Now-days wise foreigners stay indoors after sunset and keep away from the vicinity of the forts at any time of day. #### QUEER LITTLE CARS.

The clean, narrow streets of Caracas are paved with small sharp cobble stones, and the sidewalks are of Port-land cement. The several transway lines are all narrow-guage, with queer little cars of English make, each square box fitted with four benches. The city occupies the bed of an ancient take. which is said to have been dried up and elevated by some early earthquake. There is nothing Indian about it now. except its name, and no trace is left of the proud hardy race that the con-querors found in the beautiful valley. In the year 1812 the whole city was shaken down at once and upwards of 20,000 people were burled in the ruins. A number of times since then the city has been partially destroyed by terrimotes and the people live in constant dread of another great dis-aster; so that at the slightest permonitory signs, such as trembling of the earth, or swaying of doors, or

But even now the medicine is ready for the royal patient. It It has again to be examined and checked by the physician in the precincts of the royal laboratory. This done, he seals down the cork and puts the bottle in a box which is kept docked and only opened when a dose has to be adminis-tered. So cautious is he that, although the box is kept in the patient's cham-ber, the cork of the bottle is scaled again wenever it has been opened, and only when doses have to be frequently given does the bottle remain on the table.
