

THE SHAH OF PERSIA IS DEAD

Death Comes When European Governments Are Engaged in A Struggle Over Persia.

WAS A PICTURESQUE RULER.

He Was Strongly Pro-Russian—German Has Been Extending Her Influence in the Country.

Teheran, Persia, Jan. 9.—Official announcement of the death of the shah at 11 o'clock last night was made at 9 o'clock this morning from the office of the grand vizier.

London, Jan. 9.—A telegram from Teheran sent last night at 11:55 o'clock says:

"The shah of Persia died this evening, though no public announcement of the fact will be made until tomorrow (Wednesday)."

"It was evident yesterday (Monday), that the end was rapidly approaching, and the women of the palace began preparations for mourning. During the night the shah's condition grew steadily worse. This was the sign that all was over."

"The news of the shah's death reached the foreign ministers late this evening, but the public is still unaware of his majesty's end."

The death of the shah removes a picturesque ruler who was well known to all Europe, owing to his frequent visits, particularly to France, where he took "cures" at Contrexeville and enjoyed the pleasures of Parisian life. During the visit of the shah and his suite the city was a scene of brilliant and brilliant appearance on the boulevards and in the music halls of Paris. They were treated as national guests and given a truly royal welcome. The shah's death was a great loss to Persia, and his death was a great loss to Persia.

At the same time Germany has been extending her influence in Persia. German physicians and engineers have been working in Persia, and the German project of a Bagdad railway promises to give a new route to India.

BROWNSVILLE AFFAIR.
Senate Leaders Trying to Bring About Harmony of Views.

Washington, Jan. 8.—Practically all of the day was given over by senate leaders of both parties to an effort to bring about harmony between opposing views concerning the proposed investigation of the affair at Brownsville, Tex. What amount to an agreement between Senators Foraker and Lodge has been attained by their friends, but inasmuch as it was decided not to present the compromise until all of the senators desiring to do so have made speeches on the subject of the dismissal of the negro troops, it is not absolutely certain that the peace plans will not be upset.

The compromise is not greatly different from the resolution presented by Senator Lodge and a similar resolution which Senator Foraker had intended to offer as a substitute for his original resolution. It provides for the investigation by the senate committee on Brownsville and to this is added provisions that a sub-committee be sent to Brownsville and that the expenses of the investigation be paid out of the resolution fund of the senate. Such a resolution would ignore the constitutional and legal questions that have been debated for several days.

Senator Lodge declares that he is satisfied with the program and Senator Foraker says he is not particular about the method so long as an investigation is ordered and a committee sent to Brownsville to take testimony. The situation now is said to be the same as it was before the speech of Senator Lodge yesterday.

Both sides were then willing to leave out the constitutional questions and they had been ignored in the substitute offered by Senator Lodge. Unless the

St. Paul, Jan. 8.—The Republican members of the Minnesota legislature in caucus this evening nominated re-elected Senator Nelson to succeed himself. This is equivalent to election on Jan. 22, as the Republicans are in overwhelming majority.

MABELLE TO WED COREY.

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—Charles H. Gilman, father of Mabelle Gilman, famous because of attention she has received from William E. Corey, will start early next week to attend the wedding of the actress and Carnegie's young partner.

The little party is only waiting for a telegram from Paris telling them whether the wedding will take place in the new palace at Paris which Corey has presented to his fiancée, or in the New York mansion of the Pittsburgh millionaire.

MAY CHARGE DOUBLE FARE.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 8.—The court of appeals today decided in favor of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit company the case involving the right of that company to charge a double fare (10 cents) from central points in Brooklyn to Coney Island.

BIG FIRE IN DETROIT.

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 8.—Fire destroyed the major portion of the Michigan stove works, on Jefferson avenue, tonight, causing a loss estimated at \$750,000. The plant covered an area of 10 or 12 acres. The office building, and foundries and part of the storage building were saved. A fire department team dashed into the throng watching the fire and injured many. An unidentified man is dying at St. Mary's hospital, with his skull crushed by the horse's hooves. Joseph E. Tack is in a critical condition, with a fractured skull; Mrs. Joseph E. Tack, his wife, has a broken thigh, and two men, Dickson and Brady, have injuries which, while painful, will not prove fatal.

STEALING COAL.

Citizens of North Yakima Capture and Confiscate a Trainload of It.

