

CASTRO MOUNTS HIS HIGH HORSE

El Constitucional. His Organ. Accuses Pres. Roosevelt of Seeking Pretext for a Conflict.

CREATES GREAT SENSATION.

Cause of Trouble Was Opening by Postmaster at La Guaira of Sealed Mail of the Tacoma.

Caracas, March 29.—On the day following the publication of the diplomatic correspondence regarding the violation of the mail pouches of the United States steamship Tacoma, President Castro's official organ, El Constitucional, published an editorial accusing President Roosevelt of "searching for slight incidents out of which to create a conflict with Venezuela" and of having a "premeditated plan."

"Is it possible that Minister Russell could have written his note to our foreign office without having a preconceived and premeditated intention? To attribute to a simple act, without responsibility, the opening of the postoffice in La Guayra, intentions which did not exist, and to prejudice the act as serious for the government of the United States, is to have a premeditated plan which ought not to originate, because it cannot, from the actual American minister in Caracas, W. W. Russell."

"From where, in the government, did the idea of searching for slight incidents to create a conflict with Venezuela? From the chief of this legation who is called the secretary of state in Washington, and who, in turn, cannot but be under the direct influence of President Roosevelt."

"Saying that it is high time for the American nation to know whether the traditions which impose the union of the American among themselves, has as a basis the abdication of the territorial sovereignty of this people or the quality of their rulers, because of the pretensions of a few citizens who do not and cannot represent the will of the American people, it is then high time that this horrible truth be known and whether in the government of the United States they have a friend or a capricious dictator."

"If the first, Venezuela is the most respectful of all to the dictates of honor and should be known for all the world, Venezuela assumes the paternity of its sovereignty and at this late day it has not conceived the crime of the traitor to forego it under any form or consideration."

"A profound sensation has been caused in Caracas by this article, for it is President Castro who speaks. Between the lines it is easy to see that the relations must now be strained almost to the breaking point."

"Saying that it will be necessary to conquer Venezuela if the decisions of its courts are not respected, the article closes as follows:

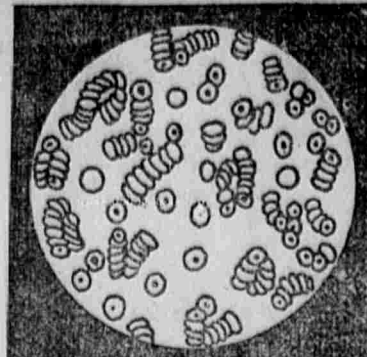
"The question thus being placed on its true footing, it is not warships or the Monroe doctrine, the dilemma resolves itself thus: Either the United States will respect and support the decision of the mixed international tribunals and those of the tribunals of Venezuela or it will raise up once for all the flag of conquest in America. Then it will be that the people of the new world will know what the position is that they will have to occupy in the present and in the future."

CAUSES OF TROUBLE.

Caracas, Saturday, March 28.—The arrival in La Guaira, March 17, of the United States cruiser Tacoma, and the ensuing notes exchanged between the American minister and the Venezuelan minister of foreign affairs over the incident of the opening of the Tacoma's mail pouches in the La Guaira postoffice has greatly increased the long existing strain in the diplomatic relations between the two countries. These relations recently have been aggravated by diplomatic correspondence regarding the American claims against Venezuela and by the resolution of the American congress calling for the ventilation of the Venezuelan question before that body.

Minister Russell on March 21, in a note to Dr. Pardo, minister for foreign affairs, made the following statement, which was qualified by the latter in his answer as "emanating from a prejudiced mind" and as showing "sauciness and levity."

"Inasmuch as having broken the seal of the United States which had been placed on these mail pouches addressed to a United States warship visiting in a Venezuelan port, and having touched wrongfully the correspondence of said ship, is a very serious matter, I respectfully ask your excellency to make a prompt and complete investigation of this act on the part of the function-

aries of the Venezuelan postoffice in La Guaira."

"The foreign office ordered an investigation to be made by the postmaster general. This showed that the pouches had been opened by mistake, and that the contents had not been disturbed. Dr. Paul then answered Mr. Russell, under date of March 24, as follows, both in Spanish and in English, and the following day in El Constitucional:

"To the sauciness or levity shown by the observations contained in your excellency's note, the Venezuelan government, ever more interested in clearing up the matter, replied by immediately addressing the minister of Fomento, in conformity with your desire, to the end of opening a rapid investigation of the facts."

"From the report your excellency will see that the facts are completely cleared up and in a way which attaches no responsibility to or affects the good name of a government such as Venezuela has today."

"In fact, one sees at first sight that the government of Venezuela could have no interest in interfering with the correspondence of no importance to it, and only a prejudiced mind could have called it a very serious matter from the first moment."

"It is perfectly well explained that the seals of the two bags received by the postoffice in La Guaira, and not three, as stated in your excellency's note, and which it afterwards became known were for the cruiser Tacoma, were being put on by the ordinary seals used by the New York postoffice, and it is also explained that the correspondence was delivered, as soon as its destination became known, intact and unopened, as was shown by the secretary of the American consul receiving it without question. This also is shown by the contents of your excellency's note to which I refer."

