Contempt Proceedings in the Injunction Suit Against Street Car Co.

The contempt proceedings in the injunction suit of Thomas W. Jennings et al vs the Salt Lake City Railway company, the mayor and city council and others was up for hearing before Judge Hall today. In 1891 Judge Zane rendered a permanent injunction restraining defendants from laying double street car tracks on First street. Several months ago the city council granted the Consoli-dated Railway & Power company a fran-chise to lay double tracks on First strest from State to A streets. The company, members of the council and the mayor were accordingly clied for contempt of court for disobeying the la-junction issued by Judge Zane. The hearing was commenced yesterday before Judge Hall, and will probably be con-cluded today. Supt. Read was the on y witness introduced in behalt of plainning. He testilled that the company had com-menced laying the double tracks on First street in pursuance to the franchise re-cently granted by the city council.
