

the harsh measures sanctioned by the former to conscript the natives.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 31.—Grand Vizier Kheireddin Pasha, as a counter project to that of the mixed occupants of Eastern Roumelia, proposes that the occupation be entrusted to Turkish regular troops, the powers to appoint a governor, who shall be under the control of the international commission. In case his proposal is not accepted, the Grand Vizier will insist that the Turkish regulars shall form a majority of the occupying corps, each power to contribute 250 men.

ST. PETERSBURG, 31.—Forty-five persons were arrested the night after the attempt on the life of Gen. Von Drentelin, chief general of the D'Amee. Some were of such high ranks that they were not sent to the common prison. They include officers, guards, court chamberlains and two daughters of a prominent minister.

A committee has been appointed to inquire into the causes of the deaths of 200 of the 500 inmates of the Charkoff central prison, within four months.

LAHORE, 31.—Two thousand Afghans attacked a small detachment of British in Pishin Valley and were defeated with a loss of 60 killed. No casualties among the British.

VIENNA, 31.—The New Free Press reports that Bismarck has arranged for the occupation of the interior of Eastern Roumelia by Austrian, English and Italian troops; the northern boundary by Russian, and the southern boundary by Turkish troops.

LONDON, 1.—Austria, England, Russia, Turkey and Italy have consented to take part in the mixed occupation of eastern Roumelia. Italy, however, has made some reservation. There will be no commander-in-chief. Each nationality will have its own commander. The sole object of occupation will be to prevent any conflict between the Turks and Bulgarians.

The House of Lords last night, ordered a compilation of the quantities of meat imported monthly from the United States from Feb., 1873, to Jan., 1879.

A St. Petersburg correspondent learns, upon good authority, that dispatches were telegraphed on Sunday directing the stoppage of all preparations for the expedition to Merv until further orders.

The latest telegrams from Madrid say the condition of the Princess Christina is nearly hopeless.

The Chartered Mercantile Bank of India, London and China is unable to pay a further dividend for the 7th, and the whole reserve, £151,560, will be absorbed in covering the losses and providing for special contingencies.

The Times recommends the creditors of the City of Glasgow Bank to accept 15 shillings on the pound. It says the promised call of £2,250 per share portend ruin to nearly every shareholder.

Lord Beaconsfield, on Friday, will receive a deputation from the Liverpool chamber of commerce on the silver question.

ST. PETERSBURG, 1.—A special committee, under the presidency of the minister of war, has been appointed to consider the Kuldja question.

General Metakoff telegraphs that he has completed the burning of infected houses in Wellianki.

PARIS, 1.—A battalion of Zouaves and skirmishers, on their way from Aumail to Baghar, Algeria, was caught between Sanaks and Sankeltett, on the 28th of March, in a snow storm, and 19 men perished. Fourteen others are in the hospital.

ROME, 1.—Gen. Garibaldi has written a letter deprecating the proposed colonizing expedition to New Guinea. He advises the projectors instead to hold themselves in readiness to complete the greatness and unity of Italy.

A Determined Suicide.

OGDEN CITY,
March 30, 1879.

Editors Deseret News:

A week ago yesterday, J. S. Mearns, known as "Doc. Mearns," who kept a provision store on Fifth Street, took a dose of laudanum, with the intention of ending this earthly existence. But the meddling physicians, against the expressed wishes of "Doc" to the

contrary, interfered and prevented the drug from proving fatal in its operations. He was closely watched, and it was thought he had given up the intention of self-destruction.

Yesterday morning, he went to the U. C. Depot, and just as a train started for your city, he threw himself on the rails in front of the engine; the latter was stopped and "Doc" was again rescued. Mr. Cole Sudlam afterwards had a long talk with him—they "took a drink" together, and it was again thought that Mearns had become reconciled to the waywardness of the wicked world, and had concluded to live in it the remainder of his natural life.

But about three o'clock, yesterday afternoon he left his home secretly, and this time forever. He went to the Weber (R. R.) bridge, where he took off his hat, coat and shoes, jumped into the river, floated down stream to Robbins' Dam, where he sank into a deep watery grave. Several boys who saw him commit the rash act, gave the alarm, but all attempts to recover the body have, up to this writing, proved fruitless.

A number of causes have been assigned for his self-destruction, among which is domestic infelicity. It is also stated that while in Montana he committed a nameless crime, for which he was given a few hours to leave that country. He left and came to Ogden. Recently he has feared that justice was about to overtake him, and thus he would suffer condign punishment. This preyed so much upon his mind that he determined to put an end to his life. He did it. Editors Deseret News:

I left Ogden City on the 12th of November, 1878, in company with twelve missionaries, the majority of them for the United States, and had a pleasant trip to Omaha. Elders C. S. Lee and R. S. Miles came with us to this State, arriving here on the 16th. Elder Miles left for Ohio, on the 18th, his field of labor, visiting his relatives and bearing testimony to the gospel to all he had an opportunity so to do, was received very kindly by his relatives. Finding no opening for preaching there, he returned here on the 10th of February. Elder Lee is traveling in this county. I have been traveling in different parts of this State, visiting my relatives and friends, doing all I could in fireside preaching. Returning here on the 15th of February, met with Elders Lee and Miles, and we are laboring together in the ministry; have held nine public meetings in this part of the vineyard up to date.

