Strikers Attempted to Resist When Volley Was Fired-Armories Full Of Imprisoned Rowdies

City of Mexico, Jan. 8 .- Belated reports from the mill district of Orizaba, in the state of Vera Cruz, where rioting has attended the strike of the textile workers, indicate that the government is in control. It was necessary for the troops to fire. Thirty dead have been counted, while more than 80 are reported to have been wounded. It is believed that the strike has been broken

gar Matchin-against whom nearly ev-ery negro soldier at the post enter-tains a personal grudge as a result of the affair at Brownsville, Tex., and the discharge of the negro soldiers that fol-lowed-then proceeding down the list of officers, became known today as a result of the preliminary hearing in the case of Edward L. Knowles, corporal of company A, Twenty-fifth infantry, who was found probably guilty of as-sault, with intent to kill Capt. Macklin of company C, Twenty-fifth infantry, on the night of Dec. 21. Knowles was bound over to await the action of the Canadian, county grand jury at the spring term of the court. All the officers now go heavily armed and protected throughout the night. Every effort has been made by the officers at the post to keep the alleged conspiracy a secret, but it is learned that an investigation is now being con-ducted at several army posts and im-portant places through the country, and within a short time several arrests of members of the troops recently dis-charged in disgrace are expected to follow. ported to nave been wonned. It is be-lieved that the strike has been broken.
After pillaging the stores at the Rio Blanco mills a body of the strikers rushed to Nogales, a short distance away, where another mill is located.
Teiegraph, telephone and clectric light wires were cut, and pawnshops and even private houses were fillaged, Jalls were thrown open and the prisoners set free. Residents of the mill district fied in terror to Orizaba.
When the strikers reached Nogales one mill official and gens d'armes from Orizaba made an ineffectual attempt to check them. A striker severely wound-ed Senor Herrera, mayor of Orizaba, with a huge stone. Herrera arose from where he had fallen and killed his as-saliant. A body of troops arrived, and as the strikers attempted to resist a volley was fired into the mob, killing 30 and wounding over 80. After this the mob was scattered. A body of 700 collected on a railroad track and held for several hours the train. Final-ly solders arrived and charged this crowd with broadswords, scattering the strikers.

In another cell in the same bastile is her youthful husband, Roy Kyle, against whom a com-plaint has been filed churging him with kidnaping. The couple eloped from Como yesterday and came to this city, where they obtained a marriage license and were married by a justice of the peace, the girl representing herself as being is years of age, while her lover, who is said to be not more than 19. asserted that he was 21. After the ceremony in the justice's office the couple went to a hotel, where they were found later by the sheriff, after word and been received from Hamilton that the girl's father had preferred charges against his son-in-law. The girl-wife took her ar-rest and that of her husband cooly and

## Senate Leaders Trying to Bring About

Washington, Jan. 8.—Practically all of today was given over by senate leaders of both parties to an effort to bring about harmony between opposed ing views concerning the proposed in-vostigation of the affray at Brownsville. Tex. What amounts to an agreement between Senators Foraker and Lodge has been attained by their friends, but inasmuch as it was decided not to pre-sent the compromise until all of the senators desiring to do so had made speeches on the subject of the dismissal of the negro troops, it is not absolutely certain that the peace plans will not be upset.

The compromise is not greatly dif-ferent from the resolution presented by Senator Lodge and a similar resolu-tion which Senator Foraker had intend-to offer as a substitute for his original resolution. It provides for the inves-tigation by the senate committee on military affairs of the affray at Browns-ville and to this is to be added pro-visions that a sub-committee be sent to Brownsville and that the expenses of the investigation be paid out of the contingent fund of the senate. Such a resolution would ignore the constitu-tional and legal questions that have been debated for several days. Senator Lodge declares that he is sat-isfied with the program and Senator Foraker says he is not particular about the method so long as an investigation is erdered and a committee sent to stuation now is said to be the same as it was before the speech of Senator Lodge yesterday. ## STEALING COAL.

#### Citizens of North Yakima Capture and Confiscate a Trainload of It.

North Yakima, Wash., Jan. S .- A train loaded with coal was raided at the station here today by citizens without fuel and almost 20 cars were carried off. An attempt was made first to hold up a train north of the city. The engineer started to pull out of town when the levers holding the false bottoms of the coal cars were pulled out and the coal let down on the tracks. This blocked the road, and it was several hours fe-fore it was cleared. More than 1,500 people got coal during the raid. Hundreds have been without fuel for days with zero weather prevailing. Tel-egrams sent to Vice President Levy at Tacoma by the mayor, sheriff and chief of police, were not answered till too late to avoid the raid.
