Indians Depredating. NORTH PLATTE, Neb., 12.—During the past few days, horses to the number of ten have mysteriously disappeared between this place and Willow Island.

The Wool Market. BOSTON, 12.—Wool, the past week, has been comparatively quiet, although sales add up to a fair average, and include nearly 1,500,000 domestic and foreign.

The Safe Burglary Case. WASHINGTON, 12.—To-day the grand jury turned over to Mr. Riddle, special prosecuting attorney in the safe burglary case, eleven presentments, charging in general terms a conspiracy, and it was reported about the city hall that the following persons are named in them: F. A. Sawyer, late in charge of the secret service, Nettleship, Curz and Shaler of the secret service, assistant district attorney Harrington, Thomas Somerville, of New York, A. B. Williams, Michael Hayes and Wm. Benton.

Iron Clads Sold. NEW ORLEANS, 12.—Eight iron-clads used on the Mississippi during the war, were sold by the government to-day, to parties in Boston, Pittsburgh and St. Louis, for an aggregate of \$9,075; it is thought that the navy department will disapprove the sale.

Kuklux to be Examined—The Escaped Negro. MEMPHIS, Tenn., 12.—The examination of alleged Kuklux from Gibson Co., has been postponed until Monday. Among the prisoners are J. P. Halle, who had a row with negroes at a barbecue about paying for a slave he had bought, and Munro Morgan, and J. F. Winer, two men who were fired upon by negroes near Pickettsville, which led to the arrest of the negroes who were taken from Trenton jail.

The Avalanche reporter has had an interview with Dug Jamison, a negro who escaped from the mob. He admits being present when Morgan and the others were fired on, and says that the negroes had assembled for the purpose of killing a colored man named Butler, and whipping another, but that he was there in the interest of peace. He was reticent in regard to his being taken from jail, but says he escaped by jumping into a creek and that Nelson McGee also escaped.

General Butler on the Stump. GLOUCESTER, 12.—Gen. Butler opened the Congressional canvass in the Essex district to-night, by an elaborate speech, mainly on national topics.

Webb to be Prosecuted. NEW YORK, 12.—A suit has been begun by the government in the United States District Court, against ex-minister James Watson Webb, to recover the amount due the Brazilian government when they paid him for the United States in the matter of the alleged illegal condemnation of American vessels.

Fatal Shooting Affray. LEXINGTON, Mo., 12.—A shooting affray, growing out of an old feud, occurred here this afternoon between Deputy Marshal L. A. Kane and Deputy Sheriff Eugene Ewing, in which Kane was killed and Ewing mortally wounded.

St. Louis. OGDEN, 12.—Maggie Corby committed suicide by a dose of arsenic, at the Globe Hotel, yesterday, while laboring under depression of spirits.

