LOCAL BRIEFS.

Thirteenth Ward Fair—The Thirteenth ward fair opened last night, with an excellent attendance, and will continue through tomorrow evening.

To Keep Extra Clerk—Postmaster Thomas received authority last night, from the department to continue in service until June 30, the extra clerk authorized last December.

Officials in Provo—Gov. Cutler, State Treasurer Christiansen and State Auditor Edwards went to Provo today to attend the regular monthly meeting of the state board of insanity.

Bad Street Crossings—The street crossings in all parts of the city outside of the paved district, are in a most wretched condition and pedestrians are having a hard time of it.

Metalf Still in Missouri—Chief of Publicity James A. Metalf, absent from Salt Lake on a visit to Missouri, and the American league office is accumulating a supply of mail for consideration on his return.

Cross Country Runs—Cross country running is to become a feature of the track training at the high school, the L. D. S. U. and the University as soon as the present supply of sunshine succeeds in producing a firm underpinning to the earth. The squads hope to be out by Monday.

New Electric Light Plant—E. T. Merritt of Green River proposes to install an electric light plant there for local lighting purposes, and has application with the state engineer for 1,000 second feet of water from the Green river in Emery county. Sixteen 57-inch turbines will be used giving 12,000 horse power.

Sunny Skies of Spring—It surely seems that the sunny skies of spring have come to stay. The air is clear and balmy, the snow is disappearing very rapidly from the city and adjacent foothills while the streets well, in the lower part of the city, gondolas will almost be a necessity in a few days more.

"The True Jefferson Davis"—Dr. Guy Carlton Lee is the next lecturer scheduled to appear in Salt Lake in the Mutual Improvement bureau course. Dr. Lee will speak on Wednesday evening next at Barratt hall on the subject "The True Jefferson Davis." Dr. Lee was formerly on the faculties of Johns Hopkins and the Columbian universities, and is an author of note on historical subjects.

Now in Annapolis—Robert C. Lee of the senior class in the Salt Lake High school is now in Annapolis preparing for the May examinations for entrance to the United States Naval academy, as he has received the formal appointment. Mervine Bension, the appointee of Congressman Howell, now a student at the L. D. S. U., expects to leave next week for Annapolis to take his examinations.

Will Be Prosecuted—The practice indulged in by some teamsters to draw heavy loads over paved sidewalks wherever it is possible to do so is to be stopped, that is, if prosecution for the offense will have a lessening effect. One arrest was made yesterday, that of B. H. Beck, and others who persist in driving on the walks will doubtless find themselves in the same predicament. The accused will have a hearing in Judge Diehl's court today.

Heywood Gets Coffer—Messrs. Street & Brunell for Mrs. S. C. Heywood of the Cullen hotel, awarded the bid for the unexpired lease of the hotel, last evening, to ex-Marshall B. H. Heywood. There were no bidders and Mr. Heywood's was for \$14,000 cash, subject to approval by the administrator, and the probate court will be asked to confirm the sale tomorrow. Heywood will take possession next week, and make some changes in the way of improvement.

Ferguson Obsequies—The funeral of the late Montgomery J. Ferguson was held yesterday afternoon, from his late residence, 118 Second street, with interment in the city cemetery. Bishop Whitney of the Eighteenth ward conducted the services, and delivered a eulogy on the deceased. Addresses were also delivered by Judge Young, and Hon. R. S. Wells. The pallbearers were James Ford, Dan and Earl Ferguson, brothers of the deceased, L. G. Burton and B. B. Gray.

Bishop Peterson Dead—Samuel Peterson, former Bishop of the Second ward, died at his home Tuesday evening, the cause being general debility. Mr. Peterson was 50 years of age, and was loved and respected by all who knew him. He leaves a wife and a large family. The funeral services will be held in the Second ward meeting-house on Sunday at 12:30 o'clock. Between 10 and 12 o'clock, friends of the deceased will be invited to the family residence, 337 east Seventh South street.

High Water is Coming—It is reported that the snow is even deeper in the surrounding mountains than has been suspected. As a result, there will be a great volume of water rushing down out of the mountains within the next few weeks which will result that creeks, ditches and canals will overflow their banks and fill the lower levels. Accordingly it will be well for all water courses to be cleaned and put in good shape for the inevitable flow that must of necessity be due in the near future.

