WASHINGTON, 3.—By the President of the United States of America: A PROCLAMATION. Whereas, It is provided in the laws of the United States, that whenever by reason of unlawful obstructions, combinations or assemblages of persons, or a rebellion against the authority of the United States, it shall become Impracticable, in the judgment of the President, to enforce by the ordinary course of

Judgment of the President, to enforce by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings, the law of the United States within any State or Territory, it shall be lawful for the President to call out the militia of any State and employ such a part of the land and naval forces of the United States as he may deem necessary to enforce the faithful execution of the laws of the United States to suppose such rebellion in States to suppose such rebellion in whatever State or Territory thereof

the United States have been therein foreibly opposed and the execution thereof foreibly resisted, and

Whereas, the laws of the United States require, whenever it may be necessary, in the judgment of the President, to use military forces for the purpose of enforcing the faithful execution of the laws of the United States, he shall forthwith, by a proclamation, command such insurgents to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes within a limited time.
