F. No. 37, referring to private roads, taken up on its third reading, on

motion, was laid on the table pending further action.

C. F. No. 41, for the formation of and granting powers to private corporations, was read the third time and passed.

A communication was read from the House notifying the appointment by the Speaker of Messrs. Young and Hatch to the joint committee of conference on H. F. No. 50. The Chair appointed, on behalf of the Council, Messrs. Woolley and F. S. Richards.

Council adjourned till Thursday at 2 p. m.

Thursday, Feb. 28.

Council met at 2 p. m. President Cluff in the chair.

Minutes of previous session were read and approved.

Mr. Woolley presented a petition from E. W. Snow, of Washington County, praying to be reimbursed for losses sustained. Received and referred to the committee on public accounts.

The Chief Clerk read a communication from the Governor signifying his approval of C. F. Nos. 30 and 18. Received.

Mr. Grover submitted a report from the committee on municipal corporations and towns enclosing C. F. No. 44, and H. F. Nos. 54 and 55, recommending their passage. Received and bill laid on the table, to come up in its order.

Mr. F. S. Richards, for the committee on judiciary, presented a report on C. F. No. 45, without amendment, recommending its passage. Received and tabled to be further dealt with.

Mr. F. S. Richards also submitted, from the same committee, C. F. No. 14, with the proposed substitute, recommending the adoption of the latter. Read and bills laid on the table, to be further dealt with.

HOUSE.

A communication was received from the Auditor of Public Accounts, enclosing a financial statement of public accounts. Referred to the committee on claims, etc.

A communication was received from the same official giving notice of the employment of legal assistance and asking for an appropriation of \$1,000 to cover the expense of the same. Referred to the committee on claims and public accounts.

A communication was received from the clerk of the Third Judicial Court, giving notice that the case of F. E. Tremaine was the only one, where forfeiture of bonds had been made, etc., for the years 1882 and 1883. Referred to the committee on ways and means, with instructions to report a bill providing for the payment of fines, etc.

A communication was received from the Council giving notice of the concurrence of that body in C. F. No. 3, relative to toy pistols, and C. F. No. 34, relative to the Territorial legislative representation.

A communication was received from the Council giving notice of the passage of C. F. No. 17, and C. F. No. 35.

C. F. No. 35, a bill amending section 2006 of the Compiled Laws of Utah was read the first time and the second time by its title, and placed on file for its third reading.

C. F. No. 17, a bill to extend the power in corporations, was read the first time and the second time by its title. Referred to the committee on municipal corporations and towns.

C. F. No. 23, a bill authorizing County Court to grant licenses was read the first time and the second time by its title, and referred to the committee on judiciary.

C. F. No. 8, a bill amending an act incorporating the city of Richmond, Cache County, was read the first time and the second time by its title, and referred to the committee on municipal corporations and towns.

Mr. Houston presented a petition from citizens of Garfield County, asking for an appropriation of \$500, to open a new road in said county, also for an appropriation of \$1,500, in addition to repair other roads. Referred to the committee on highways.

Mr. Hatch, for the committee on judiciary, to whom was referred H. F. No. 43, a bill relating to procedure in Probate Courts, reported the same back and recommended its passage. Adopted.

The committee on municipal corporations and towns, to whom was referred H. F. No. 36, a bill to incorporate Park City, reported the bill back concurring in the Council amendments and recommended that the same be put upon its passage as amended. Adopted.

The committee on agriculture to whom was referred H. F. No. 46, a bill to prevent the destruction of stock by dogs reported adversely thereto. Adopted.

Mr. Boyden, from the special committee relative to auditors warrants, reported that they had examined said warrants to the amount of \$307,669.05, and finding them correct, the same had been destroyed. Adopted.

H. F. No. 54, a bill making an appropriation for furnishing the Insane Asylum, was read the first time by its title and placed on file. The bill appropriates \$51,697.48.

Mr. Rider offered a concurrent resolution authorizing the Auditor to procure two cancelling stamps. Laid on the table till to-morrow.

H. F. No. 4, a bill authorizing limited partnerships, passed its second reading.

H. F. No. 50, a bill providing for the purchase of 200 copies of a new and revised sectional and topographical map of Utah Territory was taken up on its

third reading and passed. Ayes 18, nays 2.

H. F. No. 52, authorizing Provo School District No. 1, to issue bonds for the purpose of building a school house, was read the third time and passed. Ayes 18, nays 1.

H. F. No. 54, the bill relative to appropriating money to the Insane Asylum, was read the third time and passed. Ayes 16, nays 4.

