Condition of Crops. WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 .- The statistical report of the Department of Agriculture for September, presents a heavy reduction in the condition of cotton, corn and potatoes with little change in the status of wheat and other small grains. The high promise of the cotton crop has been reduced from 9.33 to 8.28, the effect of excessive rains on the Atlantic Coast and drought in the gulf states. A serious shedding of bolts has resulted from both causes. It is that the source of the power of Congress to establish and govern those peculiar dependen. cies called Territories is in the third section of Article IV, of the Consti-tution of the United States; that this the proper discharge of which requires that every Territory shall be brought into the Union as a State as soon as its inhabitants desire it, and they have the requisite numbers and resources to sustain a State government. It is not a proper discharge of the trust to keep

iny Territory indefinitely in the condition of a Territory, thereby keeping open a field for the exercise of Federal patronage and power. What shall be deemed a sufficient population has varied in different cases, and will always vary. But in the case of Utah there can be no question of a sufficient population and resources.
