The defendants pleaded guidy. Judge Landis preceded the pronounc-ing of sentence by a scathing demunci-tion of the methods adopted by the trust, declaring that the punishment fixed by law is inadequate to fit the crime.

SEVEN MINERS BURNED TO DEATH AT ENGLEVILLE, COLO.

Trinidad, Colo., May 20.—Seven miners, including Supt. Alexander Jacobs, were burned or suffocated last night in the Engleville mine at Engleville. Colo. The bodies were recovered during the day. The men went to work last night, and as they did not come out this morning an investigation was started. It was discovered that fire, which broke out in the mine a year ago, was still burning in some sections, and had suddenly spread and swept across the incline tunnel, cutting the men off and preventing them reaching the outside. preventing them reaching the outside.

The point where the flames crossed the tunnel is fully three miles from the opening, and it was necessary to dig a temporary tunnel around the fire in order to reach the bodies of the ill-fated miners. The Engleville mine is one of the oldest coal producers in Colorado, having been operated fully 20 years,

Russian Lower House Adopts Resolution Expressing Great Joy at His Escape.

WERE TO BE OTHER VICTIMS.

ASSASSINATION

Premier Stolypin Gives History of Arrest of Conspirators-Social Dentcerats Were Not Involved.

St. Petersburg, May 20.—Previous to the opening of the session of the lower house of parliament today a resolution expressing the great joy of the house at Emperor Nicholas's escape from death at the hands of those who plotted his assassination, and the despest indignation at the recent criminal conspiracy so fortunately frustrated, was unanimously adopted. The reading of the resolution called forth hearty applause, but the expected Monarchist demon-stration did not take place. The Social Democrats, Social Revolutionists, part of the Group of Toll and others were absent from the house when the resolu-tion was presented and adopted. Informally, announcing the discov-

Informally announcing the discovery of the plot, Premier Stolypin said that not only was the emperor's life aimed it, but the plotters intended it assassinate Grand Duke Nichotas Nicholasythan president. assassinate Grand Duke Nicholas Nich-olaievitch, president of the council of national defense and bimself. Grand Duke Alexander Michaelovitch, brother-in-law of the emperor, and Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholaievitch were among those present when the resolution was

those present when the resolution was adopted.

After an introductory speech by Count Bonyinsky, president of the Constitutional Conservative party and a marshal of the mobility, the premier opened his address by saying that the accounts of the plot as published in certain foreign newspapers were extremely exaggerated.

Continuing, M. Stolypin said:

"In February the department of public order and security at St. Petersburg obtained information that a criminal society had been formed in this city with the direct object of executing a series of terrorist outrages. A prolonged and difficult investigation resulted in the discovery of a number of members of the society and others intimately associated with them. Reports were made of the residences of the conspirators, which were constantly changed, the utmost secrecy being observed. But all their movements, private codes and passwords were discovered in reports which they sent by post.

"On April 18 two members of the secretain and the constant of the constant

covered in reports which they sent by post.

"On April 18 two members of the society were arrested and the department of public order and security informed the procurator of the St. Petersburg police court of its discoveries.

"Having established the fact that the society was formed with the intent to overthrow the existing regime in Russia by acts of violence, the procurator on April 17 instituted proceedings against the persons arrested, who will be prosecuted without delay.

"It has been established by the pre-liminary inquiry that many of those arrested belonged to the Social Revolutionists and that their object was to organize an attempt on the life of the emperor and carry out terrorist attacks on Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholalevitch and the president of the council of ministers. Members of the society were seeking measures to enter the impartance. were seeking measures to enter the imperial palace where the emperor is, but their attempts failed."

Some time after the resolution of sympathy with the emperor had been adopted, Deputy Shirsky, a lawyer of Kuban, in behalf of the central committee of the Social Democrats, aunounced that his party had no connection with the piot and insinuated that if it really existed it was due to police provocation.

The two detectives killed were bitterly liated by the terrorists, one of them for participation in inciting the outbreak of 1965 here, and the other, who was nicknamed "The Hangman," because he had tortured political prisoners.