Mr. Anderson submitted a report of the committee on highways, asking the House to reconsider the petition of citizens of Emery County for appropriations for road and bridge purposes. Report adopted and petition recommitted.

Mr. Peery offered a resolution calling on the auditor to show wherein there was a discrepancy of \$15,178.54 between the warrants and the showing in the Governor's message. Resolution laid on the table until the 28th inst.

Adjourned at 4.30 till 2 p. m. to-morrow.

2 p. m. Feb. 26, 1884.

A message was received from the Council giving notice of concurrence in H. F. 36 amendments to Park City charter. Also that H. F. No. 45, amending the city charter of Salt Lake City, had been passed in the Council. Also that the Council had passed C. F. 33, a bill prescribing qualifications of office-holders and electors. The bill was read the first time by its title and ordered printed and referred to the committee on elections.

A communication was received from the Auditor of Public Accounts, enclosing information asked for in relation to the discrepancy of \$15,178.54 between the warrants and the showing in the Governor's message. Referred to the committee on ways and means.

A communication was received from the Territorial Treasurer, giving information in relation to the discrepancy mentioned in the Auditor's letter. Referred to the committee on ways and means.

Mr. Farnsworth presented a petition from James Fahr and others, asking the Legislature to restrain the Auditor from bringing suit against them for delinquent taxes, etc. Referred to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Young presented a petition from the officers of the County Court of Salt Lake County, relative to revenue and taxation in the county, and asking for an act to regulate the license of merchants, peddlers, etc., etc. Referred to the committee on ways and means.

Mr. Houston presented a petition from citizens of Garfield County, asking for a change of the county line of Garfield and Iron Counties. Referred to the committee on counties.

Mr. Thurman, for the committee on municipal corporations and towns, to whom was referred the petition of citizens of Ephraim, in relation to the city charter of Ephraim, and H. F. No. 49, in relation to the city charter of Fillmore city, H. F. No. 53, in relation to the city charter of Spanish Fork City, and C. F. No. 17, Reported favorably to each and recommended that the petition be granted, and that the several bills be put upon their passage. Adopted.

The committee on claims and public accounts reported favorably to petition No. 4.

The committee on judiciary to whom was referred C. F. No. 23, reported the same back with amendments and recommended it be put upon its passage as amended. Adopted.

Mr. Snow, for the committee on manufacture and commerce, to whom was referred the report of Arthur Stayner, relative to the sugar industry in Utah, recommended that 1,500 copies of said report be printed for general distribution. Adopted.

H. F. No. 55, a bill amending an act incorporating Ephraim City, was read the first time and placed on file.

Mr. Stanford introduced H. F. No. — a bill for the protection of animals by the use of barbed wire fences, etc. Referred to the committee on agriculture.

The resolution offered on Monday relative to the authority given the auditor to procure cancelling stamps, was read and adopted.

H. F. No. 55, a bill to amend an act incorporating the city of Ephraim, was read the second time by sections. The rules were suspended and the bill read the third time by its title and passed—Ayes 22, nays 0.

H. F. No. 15, a bill to authorize the incorporation of companies for the construction of union railroad stations and depots, was read the second time by its title and placed on file for its third reading.

H. F. No. 4, a bill authorizing limited partnerships, was brought up for its third reading by sections, several amendments being offered and adopted, it was passed. Ayes 22, nays 0.

H. F. 53, a bill amending city charter of Spanish Fork City was read the third time, and passed. Ayes 21, nays 0.

H. F. No. 49, a bill to amend the charter of Fillmore City was made a special order for Friday the 29th inst.

C. F. No. 17, a bill to extend the powers of incorporated cities was read the third time and passed unanimously.

C. F. No. 23, a bill authorizing County Courts to grant licenses was read the third time by sections. Amendments being offered it was passed as amended; ayes 19, nays 3.

Adjourned at 4.20 till 2 p. m. Wednesday.

Feb. 27, 2 p. m.

A communication was received from the Council giving notice of the passage of H. F. No. 33 and H. F. No. 37, C. F. No. 1, C. F. No. 26 and C. F. No. 10, and the concurrence in House amendments to C. F. No. 12.

H. F. No. 37, relating to the fish commissioner, was read and ordered enrolled.

C. F. No. 1, a bill amending an act incorporating Kaysville City, was read the first time and second time by its title, and referred to the committee on municipal corporations and towns.

C. F. No. 26, a bill providing for recording the pedigree of stock, was read the first time and second time by its title, and referred to the committee on agriculture.

C. F. No. 10, a bill amending section 1, chapter 10 of the laws of Utah of 1882, was read the first and second times and referred to the committee on agriculture.

