POCATELLO, IDAHO. Special Correspondence.

Pocatello, Idaho, June 10.-There is great rejoicing in the gate city over the near approach to the opening of the Fort Hall reservation. Wednesday, June 6th, the news was flashed over the wires, that Congress had passed and that the President had approved the bill ratifying the treaty with the Fort Hall Indians. In the evening the people congregated on the main streets in great numbers, bands paraded the town, speaking then was indulged in till a late hour. Everybody felt extremely happy at the bright prospect in store for our comparatively isolated town. A great rush for the hills and the farming land can be looked for on the opening proclamation being issued by the President. The Indian police are kept busy even now, pulling up stakes and notices already posted by overanxious "sooners" and prospectors. If all reports be true, Pocatello will, in the

near future, be the center of great min-ing and smelting works for the hills surrounding the town for miles are said to be laden with the precious metals which bring wealth and pros-perity to all concerned, and especially to these fortunate enough to get hold of and make good their claims.

IDAHO.

Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin

Boise, Idaho, June 12, 1900,-The mean temperature of the week for the State was 66 degrees, which is 6 degrees above the normal. The temperature was uni-formly high throughout the State, and in the Snake River valley the maxi-mum reached 105 degrees. A feature of last week's weather was the high, dry, westerly winds. No thunderstorms or precipitation occurred in any section, The drouth in the eastern countries has continued for about 15 days. There was more than the average sunshine.

CROPS.

Fruit-With exception of high westerly winds that blew some fruit from the trees, the weather has been entirely favorable. The reports of damage to fruit from wind came from the north ern and eastern counties, the south western fruit district having apparently escaped. Cherries ripened rapidly las week and strawberries are in abund ance. There is a prospect of more than an average crop of tree fruits, and average crop of blackberries and rasp-berries. Insects have not been trouble-
