The rescript, which is a sort of educational cread, was issued some 30 years ago by the emperor of Japan, and has been used since that time as a formula for ethical teaching in the Japanese schools. "If they did not do the job they knew something about it." and the sheriff. "They have fold conflicting stories as to their wareabouts on the night of the job.
