SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKER GONE.

Elder John D. Irvine Dead—Morgan Burglar Nabbed and Placed in City Jail.

PROMINENT MEN ARRIVING.

John D. Irvine, one of Ogden's most highly esteemed citizens, died Saturday evening at 5:15 after an illness of but two weeks duration from typhoid fever. The news of his death brought sorrow to the hearts of many, and as but few knew of such a strong man being cut down in death so suddenly, but the ravages of the terrible disease soon brought him down very weak and after fighting the illness with great patience, he passed peacefully away surrounded by his loving wife and family.

For several years past he has been a member of the Weber Stake Sunday School board, and was stake supervisor of the second intermediate department, to which he was ever faithful and progressive.

OBITUARY.

The deceased was born at Renfrewshire, Scotland, September 18, 1855. He came to Utah in 1872 and resided in Payson and Salt Lake City, until 1895 when he went on a mission to California performing an excellent work, returning to Utah in 1897 coming to Ogden, where he has resided ever since. He has been in the employ of Scowcroft & Sons company as bookkeeper for the past six years. He leaves a wife, three children and a host of friends to mourn his departure.

The funeral services over his remains will be held at the Fifth ward meetinghouse Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The casket will be in the parlors of the home, 354 Fourth street on date of funeral, from 10 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.
