

# MINE OWNERS MEAN BUSINESS

Those of Goldfield Will Ask Dis-  
solution of Goldfield  
Miners' Union.

## GOING INTO FEDERAL COURT.

Charges Western Federation is Or-  
ganized for Destruction of Property  
And "Creating Endless Strife."

Goldfield, Nev., Dec. 25.—To  
carry the fight into the federal court  
will be the next move of the Goldfield  
Mine Owners' association. Tomorrow  
a suit will be filed in the circuit court  
of the district of Nevada, asking not  
only for an injunction against picket-  
ing and interference, but for the final  
dissolution of the Goldfield Miners'  
union.

The suit is to be filed by the Gold-  
field Consolidated Mines company  
against the Goldfield Miners' union, the  
Western Federation of Miners, Charles  
A. Mackinnon, president of the local  
union, and 13 other officers of the  
same. The complaint sets forth  
the alleged vast extent and richness  
of the mining interests involved, and  
the large number of persons holding  
shares in the mines in various states  
and territories; alleges that the Gold-  
field Miners' union and the Western  
Federation of Miners are voluntary  
unincorporated associations, and that  
they are claimed to be a part of  
another larger organization known as  
the Industrial Workers of the World,  
also unincorporated, which has the  
same principles and seeks to accom-  
plish its results by the same alleged  
unlawful methods, and has in its ranks  
as members of these associations not  
only the miners of the Goldfield dis-  
trict, but other laborers, such as wait-  
ers, clerks, cooks, barbers and bar-  
keepers.

It is further alleged that the West-  
ern Federation of Miners is organized  
for the destruction of property and  
creating "endless strife, disorder,  
bloodshed and riotousness." The Goldfield  
union is charged in the bill with "in-  
timidation" and with being guilty of  
"wanton destruction of property, mur-  
der of innocent citizens, lawlessness  
and anarchy to such an extent that it  
has instituted a reign of terror in the  
Goldfield district." It is further al-  
leged that the Goldfield union is a  
"criminal society."

The court is asked to hale the de-  
fendants before it to answer the al-  
legations of the complaint, and to is-  
sue a writ of injunction restraining the  
defendants from obstructing the busi-  
ness of the Consolidated Mines com-  
pany by threat, intimidation or picket-  
ing. An injunction against boycott is  
further asked for. The court is asked  
to enjoin the Goldfield union from  
holding any more meetings. Watchers  
or exanders are asked for, with full  
authority to arrest or cause the arrest  
of the complainant and to carry out the  
orders of the court and to arrest any  
persons violating them.

Finally, it is petitioned that the in-  
junction be made permanent and that  
the Goldfield Miners' union be abated  
and forever dissolved as a nuisance  
and perpetually enjoined from any fur-  
ther meetings or action of whatever  
kind or nature. The complaint is signed

## PASSENGER RATE WAR.

Eastern Roads on Verge of What  
Promises to be a Disastrous One.

Chicago, Dec. 25.—Eastern roads are  
on the verge of what promises to be a  
disastrous passenger rate war. Yester-  
day the Erie gave notice of a cancella-  
tion of all of its east-bound passenger  
tariffs shown in the Chicago rate sheet.  
Notice was also given by that road that  
after Feb. 1, 1908, it would no longer  
abide by the differential arbitration  
award of President Lucius T. Austin,  
Boston & Maine, whereby the Michigan  
Central road was accorded a rate of  
\$19 between Chicago and New York.

It is expected that when the in-  
dependent Erie tariff, to be known as Erie  
tariff No. 1, is made public, the first-  
class rates to New York and all points  
east of Chicago will have suffered a  
material decrease. Discontent over the  
Michigan Central award and over the  
failure of the lines to keep the  
agreement not to pay steamship  
commissions are said to be the causes  
of the Erie's action.

Since Nov. 20, when the Erie's \$10  
second class rate to New York went  
into effect, 25,000 steamship passengers  
have been carried east, and of these  
the Erie has carried about 11,000.

GIRL AND HIMSELF

Philadelphia, Dec. 25.—Leaving  
a letter stating that they had died for  
love, George A. Green, aged 35 years,  
early today shot and probably fatally

self. Green is married, but is sepa-

In a letter which is addressed to a

mother. This is the only girl I ever  
loved. We have promised before God  
we could never live apart. This is our  
secret."

No letters were found in the cloth-  
ing of the girl. The mother of Miss  
Wonderly had refused Green permis-  
sion to visit her home and the police  
found the girl and her father entered a  
pact in a together.

## BLACK HAND MEMBERS FINED AND IMPRISONED.

Pittsburg, Dec. 25.—The 17 Italians  
arrested yesterday and alleged to be  
members of the Black Hand society,  
were given hearings today before Mag-  
istrate Greedy and sentenced to the  
workhouse for from 30 to 90 days, or  
fined amounts ranging from \$10 to  
\$100 each.

The men were surprised in a so-

ment. A secret tunnel leads from the  
room to an exit in Webster avenue,  
but the police had learned of this and  
had it guarded.

From the men arrested all manner  
of vicious weapons were secured, in-  
cluding many firearms and knives.  
Police officers who raided the club  
was the meeting place of Black Hand  
outlaws.

crime. Sheriff Robertson, however,  
sprang the man away from the mob  
and took him to Okmulgee. Jim John-  
son, a negro who gave Carson a rifle,  
was also taken to Okmulgee.