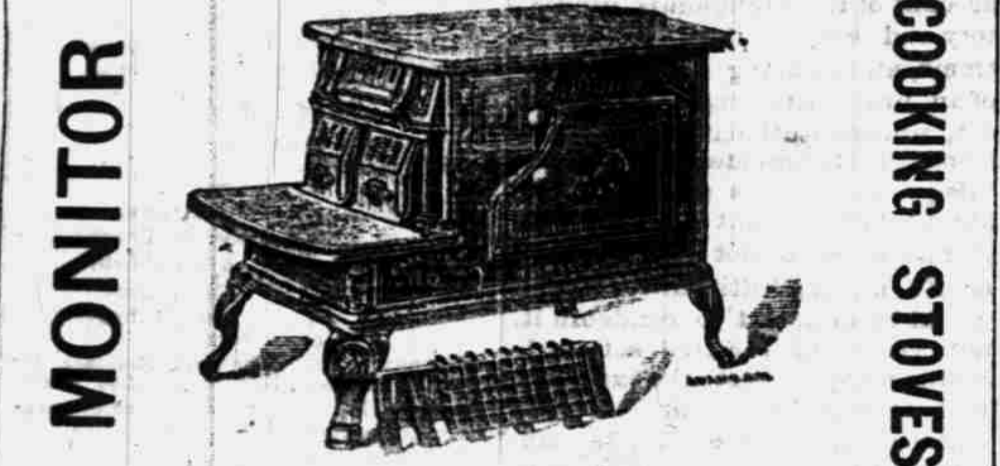

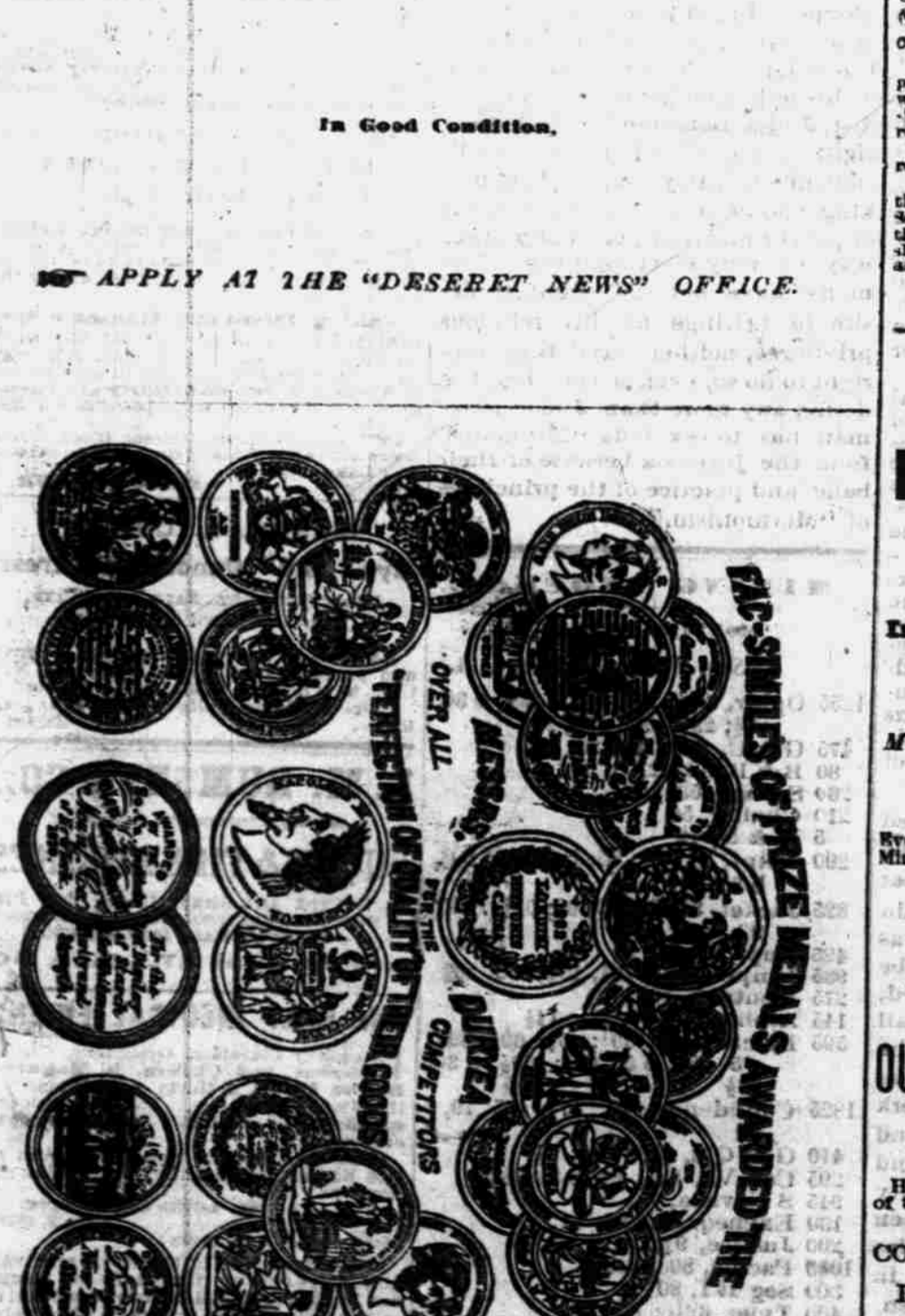