Doc. E. Lee, brother of Charles Lee, 81 years old, died on the 20th of November, 1878; he was a member of the Church. In our labors we feel that we have allayed some prejudice and disabused the minds of those whom we have visited, and scattered the seed of the gospel among them in hopes that it may bring some unto eternal life. But the people seem to be asleep, and at ease. Infidelity seems to take the lead, still we feel to rely on the arm of Jehovah for strength, wisdom, power, faith, and knowledge to assist and direct us in our future labors, desiring to be humble and faithful to our calling and fill our missions honorably unto the Lord and our brethren and co-workers with them in establishing the kingdom of God on the earth.

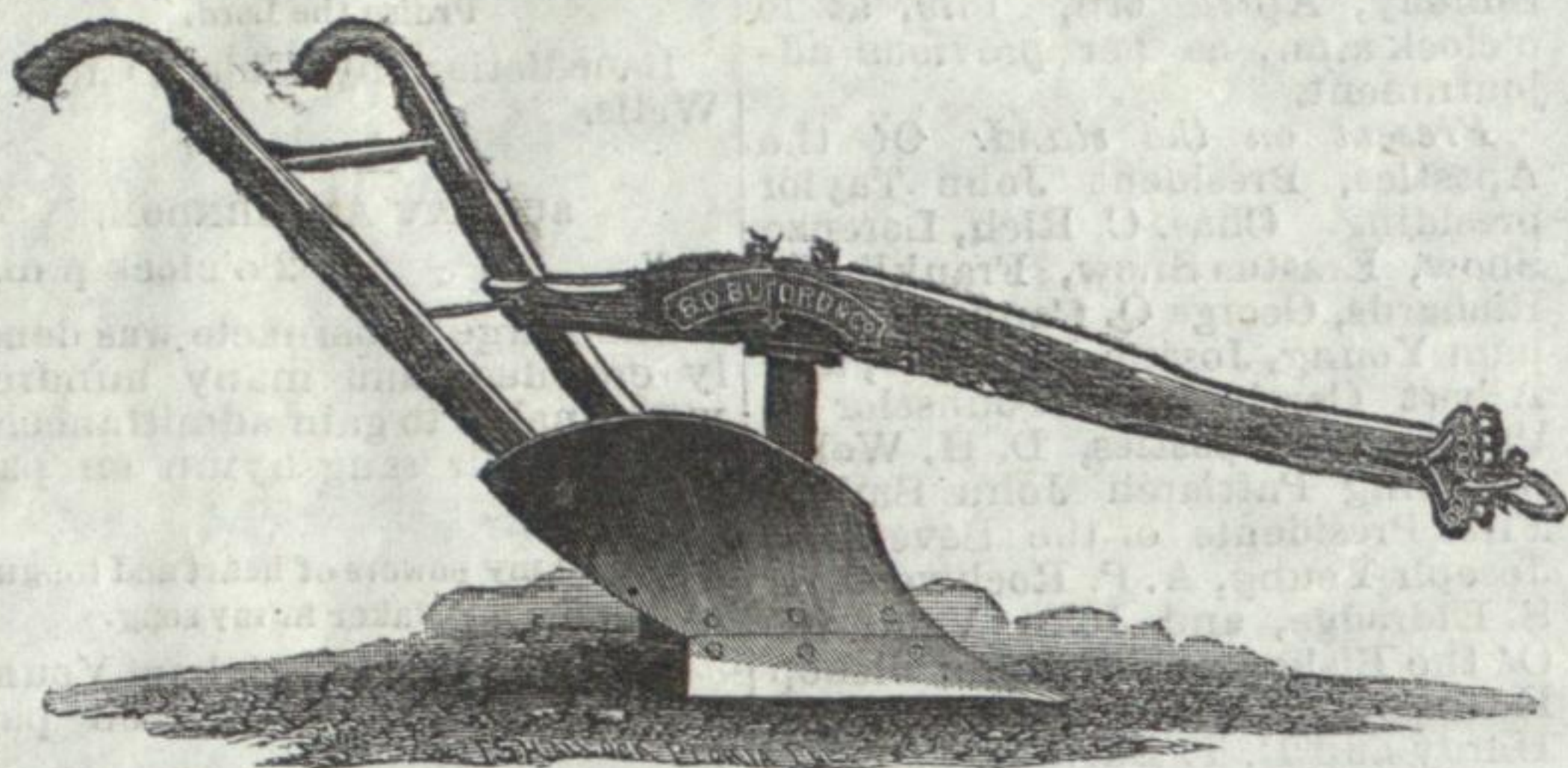
