

ARMY BILL IS UNDER DISCUSSION

Senate Devotes Five Hours to Its Consideration.

PETTIGREW'S RESOLUTION.

Wants Information With Reference to Philippines—Must Have Facts Before Voting for Large Army.

Washington, Jan. 4.—For five hours today the Senate discussed the army reorganization bill. The debate took a wide range at times, but was confined principally to the necessity for the increase in the regular army proposed in the pending measure. The Philippine question was threshed over at great length, but few really new points were advanced. Some slight progress was made toward the completion of the pending measure.

NO LIQUOR FOR SAVAGES.

Soon after the Senate convened today Mr. Lodge of Massachusetts favorably reported from the committee on foreign relations the following resolution and asked for its immediate consideration:

"That in the opinion of this body the time has come when the principle, twice affirmed in international treaties for Central Africa, that native races should be protected against the desecration of their lands and the destruction of their lives by the sale of intoxicating liquors, should be extended to all uncivilized peoples by the enactment of such laws and treaties as may be necessary to prevent the sale of such liquors to aboriginal tribes and nations, and to prevent the sale of such liquors to aboriginal tribes and nations."

PETTIGREW'S RESOLUTION.

The resolution offered by Mr. Pettigrew asking for information with reference to the Philippines, was referred to the committee on the Philippines, who after a speech by Mr. Pettigrew, who said the President had maintained there was no war in the Philippines. The military committee declared that war existed there and that at least 60,000 men would be required to suppress the rebellion. "As the President and the military committee disagree," said Mr. Pettigrew, "it seems to me we ought to have the facts before we create an army of 100,000 men." He created the resolution, "that the President be required to submit to the Senate a report on the length of the army, was referred to the committee on military affairs.

THE ARMY BILL.

The army bill was then taken up and Mr. Carter asked unanimous consent that the unobjectionable amendments in the bill be considered and passed upon.

THE RECORD.

Mr. Carter said the bill of Mr. Wellington's question was that the administration to satisfy him must declare its present policy toward the Philippines. The senator asked the record of Congress for an answer to his question, said Mr. Carter. The President has no authority to decide what shall be done with the Philippines. "The people can't be put down," declared Mr. Wellington. "Is it the purpose of the administration to deprive them of self-government? If so I am opposed to any such infamy."

QUESTIONS BY WELLINGTON.

"Has he not already given up sovereignty over a portion of Alaska?" inquired Mr. Wellington.

Mr. Carter replied that what the President had done as to the Alaskan boundary had been accomplished through a modus vivendi, a purely temporary arrangement.

AN ALLEGED FACT ONLY.

Mr. Carter—That is the alleged fact, only.

Mr. Wellington, continuing, said the Alaskan boundary was distinctly marked by stones, and the territory occupied by the United States from Russia was clearly the territory of the United States. He said that if the President should be impeached if he relinquished territory in the Philippines he should likewise be impeached for relinquishing sovereignty in Alaska.

TELLER ON THE BILL.

Mr. Teller sharply criticized the pending measure as the entering wedge for a large standing army. "You will want 100,000 men," he declared, "but you will want 200,000 and you will want them for a hundred years. This measure is not intended merely to meet an emergency, but to fix upon the country a great standing army."

