

# Goldfield, The Spectacular Gold Camp of Nevada.

**N**OT THIS stamping of inch-wide beams of golden ore worth dollars the pound, nor the expressing through Wells-Fargo of carloads whose contents in gold and silver carry their value to thousands per ton, nor yet the rushing hither by trembled tensors of hundred-dollar miners by thousand-dollar specials, traveling on Overland Limited schedules, so faithfully and truly portrays the greatness of Goldfield as is told in full figures by the broad story of her week-to-week shipments. Goldfield is, and for decades to come will remain, the spectacular camp of Nevada, endowed with streaks and strata of veins at near metal as rock and as yet hardly touched at the surface line. Greater days and future years will reveal mineral phenomena to startle the world as never before. Such pyrotechnic strikes as these fabulous deposits afford add, it is true, to the proved assets of the district; but it is the daily trend, the tedious blocking and stamping of ground that yields values ranging upwards from the shipping minimum that really tells the story of Goldfield.

## TWELVE MILLIONS IN GOLD.

All Nevada in 1906 added \$9,278,600 in gold to the wealth of the world. Goldfield, alone, in 1907 will be found on a final accounting to have enriched that national coffers by its shipments of approximately \$12,000,000 worth of gold ore.

All Nevada in 1906 produced \$24,377 worth of silver. The records of 1907 will show a record almost as great accredited to the one great shipper of Fairview, the Nevada Mills mine, and the famed producer of Tonopah, the peerless Tonopah Mining Co., the former naming the highest paid dividends amounting \$550,000 on a capitalization of \$1,000,000, marking the second best dividend figure of all gold-silver mines in America.

## OUTPUT OF TWO GREAT CAMPS.


Goldfield and Tonopah have produced this year gold and silver ore of twice the value of the output of the entire state last year. The days past are entering upon an era of real mining which will show for the years to follow an increased percentage of product which will result in figures undreamed of by him who has failed to carefully regard performances of the past, to judiciously weigh possibilities of the present and to intelligently speculate upon probabilities of the future.

## WHAT ONE SHIPMENT BROUGHT.

Odell and Gardner, leasing on the Kendall, made a single shipment of 13 tons of ore that netted \$800. Hayes and Monnists sent forth from their Mohawk lease the richest carload of ore in the history of the world, settled for at \$674,258.39. The old Hollingsworth on the Bullfrog, with a carload that was worth \$100,000 and equally rich product went from the Sandstorm. Ore that breaks down at \$500 to \$1,000, without sorting, is coming from present digging on the Florence and the Consolidated.

## OF VASTLY GREATER IMPORT IS THE AUTHENTICATED fact that up to the final week of November, 312,681 tons of shipping ore were marketed by 19 Goldfield miners, not to list the separate producers the 42 others leases operating upon them.

These 19, constituting the roll of honor, are Black Butte, Combination Fraction, Consolidated, which includes Mohawk, Red Top, Combination, Laguna and Goldfield Mining, Midway, Florence, Jumbo, Jensen, May Queen, Standard, St. Ives and Veinot. What is even more significant may be seen in the fact that in the first six months of 1907 the production of these properties was only 31,740 tons, while in the next five months the output of the same mines was 80,841 tons, making up the total of 393,581 tons. The increase for the second half of the year is almost 100 per cent over the first half. The production of Goldfield in 1907 will be found on a final reckoning to exceed \$15,000,000 and the tally for the last six months of the years augurs for 1908 an output worth \$20,000,000 at the most conservative

tonnage estimate and giving the ore an average value of \$110 per ton.

## AT CARSON CITY MINT.

Receipts of gold from day the mining districts of southern Nevada to that date their weighty reserves of high-grade and crowding their mountains of milling truck into the hoppers of the 500-ton reduction works at Millers, the 200-ton plant of the Montana Tonopah and the Midway mill of 75 tons capacity per day. Unless all calculations go awry such expenditures will be well nigh fulfilled by only seven of Tonopah's greatest mines, the Tonopah Mining of Nevada, Midway, Extension Jim Butler, Elmendorf, West End and Montana.

## DREAMS OF THE COMSTOCK.

Old men dream dreams of the Comstock of the 'sixties. Young men see visions of the Tonopah and the Goldfield of the twenties.

Comstock produced 1,000,000 in 1859 and \$750,000 in 1860. It yielded \$16,000,000 in 1884 and up to the beginning of 1888 had poured into the nation's exchequer \$52,000,000. The world today is \$400,000,000 better off for the ending of the mining of the Comstock lode.

The leaves of the old are passing.

Their hoary heads are easily numbered. Their grand old race which harks to ante-bellum days for dreams of all but given way to the generation of fuzzy chins and many-buckled boots, sees of visions. It is not a wild venture to forecast for a decade hence the conversion of these visionaries into actualities. We replace the Comstockites, after long correspondence statistics, for 1920 of equal portent, the Battleborn state repeating history through Goldfield and

growing demands of the camp. A fifth plant, a sampler of generous capacity, tentatively projected by local capitalists, received immediate attention and will be completed in a brief a season as possible. The Florence Company mill is being rushed to readiness for service. Altogether the reduction structures, precipitated by the threatened panic, have redoubled and will continue to move to the ultimate benefit of Goldfield and other Nevada camps similarly situated.