ABOUT CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

High Words Pass in House Committee on Election of President, And Vice President.

THE McCALL BILL THE CAUSE

Democratic Members Charge Sharp Practice—Chairman GAINES Is.

Washington, April 7.—Following the failure today of the Democratic members of the house committee on election of the president, vice president and representatives in congress to force action by that committee on the bill introduced by Mr. McCall (Mass., Rep.) to compel the publication of campaign contributions, high words were passed, the committee meeting broke up and an organized movement is now on foot on the Democratic side of the house to openly charge the Republicans with "corrupt and systematically and persistently failing and refusing to go on record as either favoring or opposing the campaign publicity bill."

The five Democratic members of the committee—Messrs. Rucker (Mo.), Gillespie (Tex.), Lassiter (Va.), Hardwick (Ga.) and Hackett (N. C.)—after the meeting made public statements in support of the bill, with the approval of the minority leader, Mr. Williams, as follows:

"Joseph H. Gaines of West Virginia, chairman of the committee on election of president, vice president and representatives in congress, called a meeting of the committee for 10:30 o'clock this morning. The chairman convened the committee and upon roll call Mr. Burke of Pennsylvania called Mr. Dignum of Michigan, Republicans, and all five of the Democratic members of the committee, answered present. This constituted a quorum. Upon motion made by one of the Democratic members, the chair called up H. R. 29,112, introduced by Mr. McCall of Massachusetts, and popularly known as the 'campaign publicity bill.'"

The chair proceeded to read said bill at length, and at the conclusion of the reading one of the Democratic members of the committee moved that the bill be read and reported favorably, and on that motion, demanded the previous question. The chairman suggested that gentlemen present who are not members of the committee be seated, and the committee meeting to discuss the provisions of this bill, and asked if it was the purpose to report it without hearing from those gentlemen. The answer was in the affirmative, and more or less short time in which to act, and as Congress was fast approaching the close of the present session, and as these gentlemen and others had previously been heard on similar bills, the motion would be insisted upon.

"About this time the chairman engaged in a whispered conversation with Mr. Dickema and Mr. Burke, the two Republican members present, after which they immediately left the room. The chair then announced to the Democratic members, all of whom were present, that he would put the motion to report the bill. One of the Democratic members asked the chairman if upon a roll call and if he reported 'Present,' to which he responded 'Yes.' Then he was asked if the two Republican members who had just left and from the room, were not absent themselves at his suggestion, and he replied to this query:

"The chair does not like to have to answer that query, but he will say that the chairman expressed himself as being opposed to the McCall bill referred to, however, and said he did not feel like maintaining a quorum of four and intact, as was shown by the secretary of the American consul receiving it without question. This also is shown by the contents of your excellency's note to which I refer."

CHARMAN GAINES' STATEMENT. Chairman Gaines, of the majority, issued a statement in reply, in which he said:

"The McCall bill is in reality the Perry Belmont bill. Those persons who demand that members of Congress should support without effort to consider its real merits, anything which even pretends to be in the nature of reform, may condemn the Republican majority in the house for being unwilling to report the bill without any attempt to perfect it. Thoughtful persons, however, I respectfully submit, who will examine the bill, will agree with the majority."

"This bill undertakes to compel publicity of campaign contributions made to a political committee which shall have two or more states influence the result or attempt to influence the result of any election at which representatives in congress are to be elected. The slightest possible influence of such a committee would be to prevent and not to make public any campaign contributions, but simply to divert such contributions from one man to another, or to make public any contributions from those having the greatest publicity to those having the least publicity. It would make public no contributions except as some rich man might contribute to one party or the other for the purpose of giving himself standing in that party."

Boston, April 7.—Announcement was made today that Houghton, Mifflin & Co. will on July 1 transfer the Atlantic Monthly, which has been published by them since 1873, to a new company, to be incorporated under Massachusetts laws. The new company is composed of Houghton, Mifflin & Co., Boston; The New York publishers; McGregor, Jenkins, the president, business manager of the magazine, and Waldo E. Forbes and Rogers Pierce of Milton. Miss Perry will continue as editor.

The Atlantic Monthly was founded in 1857 by Oliver Wendell Holmes, Henry W. Longfellow, John Greenleaf Whit- taker, James Russell Lowell and Ralph Waldo Emerson.

WRESTLING SHARPS.

Gang of Them Do W. J. Springhorn Out of \$10,000.

South Bend April 7.—It became public today that W. J. Springhorn, president of the public service board of Cleveland, was last week made the victim of a gang of sharpers and lost \$10,000 betting on a fake wrestling match. J. W. Fleming and J. E. Foster are in jail—Fleming in Cleveland and Foster in South Bend. Springhorn says he will prosecute to the limit. Filibustious names were evidently used here by the alleged sharpers.

Taft Will Not Reply

To the Remarks of Senator Hale on Alleged Great Increase in The Army.

