SHEEP IN IDAHO.

Losses Were Light Last Season and Land Crop Heavy.

A shipment of 15 loads of sheep and lambs was brought in to market at Kansas City Thursday by three sheepmen, of Soda Springs, Idaho. The party consisted of Thomas D. Hughes, D. J. Hughes, and E. Walker. One of the Messrs, Hughes, in speaking of the number of sheep on hand in their part of the state now, said to the Kansas City Drovers' Telegram: "I think there are more sheep on

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hand now than usual. The season has been good and the loss of sheep has been very light. The spring was mild

and the increase by lambs this spring was a little better than 90 per cent, so you may see that conditions have been most favorable. The semi-annual inspection in Bannock county was car-ried through last week and the figures of numbers insepcted was something over 400,000,¹ The other counties have had about as good luck as we have had, so the movement will likely be heavy from now on. It is just getting under good headway now. "Most of the farmers in our county

"Most of the farmers in our county are devoting their time to the handling of sheep now. It is a very common thing for a farmer to have from 2,000 head of breeding ewes up to probably 5,000. This number is kept about the same year after year if possible. Dur-ing the summer the sheep are grazed ing the summer the sheep are grazed on the range, but the winter is so severe we cannot keep them there for the snow gets three and four feet deep and covers the feed. About the first of September we commence a move-ment to Nevada with our herds. The distance to the winter range is about 400 miles and we take about two 400 miles and we take about two months to go, getting there about two first of the coming year. The sheep are allowed to feed along the way. The range there is dry and winter does not affect it, so the sheep are allowed to pick on the sage-brush and other browsing crops until in March when we that how setting there about Mart

start home, getting there about May 1. The sheep are then run on the summer range until time to come to market and those kept over are taken back to Ne-yada each succeeding year. In this vada each succeeding year. In this way, we find good feed for them and still escape the great loss occasioned

by a severe winter. "We devote some attention to farm-We devote some attention to farm-ing and raise wheat, barley, and alfalfa successfully. There are several irri-gation plants there, most of them own-ed by private concerns and they af-ford ample, water to earry crops through the season in case of dry weather."
