

DOES AGAINST PRATT

Verdict For \$1, in the Holding Damage Suit.

NOTHING SAID ABOUT COSTS

Question of Who Will Pay Them—Supreme Court—Other Court Matters.

The jury in the holding damage suit against Pelcoman John H. Roberts as, came into court this afternoon with a verdict of \$1 for plaintiff and against ex-Chief of Police Arthur Pratt.

Holding used the officers for an alleged false arrest and imprisonment and demanded \$1,000 damages. The case dates back to the 20th of May, 1894, when "Gentle" Smith and his army were stopped from entering Davis county by Pratt and his men. Holding, in company with "Captain" Vinson of the "Home Reserve," made a night visit to the camp of "Gentle" Smith, who was at that time being held, under an injunctive order, at the dividing line between Davis and Weber counties. They were returning to the city between four and five o'clock in the morning and when near the dividing line they were arrested by Roberts and locked up in the city jail and kept there for eight hours. No charges were presented against them, at least they were never brought to trial.

Roberts claimed that he arrested the men under orders from Captain Donovan, who had been instructed from the "Home of War" by Chief Pratt. He said that the case against Donovan was dismissed yesterday, the defendants moving for a writ, to which Pratt consented. Chief Pratt's defense was that the men were up to see Smith with a view of making arrangements with him to treat the line with aid from the "Home Reserve." Before he could get in the city to prefer a charge the injunction was raised.

The Supreme Court has denied the petition of the plaintiff for a rehearing of the case of the Pleasant Valley Coal company against the board of county commissioners for Salt Lake county, Chief Justice James disallowing. The county will probably have to pay the cost of the suit, \$10,000.

It is believed that the boys are guilty and were fined \$10 each, a default of the cash they went to jail.
