

## PEOPLE HOLD MASS MEETINGS.

Several held in Philadelphia to Protest Against the Proposed Gas Lease.

### FIGHT AGAINST DESPOTISM.

Pledge Their Lives, Liberty and Sacred Honor to Overthrow Despotic Methods in Municipal Affairs.

Philadelphia, May 26.—"The situation is growing brighter every minute," said Mayor Weaver late today. He would not give figures nor go into other details, but contented himself with saying he had received assurances from many councilmen who had voted for the gas lease last week that they would support him in his veto. Leaders of the Republican organization, which is advocating the lease, continue to remain silent. There are, however, signs that several councilmen are breaking away under tremendous pressure from their constituents, and will probably go along with the mayor.

The all-absorbing point of interest is whether the mayor will succeed in getting enough votes to defeat the bill when it shall come up next Thursday for passage over his veto. The organization still stands on its statement that it will pass the ordinance in spite of his disapproval.

The record up to this evening shows that the mayor has 19 select councilmen and 26 members of the common council with him. In select council there are 42 members. To pass the ordinance over the mayor's veto needs 25 votes, and the mayor 11 to sustain him. The membership of common council is 54. Here the organization needs 31 and the mayor 34.

The first important move of the new administration, a move that was of vital importance to organization men who held city contracts, was taken today when the new director of public works, Acker, annulled the advertisement for bids for street cleaning for 1936. The contract will aggregate about \$1,000,000. The contract for this year is held by the Ware Brothers, one of whom is state senator, and another recorder of deeds.

The struggle to hold or win councilmen is growing hotter and many of the city fathers have expressed the wish that they had never been elected to the legislative body. They declare that they owe all their success in the organization, and that it would be an extreme act of delinquency to go back on their leaders in a time of trouble.

The first man to be won over today came to the mayor's office with a delegation of constituents. He was Charles P. Connell of common council.

There was another demonstration when the mayor left the city hall today. A delegation of constituents, headed by Director of Public Safety Potter was a noisy one. He entered the University club after much effort and after remaining there about an hour returned to the city hall in a cab. A crowd of about 200 persons followed him to his office. As he entered some one proposed singing the "Star Spangled Banner," which was done with all hands removed.

An incident of the day was the calling on the mayor of a delegation of high school girls who came to congratulate him. the restoration of the American principles for which our fathers fought, and which shall ever be our glory while we remain worthy to be called their children."

W. W. Justice, a wool merchant, presided at the academy meeting, and the principal address was delivered by Charles Henry Smith, former postmaster-general of the United States. Mr. Smith, before beginning his speech, announced that word had just reached him that 120 citizens had called upon a councilman in an outlying ward and demanded of him to pledge his vote against the lease, which he did. After Mr. Smith concluded his address, at which he urged that a councilman in the Twenty-eighth ward had also pledged himself tonight to go along with the mayor.

Among the others who addressed the meeting were William T. Tilden, secretary of the meeting; Frank M. Ritter, a former director of public safety; S. Louis Cohen, physician; Prof. Leo S. Rowe, president of the American Academy of Political and Social Science; and Right Rev. Dr. Alexander Mackay, Smith, bishop coadjutor of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Pennsylvania.

A letter written by Mr. Justice, chairman of the meeting, was read, in which he suggested the raising of \$125,000 to carry on an extensive campaign against the organization and pledging himself to contribute liberally to the fund.

Mayor Weaver, who was commended in a resolution adopted, was unable to be present, and a letter of regret from him was read. A letter written by S. Weir Mitchell, the physician-author, denouncing the lease, was also read.

The Young Men's Christian association hall was also taxed to its capacity. Addresses were made there by half a dozen prominent citizens, including Charles Henry Smith. There was great enthusiasm when Mr. Smith said that flag of Republicanism or of Lincoln, or the black flag of slavery was not the flag of the future.

In broad street several thousand persons gathered who could not gain admission to the big academy building. Word was sent inside, and the crowd was sent out to address the crowd from a bannock. The outdoor meeting closed with the singing of "Nearer, My God, to Thee," and "My Country, 'Tis of Thee."

### LAWYER IN PUBLIC AFFAIRS.

Judge Alton B. Parker Makes Address on Subject.

Chicago, May 26.—Judge Alton B. Parker of New York addressed the Illinois State Bar association at the Chicago Beach hotel today on "The Lawyer in Public Affairs." Judge Parker was greeted by hearty applause. After returning thanks for the cordial welcome accorded him, he said in closing:

"I would emphasize anew the thought that, as the lawyer finds himself the possessor of the law, he is also the possessor of the law. As, indeed, there ought not to be, except by meeting and welcoming them in the completed sense possible. ## PRESBYTERIAN FORMS OF SERVICE

Report on Ritual Made and Referred to an Enlarged Committee.

### PREFACE OF BOOK BEGUN.

Assembly Closed with a Vigorous Debate Over Resolutions of Temperance Committee.

Winona, Minn., May 26.—Both sessions of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church were devoted almost entirely to discussion of the report of the committee on forms of service, and the committee on temperance.

For three hours the report on forms of service was debated by at least 100 speakers, chief among whom are Dr. Henry Van Dyke, chairman of the committee and author of "The Book of Prayer," and Justice Harlan of the United States supreme court. The debate was about evenly divided, with the result that the report, together with the "Book of Prayer," which it suggested should be adopted by the general assembly as a part of a fixed form of service, was referred to an enlarged committee.

Resolutions adopted in conjunction with debate on the report provided: "In case the enlarged committee reaches a definite and satisfactory conclusion of their work during the present year, we authorize the publication of the book of worship by the board of publication and Sunday-school work, in order that the church may have the opportunity to test the forms of worship and prayers, and the committee is to make its final report to the next general assembly."

The report of the committee is, in part, as follows: "Letters of inquiry to the churches as to the extent of this movement brought replies showing that the movement is doing good work in many churches. It is already going on in three-fourths of our churches; second, that nine-tenths of our ministers desire improvement and better order in the conduct of their services; third, that almost all of our ministers wish the people to take part in the service; fourth, that nearly nine-tenths of our churches are in favor of the Presbyterian church in the celebration of the sacraments, in marriages and funerals, and in the conduct of public worship."

The book as now submitted contains forms and services for the following occasions: "The Lord's Supper," "The Baptism of Infants," "The Baptism of Adults," "The Reception of Those Baptized in Infancy to the Lord's Supper," "The Solemnization of Marriage," "The Burial of the Dead," "The Ordination of a Minister," and "Prayers for General and Special Occasions."

The assembly closed late in the afternoon with a vigorous debate over the resolutions offered by the temperance committee. The debate was precipitated by Rev. Alfred Kelly of Fraser, Pa., who declared that there is one Presbyterian university which permits its students to buy intoxicating liquors from a resort near the campus. He asked the assembly to pass a resolution which would stop the practice. When a commissioner asked that the university be named, the speaker said the assembly was answered by cries of "No," and during the debate the name of the school was not spoken.

Before adjourning the assembly passed a resolution censuring the management of any college or university permitting the students to drink intoxicating liquors. The use of tobacco and the manufacture and sale of cigarettes were condemned.

The assembly has heard all reports except that of the committee on narrative, which will come up tomorrow. Rev. W. H. Roberts stated clerk declared today that the assembly will complete its work about 1 p. m.

A committee was appointed to confer with the Washington presbytery relative to Justice Harlan's project for a central church at the national capital.