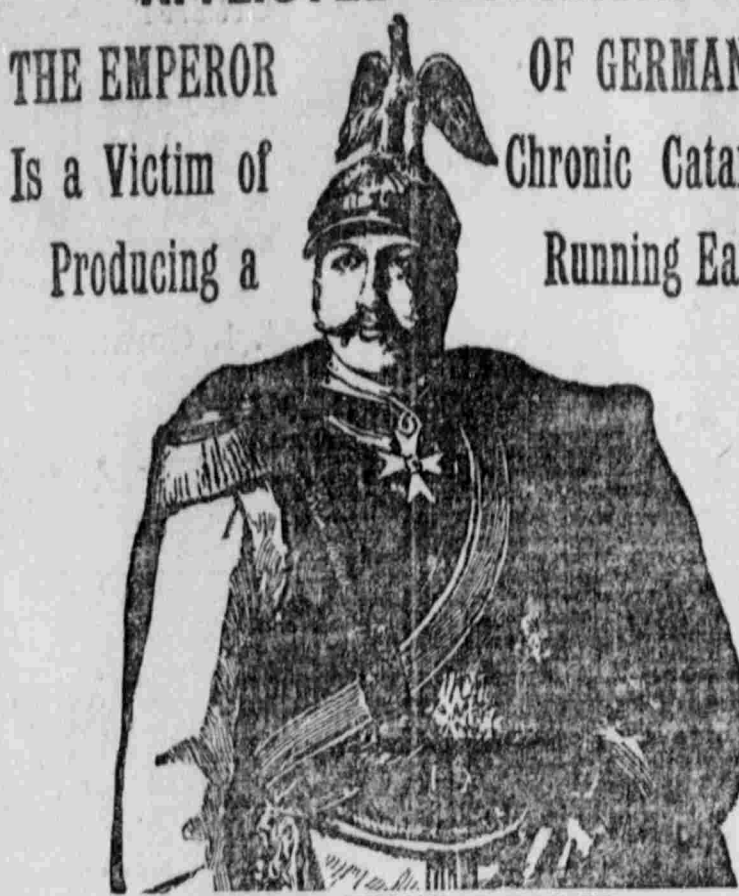
Mr. Teller said it would be easily possible to pass a bill in forty-eight hours that would provide for an army of 100,000 men or 200,000 men for service in the Philippines, provided it was made to apply to purely emergency service and for a definite, limited time.

men are Russians. They have the sympathy and ambitions of Russians. They are strangers to the country and they have a right to be there, but under God's law, which is higher, they have no place there at all. Their actions are the worst form of imperialism."

Mr. Caffery inquired whether, in the circumstances, Mr. Teller would vote to maintain the authority of the United States in the Philippines.

STILL FOR THE FLAG.

"As Mr. Lincoln announced in regard to the Mexican war," replied the Colorado senator, "a war that he did not believe in, he would vote for such a force as the government needed. So I have no doubt that as long as our flag floats in the Philippine archipelago, I will (reluctant as I may be) vote to maintain the army and the flag there. If that is illogical, it is illogical because there is no better way out of it."

PROCTOR EXPLAINS.

Mr. Proctor said he thought the Colorado senator was under a misapprehension as to what the army bill proposes to do. As he regarded the matter, the maximum force authorized by the bill was to be used only in the present emergency, and there would be a return to the minimum of 45,000, which was the peace footing of the bill. No one could tell when the troops might be needed in Alaska, Hawaii or Porto Rico. Likewise there was possibility of the need of a larger American force in Cuba, at the request of the Cuban people. And as for the possibility, no one could doubt that for a considerable time, even if the demands should be granted, a large force of our troops must be kept in those islands.

HOAR TAKES A HAND.

Mr. Hoar suggested a general amendment to the bill looking to the conciliation of the Philippines, and expressed the opinion that in time of peace we should have one soldier to 1,000 of our population. He did not, therefore, he said, oppose the bill on the score of increase, but he did oppose it because of the avowed policy of military control of the islands. "It is idle," he said, "to tell us that these people are not fit for self-government." He quoted the President's message, and expressed the opinion that the Philippines are an intelligent people, and added: "The way to prepare them for liberty is to set them free."

Mr. Hoar said that if the facts could be known there would be no two opinions as to what we should do in the Philippines, for he believed that if the people were generally convinced that the Philippines were an capable of self-government, they would then know how to make no effort to continue to subjugate those people in the interest of trade.

NEW COMMISSION FAVORED.

Mr. Hoar urged that it would be most desirable to have appointed a commission representing all phases of political life, men of the highest character and standing, to ascertain the facts as to the Philippines and the people. He hoped such a commission would be appointed before the close of the present session. We should give the Philippines a hearing, he said.

MAKES SERIOUS COUNTER CHARGES

Elmer A. Vail Files an Answer to Divorce Complaint.