Council Bluffs, Ia., April 7.—Secy. of War Taft finished a busy two days, the first of which he has divided between Omaha and Council Bluffs, with a speech on the "Philippines" at the Grand hotel tonight, where he was chief guest at the annual banquet given by the Council Bluffs Commercial club. There were nearly 300 guests present.

The secretary's day began at Omaha, where during the forenoon he was given an opportunity to visit Fort Crook and Fort Omaha. At Fort Crook he was received with a salute of 15 guns and welcomed by the entire general staff of the department of the Missouri. The sixteenth regiment is stationed at this post and was drawn up on dress parade during the visit of the war secretary. The officers and men received a compliment from Secy. Taft but no speech was made. On returning to his hotel Secy. Taft was driven to Council Bluffs in an automobile and was entertained at a luncheon given by Gen. Greenville M. Dodge, at which there were 18 guests. During the afternoon a reception to the public was held at the Grand hotel and an opera performance was delivered early in the evening.

Secy. Taft tonight was shown a report of the senate proceedings where Senator Hale discussed increased appropriations for the army and read it with keen interest.

"I certainly have no knowledge of who wrote the article in the Washington paper referred to by Senator Hale," said the secretary. "Nor have its contents. It was not inspired by any person officially connected with the war department. As for the remarks of Senator Hale, I have nothing to say at this time. I could hardly, with propriety, enter into a discussion of such matters through a newspaper interview. I trust you will excuse me."

Asked if he would later have something to say regarding an increased military establishment, he said he would not. He also refrained from speaking of the matter during his speech tonight, which was almost entirely on the Philippines.

FREE WOOD PULP.

Herman Ridder Sanguine That Congress Will Pass Bill for It.

Washington, April 7.—Herman Ridder of the New York Staats Zeitung, who represents the Newspaper Publishers' association in their demand for free wood pulp so as to reduce the price of white paper, said today after conferring with President Roosevelt that he was sanguine Congress would not adjourn without passing such a measure. Mr. Ridder made the statement that he had the written pledges of 68 Republican members of the house, which, added to the Democratic vote, makes a large majority of the body favorable to it.

Mr. Ridder declares that the ways and means committee of the house was responsible for not reporting a bill. Representatives Payne and DeLoach of that committee, he said, had told him several weeks ago that they would not vote for free wood pulp, but Mr. Ridder expressed the opinion that they would change their mind before Congress adjourned in view of the strong sentiment in and out of Congress opposed to them. Mr. Ridder said that there would be no trouble about getting a free wood pulp measure through the senate.

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DID NOT CHANGE FRONT

Bryan Says Taft is Misinformed or Lacks Candor in Accusing Him of It on Philippine Question.

Denver, April 7.—"Mr. Taft is either misinformed or he lacks candor when he says I changed front on the Philippine question," said William J. Bryan today in an interview, referring to the address of Secy. of War William H. Taft at Omaha last night. Mr. Taft undoubtedly had reference to the statement Mr. Bryan made public while the Paris treaty was pending before the senate.

"The question presented at that time," said Mr. Bryan today, "was this: Shall we reject the treaty, continue the state of war and force Spain to recognize the independence of the Philippines or shall we accept the treaty and declare our intention to recognize the independence of the Philippines ourselves? I took the position that it was easier for us to act than to force Spain to act, and that we had as much right to recognize the independence of the Philippines as she had to force Spain to do it. The senate ratified the treaty and came so near deciding in favor of the independence of the Philippines that it required the vote of the vice president to defeat the resolution. Had the resolution received one more vote we would have been saved more than \$500,000,000 in expense and saved the menace of war in the orient and the humiliation of having suspicion cast upon our adherence to the doctrine of the Declaration of Independence."

"Mr. Taft ought to explain whether he purposely conceals the important part of my plan or whether he is really ignorant of the subject. There has never been a day since the treaty was ratified that we could not have made the promise of independence and thus made friends of the Philippines. No excuse could be given for our colonial policy except an excuse which attacks the principles of self-government."

Mr. Bryan was somewhat amused at the reference of Secy. Taft to "the gentleman who still seems to have the power of leading the Democratic party against its will."

"That can hardly be true," suggested Mr. Bryan, "when I have no way of forcing anybody to agree with me or to favor me, and the charge comes with poor grace from one whose nomination is being urged by all the president's officeholders."

"This office-holding activity has become so great that the Republicans already have contested delegations in a number of states protesting against the use of patronage to force the nomination on the party."

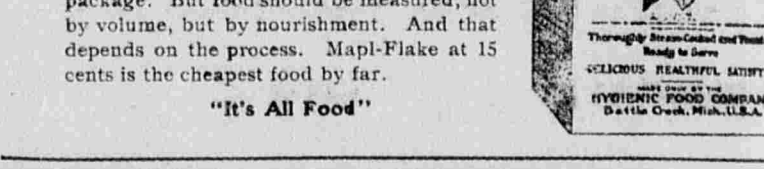
