leader of the New and Latter House of Israel, which occurred at the "Woodlands" en June 30th. Deceased was the wife of James Jershom Jezreel, alias White, the founder of the sect, and was known to her followers as Queen Esther, the Virgia, the mother of Israel. The death of Mrs. Jezreel is a striking commentary upon the central doctrine of this sect, which is that they are an elect people who are to be preserved from the grave and corrupon. This extraordinary doctrine suffered a great shaking up about three years ago when the prophet James Jershom Jezreel went the way of all flesh.
