LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Conference.—The General Conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints begins at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning. Visitors from the settlements at every point of the compass are already pouring into the city. The prospects are that the proceedings will be of an unusually interesting character.

For orchestral playing it would be difficult to surpass, and on powerful, and we congratulate its maker on his success. He has made a very handsome box for it, and both were on exhibition at the fair."

Woman's Work.—Sister E. R. Snow and B. W. Smith returned on Friday last from a ten days' trip through Sevier State. They stopped first at Richmond, held a meeting and returned to Richfield and attended for two days' conference on behalf of society and other ladies as a part of that place. Inventory was next visited and two meetings held, after which they went to Escalante, Joseph, Monroe, Amadella, Glenwood, Willow Park, Salina and Fayette, holding twenty meetings in all during the journey. Sister Fayette they returned home. They filled the programme marked out for them by the brethren at Richfield, after leaving the conference, though in so doing as high as three meetings a day, and four on one day, were attended during the trip home.

Obituary.—The Syracuse (N. Y.) Standard, of the 27th ult., contains an extended obituary notice of Dudley Phelps, Esq., a prominent capitalist of that city, and a gentleman widely known and highly respected. In the spring of 1876, Mr. Phelps visited this city in company with a large party of eastern excursionists, for the purpose of seeing the mines, railroad, and general industries of our territory. The party were the guests of Hon. C. W. Scofield of the B. C. and C. F. R. R. and the W. and N. B. R. R. Mr. Phelps at that time was president of the Trust Company of Onondaga, Syracuse. He was a self made man, energetic, unassuming, honest and upright, and leaves behind him a good and honored name. His age was 52 when he died. The disease to which he succumbed was kidney and bladder disease, from which he had suffered for over five years.

Egyptian Rice.—A fine specimen of Egyptian rice has been presented to the Museum by Mr. J. A. Van Natta of this city. It was raised by him from seed sent from the eastern States. Although in Egypt this variety of rice may be raised without water, it appears that this cannot be done here. Brother Van Natta says the plant grows very readily at first but that as soon as the seeds begin to develop the growth is very slow. There are about 2,500 seeds in each head. The stem and leaves resemble those of corn, and the cultivation is similar to that of corn. It is sown in rows about ten inches apart in rows four feet wide, and 100 bushels to the acre could be raised.

An Irrepressible Parrot.—There is a parrot residing in a family in the south-western part of the city which the "boys" of the place have mischievously taught to tell the secrets cherished by the young lady of the house.