North Yakima, Wash., Jan. 8.—A train loaded with coal was raided at the station here today by citizens without fuel and almost 20 cars were carried off. An attempt was made first to hold up a train north of the city. The engineer started to pull out of town when the levers holding the false bottoms of the coal cars were pulled out and the coal let down on the tracks. This blocked the road, and it was several hours before it was cleared. More than 1,500 people got coal during the raid.

Hundreds have been without fuel for days with zero weather prevailing. Telegrams sent to President Leary at Tacoma by the mayor, sheriff and chief of police, were not answered till too late to avoid the raid. Citizens have taken the matter into their own hands and organized to hold up any coal train that attempted to pass here without leaving fuel.

GOODING LIBEL SUIT.

Preliminary Hearing of R. S. Sheridan Held, Case Taken Under Advisement.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 8.—Today before Magistrate Dunbar the preliminary hearing of R. S. Sheridan, manager of the Evening Capital News, was held and the matter was taken under advisement. This is the case brought on a charge of criminal libel in which Gov. Gooding is the complainant. The particular publication complained of was one in which it was stated that "Gooding and graft had become synonymous terms." Part of the day was occupied in hearing a demurrer.

The attorneys for the defense contended that the complaint did not charge a crime and that the term "graft" applied as in this instance was not libelous. The court overruled the demurrer. There was only one witness put on the stand, M. M. Poik, who was editor of the paper at the time of the

TO MURDER WHITE OFFICERS

Those at Fort Reno Believe Conspiracy Exists Among Colored Troops for That Purpose.

THEY NOW GO HEAVILY ARMED

Every Effort Has Been Made to Keep Alleged Plot a Secret—Investigation Is Proceeding.

El Reno, Okla., Jan. 8.—Belief of the army officers at Fort Reno that conspiracy to murder every white officer at Fort Reno, beginning with Capt. Edgar Macklin—against whom nearly every negro soldier at the post entertains a personal grudge as a result of the affair at Brownsville, Tex., and the discharge of the negro soldiers that followed—then proceeding down the list of officers, became known today as a result of the preliminary hearing in the case of Edward L. Knowles, corporal of company A, Twenty-fifth infantry, who was found probably guilty of assault with intent to kill Capt. Macklin on the night of Dec. 21. Knowles was bound over to await the action of the grand jury at the spring term of the court.

All the officers now go heavily armed and protected throughout the night. Every effort has been made by the officers at the post to keep the alleged conspiracy a secret, but it is learned that an investigation is now being conducted at several army posts and important places through the country, and within a short time several arrests of members of the troops recently discharged in disgrace are expected to follow.

Information was received here tonight that the arrest of a negro soldier had been made at La Junta, Colo., today. Suspicion rests upon the members of the troop at Fort Niobrara, Neb., and at three other points. The arrest of these men has been postponed until the hearing in the case of C. R. Knowles, which concluded today at Fort Reno, when it was hoped that some further information would be secured tending to implicate other persons in this alleged conspiracy.

DIXON WILL SUCCEED CLARK.

Helena, Mont., Jan. 8.—The election of Congressman Joseph M. Dixon to the United States senate to succeed Senator Clark was assured this evening at a caucus of the Republican members of the legislature, giving him 49 votes to 22 for former Senator Lee Mantle, of Butte. Federal Judge William H. Hunt was given one vote. Mr. Dixon was placed in nomination by Representative T. C. Marshall, of Missoula, a townsman of the congressman.

FOLK REPRIEVES MRS. MYERS.

Jefferson City, Mo., Jan. 8.—To prevent complications should the supreme court of the United States decide to grant Mrs. Aggie Myers, now under death sentence for the murder of her husband, a new trial, Gov. Folk tonight issued a reprieve for 90 days.

THIRTY KILLED, EIGHTY WOUNDED

Mexican Troops Fire on Rioting Textile Workers at Orizaba.

RIOTERS THREW OPEN JAILS.

Strikers Attempted to Resist When Volley Was Fired—Armories Full of Imprisoned Rioters.

City of Mexico, Jan. 8.—Belated reports from the mill district of Orizaba, in the state of Vera Cruz, where rioting has attended the strike of the textile workers, indicate that the government is in control. It was necessary for the troops to fire. Thirty dead have been counted, while more than 80 are reported to have been wounded. It is believed that the strike has been broken.

After pillaging the stores at the Rio Blanco mill a body of the strikers rushed to Nogales, a short distance away, where another mill is located. Telegraph, telephone and electric light wires were cut, and pawnshops and even private houses were pillaged. Jails were thrown open and the prisoners set free. Residents of the mill district fled in terror to Orizaba.

