Provo, Utah Co., May 23.—At last evening's session of the council the committee on electric light reported having investigated municipal electric plants and that it was the opinion of the comand that it was the opinion of the countries that it would be an advantage for the city to own its electric light plant. The report recommended that the council issue a call for a special

the council issue a call for a special election to vote on the issuance of bonds to meet the necessary expenses, to be held Tuesday, June 27, 1905. A minority report was presented by Councilman Decker, who presented figures to show that the city could only bond for \$55,000, and that the cost of an electrical plant would be from \$80.000 to \$90,000, and that it would cost from \$35,000 to \$40,000 to complete the waterworks system; which would make waterworks system; which would make the cost of the two from \$20,000 to \$25,000 in excess of the amount which \$25,000 in excess of the amount which can be raised by bonds. The report set out the necessity for enlarging the distributing branch of the waterworks system in order to receive more revenue, and, as the money could not be raised for both projects, recommended that the electric light plant be not ed that the electric light plant be not built at present, and that no election for a bond issue be called.

Mayor Roylance reported that the Electric company's plant in this city could be bought for about \$26,000.

The vote was deferred on the reports till Wednesday evening, when a special receipt will be held.