Mr. Houston presented a remonstrance from the citizens of Iron County petitioning against the change of county line between Garfield and Iron counties. Referred to the committee on counties.

Also a petition from citizens of San Juan County asking for an appropriation of \$3,000, to be expended in improving the Colorado River. Referred to the committee on highways. Also a petition from citizens at Panguitch, asking for an act incorporating said town as a city. Referred to the committee on municipal corporations and towns.

Also a petition from L. H. Reid, Jr., Assessor and Collector of San Juan County, asking relief in the sum of \$46. Referred to committee on claims and public account.

Mr. Morgan presented a petition from Jesse W. Fox, asking \$1,200 for services rendered as surveyor. Referred to committee on claims and public accounts.

Mr. Young for the committee on public health, to whom was referred C. F. No. 21, a bill to regulate the practice of medicine and selling of medicines, reported favorably and recommended its passage. Adopted.

Also H. F. No. 16, a bill to regulate the selling of poisons; and H. F. No. 14, a bill relating to practising physicians, reported adversely thereto, and recommended that they do not pass. Adopted.

The committee on highways to whom was referred the petition of citizens of Piute county, reported adversely thereon. Adopted.

Mr. Hatch, for the committee on judiciary to whom was referred C. F. No. 39, a bill amending certain sections of the laws of Utah, reported the same back with amendments and recommended its passage. Adopted.

The committee on claims and public accounts to whom was referred the claim of the DESERET NEWS COMPANY, \$43.00, reported the account as just and recommended the allowance of same. Report adopted and the committee on appropriations so instructed.

Mr. Howell offered H. F. No. 57, a bill to amend an act incorporating Wells-ville City, which was read the first and second time and referred to committee on municipal corporations and towns.

Mr. Rider offered H. F. No. 58, a bill to amend section 5, chapter 8 of the laws of 1882, which was read the first time, and the second time by its title, and referred to the committee on judiciary.

H. F. No. 15, a bill authorizing the incorporation of companies for the construction of union railroad stations and depots, was, upon motion of Mr. Creer, made a special order for Monday, March 3d.

C. F. No. 39, a bill amending sections 2326 and 2336 of the compiled laws of Utah, relating to payment of fines by imprisonment, etc., was read the third time by sections and passed unanimously.

H. F. No. 46, a bill to prevent the destruction of animals by dogs, was read the third time by sections and lost. Ayes 11, nays 12.

A message was received from the Council asking that a committee of conference be appointed in reference to H. F. No. 50, in relation to purchasing maps for Territory.

Messrs. Young and Hatch were appointed as the conference committee from the House.

Adjourned at 3:45 till to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

A communication was received from the Council giving notice that Messrs. Woolley and F. S. Richards had been appointed on committee of conference in relation to H. F. No. 50.

Mr. Rider presented a petition from citizens of Kane County asking appropriation of \$1,000 for building of Roads. Referred to the committee on highways.

Mr. Hatch for the committee on judiciary to whom was referred H. F. 58 a bill amending Sec. 5 chapter 28, of the session laws of 1882, reported bill back and recommended its passage. Adopted.

Mr. Stanford for committee on elections to whom was referred C. F. No. 33 reported same back and recommended its passage. Adopted.

Committee on agriculture to whom was referred H. F. No. 20, relative to branding stock, reported it back favorably, and recommended its passage. Adopted.

Mr. Anderson, for the committee on highways, to whom was referred a petition from citizens of Emery county, asking an appropriation of \$2,000 for building of bridges. Also a petition from citizens of Box Elder county,

asking for an appropriation of \$3,500 for the building of roads, recommended that the petitions be granted. Adopted.

Committee on claims and public accounts, to whom was referred the auditors tabular statement of accounts, recommended that 500 copies of the same be printed. Adopted.

Mr. Hatch introduced H. F. No. 59, a bill concerning insurance corporations. Referred to committee on judiciary.

Mr. Francis introduced H. F. No. 60, a bill to amend section 1, chapter 18 of the laws of 1882. Referred to committee on elections.

H. F. No. 43 was brought up for its third reading and made a special order for to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

The committee of conference relative to H. F. No. 50, a bill providing for the purchase of maps for the Territory, reported that they concurred with the Council amendments to said bill. Not adopted.

Mr. Webb offered a joint resolution, that 200 copies of the biennial report of the directors of the Insane Asylum be printed for distribution. Adopted.

Mr. Francis moved for a recess until 2 p. m. Carried.

In the Senate committee on claims: to-day Senator Jackson, for the sub-committee, reported favorably the bill for the relief of the Citizens' National Bank, of New Orleans. The claim is for \$250,000, money taken by General Butler.
