The property of the woolen mills is situated near the Power plant at the mouth of Ogden canyon. The principal place of business of the corporation will be Ogden city. The purpose of the mill is to manufacture, buy and sell woolen goods, yarns, knit goods, wool bating, etc., and to buy and sell wool.

The capital stock of the corporation is \$30,000 divided into 300 shares of the par value of \$100.
