

H. WELLS TO MANAGE THE SHUBERT THEATER

Independent Under the Financial Backing of J. Pierpont Morgan To Inevitably Succeed

Charles H. Wells, assistant cashier of the Utah National bank, is announced, will be the manager of the Shubert theater, as the renovated edifice will be named.

Howard Garrett whose name has been mentioned as being prominently connected with the deal which is bringing the Shubert attractions to Salt Lake, this morning stated that the theater would open, as announced last night, on Nov. 15, with the "Gay Divorcé," one of New York's big attractions, the attraction coming from New York on its way to the coast. A large force of men is at work remodeling the interior of the theater and the seats will be installed before the end of next week.

There is considerable reticence on the part of those connected with the deal and the identity of the men behind the proposition is not forthcoming at this time but, it is anticipated when Jake Shubert arrives next week some light will be thrown on the invasion of first class legitimate plays and musical comedies that is being contemplated.

It is understood, however, that the new theater will be located in the big new building for which ground is being broken on Main street between First and Second South streets is being negotiated to that end have been secured a suitable site and have guaranteed the requisite money necessary to erect the theater and if now only awaits the arrival of Mr. Shubert to begin up the deal.

Incidentally it is generally admitted that J. Pierpont Morgan is backing the Shuberts in their fight against Klavie and Salt Lake has been selected as a necessary stopper point for the Shubert attractions bound east and west across the continent. The Shuberts already are playing Ogden and Logan and Salt Lake is to be included in the Utah chain of theaters
