Promulgates an Address Defining Its Policy in the Islands.

FILIPINO FEDERAL PARTY.

Disires Peace for the People and Eventually to Have Islands Incorporated in the Union.

Manila, Dec. 25 .- (Correspondence of the Associated Press) .- The recently formed Federal party, whose platform was promulgated on December 23, has issued the following announcement:

"It soon will be two years that this insurrection has gone on in the islands and every day that passes convinces the Filipinos that the time for peace has arrived. Everyone knows the beautiful words of a celebrated statesman: 'No war is good, no peace is bad.' The Filipinos, in a common body, in a decided and firm movement, have proposed by all possible means to have peace, and to work for the early establishment of a civil government that will be conductive to an era of liberty, order and tranquillty.

"The Phillpine people are more interested than any one in the world in their own happiness, and the people, wishing to get peace, in the most appropriate way, may organize the new constitution of our country by industry, agriculture and commerce, by which they muy enter into the true era of liberty and prosperity, to which, cer-

tainly, we shall soon come. "For this we have the dear wish to propagate the idea of peace. We do not wish an egotistical grouping of politi-cians, but we desire a reunion of all Filipinos who honestly wish for peace and are disposed to work for it. "Our aspirations appear clear and are

practically enunciated in our platform, and we will endeavor to sustain it as Filipinos who have for our happiness and, consequently, for our country, the greatest liberty, and for the future the absolute appreciation of the American Constitution, with all the rights that are enjoyef by each citizen of the great

republican iederation. "For this, we call ourselves Federal, because, under American sovereignty, the most just and unanimous aspiration of the Filipinos will be to form a part of the federation and be constituted a sovereign, free State in the same form

as exists in the United States. "Consequently, with these principles to guide us, it is not required to determine elements nor friends, only to all our brothers, to all Filipinos, we open our arms so as to be victorious now that peace will be established."

## Navy and Army Planning for Them on a Large Scale This Summer.

#### Dewey May be in Command of the Navy and Miles of the Army.

New York, Feb. 9 .- A special to the Herald from Washington says: Tentative plans have been formulated by the board of organic fortifications of the army and the general policy board of the navy looking to joint manoeuvres on a large scale during the summer by the artillery forces stationed at Forts Wadsworth and Hamil-

ton and the North Atlantic squadron. Re-organization of the artillery into a corps makes it necessary that tests be made at the earliest opportunity of the system of fire-control as exercised at

the various sea coast fortifications. The forthcoming manoeuvres will settle, it is expected, many matters under discussion relative to the efficiency of various engines and implements of warfare

The policy board of the navy of which Admiral Dewey is president, has been giving consideration to the proposed manoeuvres. It has been practically decided to test the mechanism of the later ships constructed and the ef-

ficiency of submarine boats. It is probable that Admiral Dewey will be in supreme command of the navy, and that Gen. Miles will be in charge of the land forces. The new chief of artillery will have actual charge of the repelling forces. The North Atlantic squadron will be augmented by the addition of several tor-pedo boats and submarine boats. Rear Admiral Higginson will be the officer of the navy second in command to Ad-

Washington, Feb. 8 .- The charges against Delegate Wilcox, of Hawaii, were taken up today by House committee on elections, No. 1. Mr. Wilcox was present, accompanied by Representative Robinson of Indiana, who appeared as his friend and counsel. Mr. Robinson stated at the outset that as Mr. Wilcox was unfamiliar with the procedure in election contests, he had consented to appear in behalf of the delegate and presented the following specific answer of Mr. Wilcox to the charges contained in the letters submitted:

"That he (Wilcox) is a native Hawallan; that he shared with the native in their loyalty to the former people Queen Liliuokalani during her reign and was not in sympathy with the reigning power immediately succeeding her reign.

That after the annexation of Hawaji, he did not understand the instructions or the feelings of the United States, but all doubts were dispelled when Congress gave to the people of Hawaii the splendid system of organic laws.

"That in common with the people, he at all times, with genuine patriotism, supported the United States and its institutions and is now and has been a loyal supporter of the Constitution, laws and government of the United States.

"He admits that on January 31, 1899, and on March 3, 1899, he wrote letters appearing in the petition; that said letrs were of a personal and confidential nature and sent to one whom he sup-**OFFICE HOURS:** posed was a friend and who he thought would not betray his confidence. He further says that said letters were written by him under an entire mis-conception of the real attitude of the government of the United States to-ward the people of Hawali,

That under the laws of the United States and a fair and free election, he was elected as a delegate from Hawaii and no reason exists or has existed disqualifying him,

The additional letters written by Mr. Wilcox were submitted and he made the same answer to them. These letters were written in 1899 and criticise he American course in the Philippines. Mr. Gear, the prosecutor, then con-tended that the election of Wilcox was rregular and void, as the requirements of the United States statutes were not complied with. On being cross-que tioned, Mr. Gear said he had made speeches in Hawall favoring the elec-tion as delegate of Mr. Parker, the op-ponent of Mr. Wilcox, and in these speeches he had not questioned the right of Hawaii to have a delegate.
