THEY WANT IT CHANGED.

## Sheep Men Meet in Convention to Obtain Relief-Cattle Men Oppose Action.

Special Correspondence. Ephraim, Sanpete Co., April 12 .- The

Manti Arrapine Commercial club and Mt. Pleasant Commercial club met here today in a convention of 62 delegates, Wm. D. Livingston acting as chairman. The object of the convention was to consider the rulings of the secretary of the interior regarding the privileges of grazing on the forest reserve during the ensuing year. There were repre-sentatives from nearly every settlement in the county present at the convention. Since the rules and regulations gov-

erning the reserve have been issued, the owners of livestock in this county have been agitated concerinng the dis-position of their flocks of sheep in ac-cordance with the demands made necescordance with the demands made neces-sary by the regulations sent out by the department. This year, it is estimat-ed that nearly \$00,000 head of sheep grazed upon the reserve. The order from the department allows but 100,000 head of sheep on the reserve during 1904.

The convention was called to secure, if possible, a modification of this order and thereby enable the sheepowners more time to prepare for its execution, which it is believed would utterly ruin which it is believed would utterly ruin many sheepmen if put into effect in the year 1904, therefore it was deemed best to urge action from the interior department that will grant them ex-tension of privileges and permits for grazing for the year 1904 or until they may dispose of their herds without be-ing compelled to sell at any nominal figure. figure.

After considerable discussion as to

After considerable discussion as to methods and views from some who op-posed the modification (being farmers and cattlemen), it was decided to form-ulate the following memorial to be presented to the secretary of the in-terior, embodying these facts: That there are now between 700,000 and 800,000 head of sheep and cattle grazing within the borders of the Manti reservation, and to cut this number down in 1904 to the number contem-plated by the order of the secretary of the interior, will result disastrously to a large number of our citizens. Therefore, we petition the secretary of the interior to so modify the order that only transient sheep and cattle be excluded in 1904, and thereafter , if necessary, a reduction of twenty-five

be excluded in 1904, and thereafter if necessary, a reduction of twenty-five per cent each year be made until limit of sheep and cattle, which the reserve will properly support be reached. Also that the rules with reference to district No. 5 be modified so as to allow sheep and Cattle to graze upon such "ortions of detting as are not patural. of said district as are not natural watersheds to any city or town.
