Honor to Whom.—At the Territorial Fair, just closed, it was observed that Utah County was not a whit behind any of the others. Every settlement of the county, that exhibited, took its share of the prizes awarded. Among these were diplomas, silver and bronze medals, often first prizes.

A List of Honor.—We publish in this issue of the NEWS a list of the names of persons who have recently paid the amounts which they were owing to the Perpetual Emigrating Fund. We hope this will stimulate others to remember their obligations, and proclaim in earnest tones, "Go thou and do likewise."

Reservation Survey.—The old Spanish Fork Indian reservation has been surveyed by Major Gorlinski, and entries can be made on it, as soon as the plot is filed in the Land Office. This will be in about a month.

If the settlers on the Sanpete, Corn Creek and Deep Creek reservations will make a special deposit with the Surveyor General, F. Salomon, of a sufficient amount they can have their lands surveyed without delay, thereby obviating the necessity of their waiting for an appropriation from Congress, which may be delayed one or two years. Parties making the deposits will have credit for each amount when they make their final proof on their pre-emptions.

Denial.—Certain disreputable papers having published what they claimed to be a dispatch to Sheriff Wm. Brown, of Ogden, from Sheriff Burton, of Salt Lake, calling for certain witnesses to rebut evidence in the Collett case, Sheriff Brown declares, through the Junction, that the statement is "false from beginning to end." He says:

"I have received no such dispatch, and have received no dispatch mentioning the names of P. G. Taylor, Daniel Rawson, or Henry Shurtliff, or any other persons whatever. I know of no man named Henry Shurtliff, and have not at any time spoken to Prest. Peery on any such business as that referred to. The author of the article is a malicious fabricator."

Dangerous Character.—On the evening of Saturday last, a tramp of evil appearance called at a house in the Seventh Ward in this city. Finding that two young ladies were alone in the place, he approached the elder sister and made certain base insinuations to her; but being foiled for the moment by her innocence, inasmuch as she failed to understand the purport of his remarks, he turned the subject by begging for some food. The younger girl immediately passed into an adjoining room, with the intention of obtaining some bread

and butter for him. No sooner was he alone with his intended victim than he started toward her, apparently with a determination to assault her. Providentially, at this moment he beheld an elderly lady nearing the room, and he instantly assumed the harmless position of one who was waiting most humbly for food. On receiving two large slices of bread and butter spread with preserves, he left the house, but no sooner had he reached the front gate than he threw the generous gift into a water ditch, thus showing that he had been actuated by a baser motive than hunger.

Our citizens would do well to guard their families from the attacks of all such characters, a few of whom ought to be made the subjects of severe example.

Territorial Convention.—The People's Territorial Convention was held in the City Hall, last evening. At 6 o'clock the meeting was called to order, and a temporary organization effected, with Hon. Orson Hyde chairman, and John T. Caine, Esq., secretary. The chairman was authorized to appoint a committee of seven on credentials, which was done, and the committee retired. During their absence, Hon. W. H. Hooper was called upon for a speech, but declined in favor of Judge Z. Snow, who responded in a few well chosen remarks, followed by Ezra D. Carpenter, Esq., who was speaking when the committee returned, but immediately gave way for the reading of the following report, which, after being amended by the substitution of alternates in the places of absent delegates, was accepted:

SILVER REEF, Oct. 9, 1878.

Editors Deseret News:

Ah Toi, the supposed murderer of Hon Chong on the 4th ult., was captured at Kanarra, on the morning of the 7th, and brought to Silver Reef. Had an examination before the justice of the peace, yesterday afternoon, and discharged, there being no evidence against him.

Accident.—From the Junction, we learn of a painful accident which occurred in Huntsville, Weber County, on Saturday last. John Hislop, of that settlement, while in the act of oiling the gearing of the cylinder to a threshing machine in operation, had his left hand caught between the cogs, and

his arm was drawn in, the whole fleshy part being terribly lacerated. If the men in charge had not exercised sufficient presence of mind to enable them to stop the machine instantly, he would have been torn to pieces. Considering the severity of the accident, he is doing remarkably well at present.