Burglars Must Answer—James Wilson and William McGinn had a hearing on a charge of burglary and grand larceny in the criminal division of the city court today, and were held to the district court in \$500 bonds N. Lichtenstein, whose residence the men are charged with having entered on the night of Feb. 12, identified a real-estate man, a fur, fan, purse, pair of opera glasses, and a revolver as having been taken from his premises. The last named article was found on the person of Wilson when he was taken into custody, the opera glasses had been pawned to a saloon man named Nollie Miller, who had advanced \$10 to the accused. Soren Christensen, counsel for the defendants, asked for the release of his clients, but the motion was overruled, and the men were returned to the county jail to await action by the district court.

TRAGIC DEATH OF YOUNG SALT LAKER

Melvin D. Mangum, Aged 22
Years, Killed at Daly-
West Mine.

WAS STRUCK BY HUGE ROCK.

Working as Timberman on the 900-
Foot Level When the Terrible
Accident Occurred.

The Daly-West mine of Park City was the scene of the tragic death of a young Salt Laker at noon yesterday. The victim was Melvin D. Mangum, aged 22. Young Mangum had been employed at the Daly-West since the first of the year, and was recognized as

a faithful and industrious man. Just as he was known here and elsewhere to be a boy of good habits and trustworthy record.

At the time he met death he was working as a timberman in a wing on the 900-foot level. It appears that without warning, a huge rock broke loose from its moorings and fell upon him, crushing him badly. Instantly thereafter a second rock loosened and fell, striking him on the head and shoulders and killing him instantly.

FUNERAL ON FRIDAY.

The deceased was a native of Nephi, Utah, but for some time the family, consisting of his mother and four brothers, Lawrence, Ray, Warren C. and Earl, have been residing at 30 L street. A sister, Mrs. M. J. Kennedy, lives at 45 M street, from which place the funeral will take place on Friday afternoon, with interment in the city cemetery.

Today Lawrence, one of the brothers of the deceased, and Mr. M. J. Kennedy, a brother-in-law, went up to Park City to bring the remains to Salt Lake. They will return from their sad mission on this evening's train. Great sympathy is felt for the young man's mother and for his brothers, sister and other relatives, who have been so suddenly plunged into sorrow by the tragic occurrence.

POSTPONEMENT POPULAR.

Delay in Opening Wind River Indian Reservation Gives Satisfaction.

(Special to the "News.")

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 8.—The postponement of the opening of the Wind River Indian reservation, in central Wyoming, is popular among the people of the entire state, with the possible exception of the citizens of Shoshone, a thriving town near the eastern boundary line of the reservation, which, were the opening held on June 15, as originally planned, would be great benefit. With the completion of the Chicago & North Western to Lander, and the postponement of the opening until Aug. 15, Lander will derive the benefits and not Shoshone.

Telegrams have been received from Thermopolis, Lander, Cody, Rock Springs, and many other points expressing satisfaction. The postponement will enable Rock Springs, which will probably be named as one of the registering stations, to place the facilities for handling the crowds, both at the registering station, and in transporting them to the reservation. The road between Rock Springs and the reservation will be placed in first-class condition for the promised heavy traffic.

This Day In History.

MARCH 8th

1819—Edwin Percy Whipple, Abolitionist, born in Gloucester, Mass.

1862—Famous naval encounter in Hampton Roads, the Confederate ironclad ram Merrimack, played havoc with the wooden Union fleet.

1878—Elihu Burritt, the learned American blacksmith and apostle of peace, died at New Britain, Conn. He was there 1868. Burritt began the study of ancient languages while working at the forge. In early manhood he made use of his learning by editing and lecturing and establishing papers devoted to anti-slavery, peace and self culture. The basis of an international association of peace advocates was developed by his efforts. Emancipation by compensation was the end for which he labored devotedly with all his strength, and slender means.

1887—Henry W. Beecher died in Brooklyn, born in Litchfield, Conn., 1812.

1888—General David Hunter, noted scurrilous of rheumatism, died in Charleston, W. Va., born 1818.

1897—Mrs. Henry Ward Beecher died at Stamford, Conn., born 1812.

1906—Gabriel Jules Thomas, noted scurrilous of rheumatism, died in New York city, born 1838. Kuroputkin abandoned his lines south of Mukden.
