

First they were not contemplated in the treaty; second, they ought not there-fore, in fairness, to have been introduced into our case; third, the compromise by which Mr. Fish hopes to have them before the board is a subterfuge by which he would conciliate a sentiment at home which does not deserve to be treated with respect; and fourth, because Great Britain positively insists on the abandonment of claims which

establish these branches of business in the midst of these mountains. We have now many large factories in this Territory that have to stand still for want of wool. I want to say a few words on this subject to the wool growers of Deseret. Instead of sending our wool out of the Territory, to eastern States, to be manufactured into cloth, and purchasing it back from the manufacturers a large price for it when brought here by railroad, I feel that it is our duty, and it would be far wiser for us, to sell our wool to those who own