DEFEND. ALLEGES ADULTERY

Charges His Wife With Drunkenness and Fast Living Generally—Asks for Custody of Child.

Mr. Elmer A. Vail, the well known civil engineer, filed a sensational answer and cross-complaint in the district court yesterday afternoon to the complaint of his wife for divorce and custody of their minor child, filed about ten days ago. The allegations of Mrs. Vail in her complaint for divorce were cruelty, failure to support and desertion, and she also asked for the custody of their seven-year-old daughter, Gladys Orlan. To these charges Mr. Vail in his answer enters a specific denial, and then goes on in his cross-complaint and charges the plaintiff with some serious things, among them adultery, drunkenness, profligacy and unfitness to take charge and rear their child. The defendant asserts that for three years past plaintiff has associated with disreputable characters of both sexes in saloons, wine rooms and houses of ill-repute. That the child has had occasion to speak of her mother's conduct in drinking, etc., for which the mother has punished her severely. He claims the plaintiff has no love for the child, and wishes she were dead. That plaintiff is of a brutal nature which is shown in her speech, the same having a tendency to corrupt the morals of the daughter and is destroying her purity and innocence. That when remonstrated with concerning her actions in visiting disreputable places and associating with disreputable characters while defendant has been absent from home, the plaintiff would reply in unrepeatable language; and once when reproved for saying she preferred living a fast life, plaintiff attacked her husband with a knife, threatening to do him bodily harm. That plaintiff has become a slave to intoxication and is no longer fit to be the wife of a respectable man or have the custody of rearing their child. Defendant also alleges that plaintiff on two occasions at least since 1897 has committed adultery, viz, July 25th, and Nov. 23rd, 1899, in the Bowby house, on West Temple street, and also at 236 West Third North street. The man whom she committed the crime with is designated in the complaint as "W. W."

Perhaps the most likely cause of contention between these parties is the custody of the little girl. Mrs. Vail will endeavor to show that her father is not a fit and proper person to rear the child, and in turn Mr. Vail will endeavor to prove the same thing against his wife. Last February, it will be remembered, Mr. Vail took the daughter away from her mother and placed her in the Sacred Heart academy, and thereafter, together with Mrs. McConnell, its grandmother, went to the academy and flourished a gun before the good sisters succeeded in frightening them into letting her have young Gladys, whom she took away.

Judge Cherry yesterday gave judgment for the plaintiff in the case of George H. Steed and Charles Turner, by default, to plaintiff, for \$1,020, interest and costs.

Henry Bromschwig & Co. commenced suit yesterday afternoon against Otto Kappel and Henry Kiesel to collect \$438.36 for goods sold and delivered to defendants by plaintiffs as merchant tailors.

Police Enter One Door as Burglars Leave by Another.

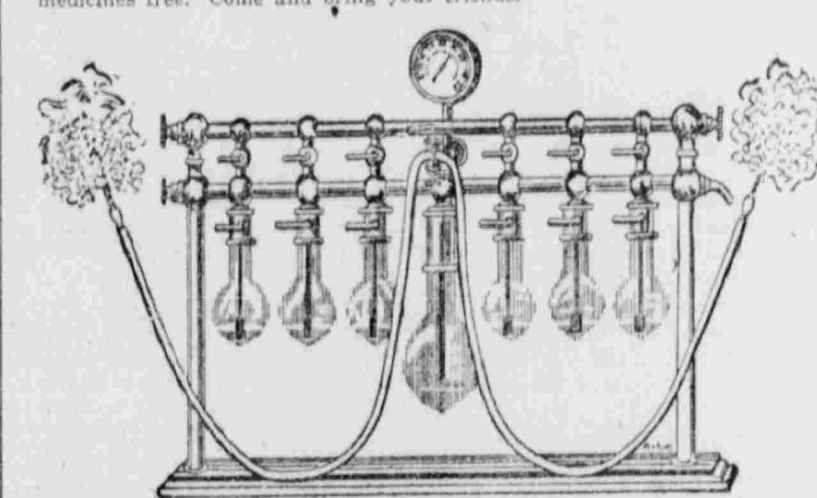