When the strikers reached Nogales one mill official and gens d'armes from Orizaba made an ineffectual attempt to check them. A striker severely wounded, Senor Herrera, mayor of Orizaba, with a huge stone, Herrera arose from where he had fallen and killed his assailant. A body of troops arrived, and the strikers attempted to resist. A volley was fired into the mob, killing 30 and wounding over 80. After this the mob was scattered. A body of 700 collected on a railroad track and held for several hours the train. Finally soldiers arrived and charged this crowd with broadswords, scattering the strikers.

The jails and armories are filled with imprisoned rioters.

The government has learned that a committee of strikers has left Orizaba for Tlaxcala, Puebla and other cities to incite laborers at these points to strike.

FIGHT ON SENATOR BAILEY.

Austin, Tex., Jan. 8.—The Texas legislature convened today. Gov. elect Campbell will be installed next week and a successor to Senator Bailey is to be elected.

The fight made on Senator Bailey and the understanding that a legislative investigation will be made into his alleged connection with certain oil interests has added interest to the situation.

BRIDE AND GROOM SPEND HONEYMOON IN JAIL.

Missoula, Mont., Jan. 8.—Ethel Hoyt, the 14-year-old daughter of a well known rancher near Como, in Ravalli county, is spending the first day of her honeymoon in the county jail in this city. In another cell in the same building is her youthful husband, Roy Kyle, against whom a complaint has been filed charging him with kidnapping.

The couple eloped from Como yesterday and came to this city, where they obtained a marriage license and were married by a justice of the peace, the girl representing herself as being 18 years of age, while her lover, who is said to be not more than 18, asserted that he was 21.

After the ceremony in the justice's office the couple went to a hotel, where they were found later by the sheriff, after word had been received from Hamilton that the girl's father had preferred charges against his son-in-law. The girl-wife took her arrest and that of her husband coolly and

said that not even prison bars could separate her from her husband for very long. The couple will be returned to Hamilton tomorrow by the father of the girl and the sheriff of Ravalli county.

ACTION ON CORTELYOU'S NOMINATION POSTPONED.

Washington, Jan. 8.—At the request of Senators Teller and Daniels, the senate committee on finance today postponed for one week action on the nomination of Postmaster-General Cortelyou to be secretary of the treasury. They did not announce whether they would continue their opposition to his confirmation now that he has resigned the chairmanship of the Republican national committee.

In making his request that action on the Cortelyou nomination be postponed for a week, Senator Teller said that the finance committee had nothing but newspaper statements to show that the postmaster-general has resigned the management of the Republican national committee. He thought that Mr. Cortelyou should communicate the fact that he had severed his connection, which if confirmed would make him objectionable to many senators for the position of secretary of the treasury. Republican members assented to the suggestion made by Senator Teller.

It was said on the floor of the senate today that a petition would be circulated among members of the Republican national committee asking the members to act on Mr. Cortelyou's resignation as chairman and to elect a successor. This plan is supported by opponents to the action of Mr. Cortelyou in designating Vice Chairman New of Indiana to serve as chairman.

Curing the Bad Boy.

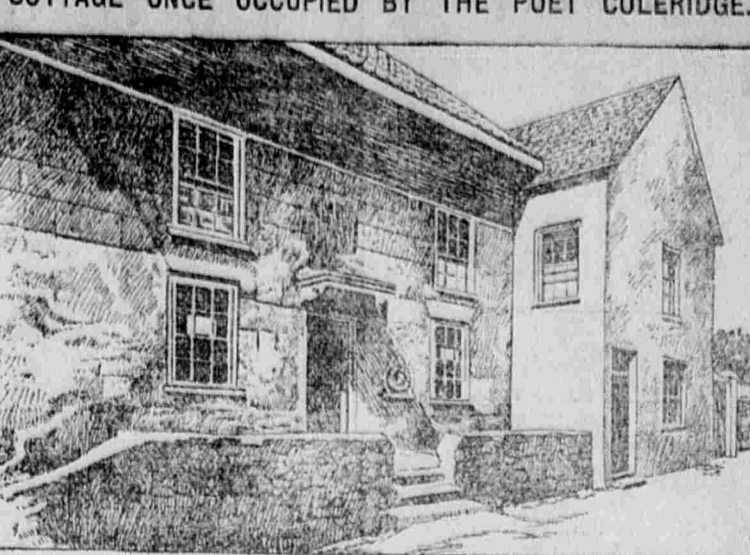