## BANKS OF TWO CAMPS.

Two banks in Goldfield and Tonopah were temporarily closed by terrible runs, caused by wild rumors from the east. One bank in Goldfield, that of John S. Cook & Co., anticipating an onslaught and awaiting itself of the holiday declared by the governor of the state, shipped in more than \$1,000,000 worth of gold coin, stacked it view upon counters, opened its doors prepared to pay every deposit and receive more cash than could be paid out in checks.

Before the discrediting effects of the financial flurry Goldfield had three banks operating, with deposits exceeding \$5,000,000. A fourth bank has been organized by William Babcock of New York to do business as the First National Bank of Goldfield. Seven of the nine directors are Nevada capitalists. The Cook bank has just completed the installation of \$100,000 worth of new fixtures and furnishings. It is announced by the State Bank and Trust Co. and the Nye & Ormsby County bank, the two for the time suspended, that not a dollar will be lost by any patron of either. One depositor in the State bank has professed his confidence in the institution \$200,000 since its doors were closed and numer-

ous others have made offers of slightly smaller sums. Since the incipiency of the panic, since spent there are dropping in northern Nevada camps additional stamps upon one that is pregnant with precious metal, 20 stamps at Manhattan, 20 at the Keno Wonder, 20 at Blair and 19 at Bullfrog.

## WHERE HONEST MINERS WON.

An indirect benefit coming from the miners' panic which swept the country to the towns of the labor spirit of the districts. Certain agitators attempted to force a strike when it became impossible to remit wages in cash, the substitute being absolutely sound cashiers' certificates. The agitators were outvoted and the honest miners continued at work. Disturbers attempted to close the mines of all Nevada camps depending for power upon the Nevada-California Power company, which in the prosecution of construction enlargement refused to recognize the union among the common laborers employed. Referendum votes were taken and in every instance were found adverse to the calling of a sympathetic strike. Such incidents have been refreshing, occurring at the close of a year harassed by strikes, lockouts, walkouts, boycotts and scenes of violence such as disgraced the first two months of 1907.

## GOLD HAS MADE GOLDFIELD,

Gold ore has made Goldfield. What

ever of greatness it may boast is merely a measure of its mineral resources, because of natural riches it possesses none other.

Tears glistened on that held the city they had built, the younger generation then housed, the flag they revered and the stands for the very indomitable men of restless adventure and dangerous pursuits, whose names have made the Anglo Saxon the master of the world, this land the home of the free and west, its most generous provider.

Nevada was settled by California emigrants in 1850 and became a state on Oct. 31, 1884. Goldfield is four years old. Since their birth Nevada and Goldfield have yielded fortunes to the nation of all the kings and emperors of Christendom. Fortune made in the twinkling of an eye. Goldfield, their palmiest days yet to come.

there are within a block and a half that cost more than \$1,000,000. The Hotel Goldfield, soon ready for occupancy, will represent an outlay of \$200,000. It is a four stories fireproof, with 175 guest rooms, many of which are arranged in suites, apartments or families and every modern appointment, such as electric lights, etc. The Nye and Ormsby County bank, an imposing four-story stone structure, will shortly be finished. The Episcopal and Catholic churches are worthy a city three times the size of Goldfield, the latter being built at a cost of \$100,000. Elegant residence are appearing in every home section of the city, whose population has grown to fully 18,000 souls.

## NEVADA POSTOFFICES.

The number of postoffices in Nevada has increased 10 per cent in the last two years. Receipts for the year are \$2,925,000. This is the only first-class postoffice in an unincorporated place in the United States. The postoffice receives \$3,000 in salary and \$1,000 for clerk hired. Postmaster General Frank H. Hitchcock, who recently inspected the office, announced he would recommend higher salaries and a larger force. In the third quarter of the year 1907, sales of the Goldfield office amounted to \$164,071, second-class postage, \$123,841, money orders, \$1,409,232, toll, \$7,674,36, and rent, \$51,232. The number of regular letters received was 255 and the registered letters deposited numbered 11,152. In that quarter the Goldfield office sent out 88,241 pounds of mail matter.

The Goldfield Consolidated Water company delivers to the city from July 400,000 gallons per day of as pure water as may be obtained by any city anywhere and has ample reserves for emergency. No fuel famine threatens for the winter now on. Great piles of wood are corded in great stacks and ample bins of coal are stored against the most exigencies. One of the largest fuel supply companies was the largest organized company by Utah. It is incorporated as the Nevada-Utah Coal company and is based upon the Salt Lake, Ely and Goldfield. The company owns its mines and will stand against any possible weather such as was suffered last winter.

## MADE THIS COUNTY SEAT.

Esmeralda county, of which Goldfield was the first town made the seat pays a state and county tax from up to \$30,000 per year and its county's resources and available tax es will henceforth be increased by the addition of a number of rich mines such as new surveys to belong to Esmeralda and not to Nye county, is being suppressed.

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