The Aiken Murder.—The trial of Sylvanus Collett, in the First District Court, for alleged complicity in the murder of John Aiken, in 1857, commenced at Provo yesterday. A jury was empanelled, and Judge P. T. Van Zile opened the case for the prosecution. After his address, the defence wishing to make no remarks, the examination of witnesses immediately commenced. Joseph Skeen was the first witness called. The trial will probably last several days.

Judge Van Zile is assisted by Judge Sutherland and Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Lewis. The attorneys for the defense are Tilford and Hagan, Judge Dusenberry and John B. Milner, Esq.

Museum.—Several valuable Indian curiosities consisting of arrow-heads, spear-heads, celts and pestles have been presented to the department of Ethnology by Hon. Charles C. Rich. Several Indian relics, consisting of crania and human remains, found in this city, fragments of pottery and other Indian curiosities, from Southern Utah, have been added to the same department by Mark Lindsey, Esq. A silver coin of James 1st, of England, has been presented to the coin collection by Edward Faulkner, of Brigham City. Fossil remains of the buffalo and other large animals, have been added to the cabinets of the Deseret Museum by the Y.M.M.I. Society of St. Johns, under the direction of Brother E. L. Stookey of that settlement.

Summer Complaint.—The following simple remedy for this common and distressing ailment, is furnished by Mr. J. H. Brown, of Logan, and is said to be very effective;

Take one quart of water and reduce it to one teacupful, by putting into it red hot coals from a burned piece of hard wood. (Pine will do, but maple or other hard wood is preferable.) Let the water get clear, and then put a teaspoonful of it into a teacupful of sweet milk, and let the person afflicted drink of the mixture, frequently, night and day.

Our correspondent informs us that a child of his, aged 14, was reduced to a mere skeleton about three weeks ago, but by the use of this remedy, she was now quite well. In another case, a child had been afflicted for a long period, and three doctors had given it up to die, when this simple method was used, and the child was restored to perfect health and strength. It is certainly worth remembering.

Returned Missionary.—We received a call, to-day, Elder Paul O. Paulson, who returned, last night, from a mission of five months to the State of Nebraska. Brother Paulson's special object was to labor among his countrymen, the Scandinavians. He succeeded beyond his most sanguine expectations—was well received and kindly treated, had all his wants supplied, and aroused a very strong interest for the Gospel, in the minds of the people. The field was new, and, therefore, not so productive of baptisms as a long and well-worked vicinity might have been; but the power of God, which was made manifest in the healing of the sick, through Brother Paulson's administration, did much toward allaying prejudice and softening the hearts of the people. But one person accepted the ordinance of baptism, yet he thinks that a mighty work in this respect might be accomplished now by energetic, honest Elders.

City Council.—Meeting of the City Council, Tuesday evening, Oct. 8th, 1878, Mayor Little, presiding.

A petition was presented from Barratt Brothers, asking for an auctioneer's license for one year from October 5, 1878. Granted.

The special committee, to whom was referred the matter of inspect-

ing the wooden building on First South Street, belonging to C. F. Stoffers, which was dilapidated, reported that they had examined the building and concluded that it was entirely too unsafe for occupancy, and could not be made habitable unless torn down and rebuilt from the foundation. Report adopted.

The petition of Isaac Hunter claiming compensation for damages sustained by high water in 1862 and 1863, which was laid over for one week to be taken up and considered with the former report in relation to the same matter, came up for consideration. The recorder read the former action of the council from the records, which plainly exhibited that the council had heretofore acted upon the matter, and decided that the city was in no wise responsible for such damages. After consideration by the council it was voted that the prayer of the petitioner be not granted.

Adjourned for one week.

Bee Meeting.—Pursuant to appointment, a meeting of the parent Beekeepers' Association was held in the Council House on Tuesday evening, October 8th, A. M. Musser presiding. The principal subject of discussion, upon which a number of members gave their views, was "foul brood" and the best means to be employed in the removal of that destructive element. The following resolution was adopted as the unanimous sense of the meeting:

RESOLUTION.

Whereas, Foul brood and other causes are operating to the great destruction of our bees; and, whereas, the carelessness of many beekeepers is the cause of the spread of this destructive element;

Therefore, Be it resolved, that the forming of branch organizations in all the counties of the Territory is recommended by this meeting, and that each organization be requested to appoint active committees, whose business it shall be to encourage the destruction of all swarms of bees where the foul brood makes its appearance.
