

## BURGLAR ALARMS PUT IN THE SHADE

Electric Bells, Nightwatchmen,  
And Old Fangled Thief Catch-  
ers Take Back Seat

LATEST DEVICE IS WINNER.

As Result, Robber Was Captured  
With Goods, and Now  
Reposes in Jail.

Couldn't Resist a Bottle of Whisky  
Which Contained Knockout Drops—  
Found Unconscious This Morning.

Burglar alarms, electric bells, night watchmen etc., etc., must now take a back seat among the appliances calculated to capture burglars.

J. M. Ewen, proprietor of the New and Second hand Machinery company, 222 South Third West, has a new scheme for capturing midnight intruders and for the first time it was used this morning with success. As a result of the new discovery, a man given the name of S. E. Daley is now incarcerated in the city jail with a charge of burglary hanging over his head. In fact there are two charges. The secret may be explained in three words:

"Knock out drops."

SHOULDER OR CLAVICLE

The story of Duley's capture, according to Officer Tom Simpson, is as follows:

Sometime during last night the Great American Tea company was entered and a quantity of silverware stolen. Knives, forks, carving set and other articles were taken. The property stolen is valued at from \$15 to \$200. The place had been left open

in gaining entrance to the store. Leading the silverware into a sack Mr. Thief quietly walked away.

But the one job did not seem to satisfy the burglar. He next turned his attention to Mr. Swann's place. The office was not open but he managed to secure admittance by the simple method of prying long bars from the window with a crowbar, breaking the window and entering. The burglar still had with him some knives as he broke stolen from the tea company. There he hid the chair and table set to wait searching for valuables in Swann's office. A number of tins and

## THE MAURETANIA.

**Largest Ship Afloat Arrives in Merse**  
From Scotland.

Liverpool, Oct. 25.—The new Cunarder Mauretania, now the first

and longest ship afloat (she is five feet longer than her sister ship, the Lusitania) has arrived here, after having cruised around the coast of Scotland from Wallendene-on-Tyne where she was built. Her build is stout and officers expect the ship to surpass the Lusitania in speed. The Mauretania's speed varied from 18 to 27 knots in the 750 miles from the Tyne to the Atlantic. Only three electric lights on the engine power were employed.

The Mauretania probably will make her maiden trip to New York toward the end of November.

**SHIP ABANDONED, CREW SAVED**

Baltimore, Oct. 25.—A cablegram from London to the Maritime Exchange today says that the British steamer *Mauretania* was abandoned in latitude 44 north and longitude 10 west.
