NEW YORK, March 27.—The Baltic of the White Star line, which docked at pier 48 on Friday last at 3 o'clock p. m., was greeted by a long line of friends and relatives of passengers, and all with the open sesame pass card, crowded to the very gang planks to welcome the great load of human freight. In company with Mr. and Mrs. James H. Anderson, Miss Washburn of Pitts-

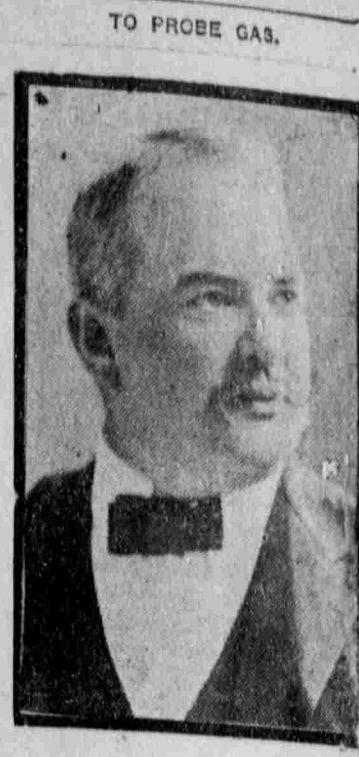
burg, Pa., has been visiting New York. She will go on to Utah to attend the spring conference, and may remain the entire summer.
