LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lecture on Salesmanship—J. Will Gray is to lecture this evening at the Y. M. C. A. on "Salesmanship."

Young People's Banquet—The Young People's Christian union of this city will give a banquet Friday evening in the First Congregational church.

Prior Bays Joy Wagon—Landlord Don H. Porter of the Kenyon hotel has just bought a \$4,500 seven passenger automobile to be used at Stockton, Cal., where he is to spend the winter.

New Organist—Mrs. J. L. Stohauer, formerly of Omaha, and a sister of Freeman Morningstar of this city, began Sunday, her engagement, as organist of the First Methodist church.

War Is Successful—The "war" of the Y. M. C. A. for recruits continues with excellent results. A steady number of "rookies" are being hooked at the office of the adjutant in Brooks arcade.

Director Logan Lectures—Musical Director Logan of the Chauncey O'Connell company played a number of his own compositions and lectured on them Saturday afternoon at Madame Swenson's studio.

Application For Water—The Newcastle Reclamation company of Washington county has filed an application with the state engineer, for 10 cubic feet of water from Big Creek, to irrigate 4,500 acres of land.

Contract Let for Work—The board of public works awarded the contract of building the weir at the high line intake in City creek to Zerbe & Walker Saturday night. The contract price was \$1,870, which is \$170 higher than the city engineer's estimate.

Fighting Necrobacillosis—The call of the state sheep board for funds with which to fight necrobacillosis among sheep is being pretty generally responded to, which it is hoped will eradicate the disease. Mr. Young left today for the northern part of the state to look after conditions there.

Planning Big Charity Dinner—Officials of the United States Army and Volunteers of America are already planning for a big Thanksgiving dinner for the unemployed. Subscriptions will be asked for, and the Commercial street chapel will be converted into a dining room. The women of St. Mark's church will furnish dishes, tables and chairs.

Youth Held for Burglary—A young man giving the name of T. B. Bell, 18 years, was arrested Saturday night on the charge of robbery by Detectives Ripley and Curran. The young man was accused of entering a room in the Wilson hotel and stealing therefrom a suitcase containing a number of valuable toilet articles and clothing. When arrested he was trying to dispose of some of the stolen articles.

Ladies' Auxiliary Election—The following officers have been elected by the Ladies' Auxiliary to the free reading room for the blind: Mrs. Andrew S. Rowan, honorary president; Mrs. A. S. Hart, president; Mrs. W. S. McCorkin, first vice president; Mrs. Walter S. South, second vice president; Miss Buer, secretary; Mrs. E. A. Allen, treasurer; Mrs. J. J. Snider, librarian. The association has over 200 members, and a fairly large collection of books.

Board Committees Meet Today—The committees of the city board of education meet this afternoon to arrange the regular meeting Tuesday night. The high school board election is to be discussed. It is now in the hands of the committee on school law. The committee will submit upon a report to be made Tuesday night. It is probable that the committee will report favorably on the bond issue and the election will be held about the first of the year.

Brines in Good Places—M. J. Brines is now singing in the quartet of the First Baptist church in New York city, one of the oldest churches in the country. Mr. Brines is waiting a call to rehearse "The Paradise of Mohamet," which is being revised and rewritten, since he has been in the east. Mr. Brines has sung in concert in Brooklyn successfully. He has also been asked to rehearse with the Mendelssohn Glee club, the finest male chorus in the country.

Two Shots Muzzle Neighbors—Two revolver shots on Seventh South and Sixth East streets, fired in quick succession Sunday evening, caused an alarm to be sent to police headquarters. Several officers hurried to the scene expecting to find a hold-up, but it was learned that the cause of the shots was a row between two union and two non-union men. The cause of the row so far as could be discovered, was a letter by a man named Tom Jones, who had been struck over the head with a gun. No arrests were made.

Hindoo College Men Oppose—The local Hindoo graduates of the University of Illinois organized a local alumni association Saturday evening at the Morgan hotel, when these officers were chosen: Wesley S. King, class of '07, manager of American Surety company, president; E. O. Lee of Booth, Lee & Bagder, class of '08, secretary and treasurer; W. H. Gregory, class '08, historian. At the banquet toasts were responded to by W. H. Gregory, H. J. Vermorel, E. W. Brown and George C. Bartlett.

Watch for Two Irishmen—The police are on the lookout for two young Irishmen who are said to be fathers of the recent kind. The grant of the two men is to sell Irish lace which they claim they smuggled into the country following a shipwreck. The lace, it is reported, is not the genuine article, and it is claimed that hundreds of persons in Liverpool were defrauded by the smooth grifters.

New Talebook on Sale—The first copies of the new story by J. James E. Tolson, entitled "The Street Apologist," were placed on sale at the Peapack News book store this morning. The demand is already very strong from all points of the country. The book, while somewhat smaller than the same author's "Articles of Faith," is found in the same style and is prepared by a competent printer with it.
