TRANS MISSISSIPPI CONGRESS Chairman Richardson Issues Call

For Fifteenth Session.

Portland, Or., Aug. 24 .- Tom Richardson, chairman of the executive com-mittee of the TransMississippi Com-nercial congress has issued a formal call for the fifteenth session of the congress, to be held at St. Louis, Oct. 25 and 29, Inclusive, President Francis 25 and 29, inclusive, President Franci of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition company, has placed the convention hall on the world's fair grounds at the disposal of the congress for its sessions. That the representation at the congress will be a large one is shown by the provisions for representation as contains in the call for the congress. The go ernor of each state and territory may appoint 10 and not more than 20 dele-gates, the mayor of each city may appoint one delegate and one additional delegate for each 5,000 inhabitants, but no city can have more than 10 dele gates. Each county in the United United States may appoint one delegate through its executive officer and every business organization may appoint on delegate and an additional delegate to every 50 members, but no organization every 50 members, but no organization can have more than 16 delegates. The governors of states and territories, members of Congress and ex-presidents of the commercial congress are ex-offi-cio members with all privileges of del-egates except those of voting. The last year's session of the congress was held in Scottle Work Aument 1007 in Scattle, Wash., August, 1903.
