LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Veteran Firemen will give an entertainment in their hall, 271 Canyon road, at 4 p. m. Thanksgiving day.

Judge Hall has continued the date of the sale of the Salt Lake City Water & Electrical Power until Saturday. The sale was to have taken place yesterday.

The Commercial club is to have a swell dinner on Thanksgiving Day and has already out its menu card covering 35 choice edibles. Copies of the card are being mailed to members of the club.

Sam Calder has returned from a six weeks' business tour through the southern part of the state. He reports great activity in iron country by big gangs of workmen from the Colorado Fuel & Iron company.

On an evening to be shortly designated there will be a function at the Commercial club, when H. L. A. Culmer will lecture on art. This lecture will be illustrated by a stereoscopic with 200 new plates just received from Paris and never before exhibited in this country.

The Ministerial association discussed at yesterday's meeting signs of progress in the national religious life during the past year. The discussion took a wide range, covering the negro, labor, and various other economic questions, the work of the churches, and the trend of events in this state.

The robin's egg blue facings for infantry which was adopted by the army uniform board after a storm of protests in place of the well established blue facings, has created so much opposition that the egg blue is to be replaced by the white facing again. But all the same, the government is allowing officers, to be at the expense of making this second change, and army tailors and shoulder strap manufacturers are making a neat little thing out of it.

General Superintendent Read of the street railway company states relative to the trap block payment on north Temple street, that he was not notified of the wish of the board of public works to pave between the rails with asphalt until after he had made his contracts and actually begun work; and then it was too late. Mr. Read maintains that the block pavement as laid was properly done, but that the heavy wagons of the asphalt contractor and others were immediately run over the trackway before the asphalt was down, and some of the newly laid blocks were knocked askew.

MEETINGHOUSE DEDICATED

That of the Twenty-Eighth Ward Now Open for Public Worship.

The new Twenty-eighth ward meetinghouse was dedicated with fitting ceremony Sunday night. There was a large attendance and the meeting was presided over by Bishop William McMillan. Music was furnished by the ward choir, and solos were rendered during the evening by Prof. Charles Kent and Mrs. Sarah Woods. The dedicatory prayer was offered by President Angus M. Cannon and appropriate remarks were made by Presidents Cannon, Taylor and Penrose of the stake presidency, and by Elders Hyrum M. and George A. Smith of the Council of the Apostles. The house is a commodious one and cost in the neighborhood of \$8,000. It is elegantly fitted up, has gothic windows, a fine stand and is well lighted by electricity. The money for its erection came principally from members of the ward. Elder Daniel Stuart alone contributing the sum of \$2,700, while \$1,000 was given by the trustee-in-trust for the Church. The new ward starts out under very favorable auspices and promises to rank with some of the older wards at no very distant date.

HELD UP AND BEATEN.

Walter W. McIlroy a Victim of a Couple of Thugs.

Walter W. McIlroy of 229 Read street, was made the victim of a couple of murderous thugs on Saturday evening about 6 o'clock, and as a result of the encounter he is minus a coat and vest and a gold watch and chain, and is in possession of a few cuts and bruises to serve him as a memento of a few minutes of more than strenuous doings.

The young man had been out to the Warm Springs and was returning home when he was assailed by the robbers. It being dark he did not see them until they sprang suddenly upon him and began beating him over the head with a gun or club. He was knocked unconscious to the ground and when he recovered his senses his coat and vest, and watch and chain were gone. The robbers were also not seen. He managed to make his way home where his hurts received proper attention. The matter was reported to the police today and officers are now working on the case.

It is doubtful, however, if they will be successful in apprehending the thugs as young McIlroy could not give a very good description of them.
